here, Monday. District Judge George W. Miller set bond for each man at \$100,000 on two counts each.

On Tuesday, Judge Miller set March 21 as the date for a pretrial hearing in the capital murder case against the two men. That hearing

postponed from January 17, will begin at 10 a.m. in the 110th District Court here.

Hearing Date Set

Murder charges were first filed here on Nov. 30 by a Motley County grand jury, against the two men for the slaying of Sheriff Jinks Wilson, and attempted murder in connection with a threat to John D. Rogers, Wilson's companion at the time of the shooting.

Lubbock attorneys John T. Montford and Mark C. Hall are the court-appointed lawyers for Carter, and Steve Hurt of Plains is the courtappointed attorney for Fortenberry

District Attorney Randy is scheduled to Hollums prosecute the case, assisted by special prosecutor Tom Hamilton of Plainview.

Carter and Fortenberry were lodged in the Crosbyton jail until Feb. 1, when Fortenberry was transferred to the Hale County Jail in Plainview. Carter was transferred Feb. 17 to the Lubbock County Jail.

SPAG Approves Defense Funds For MotleyMurderTrial

(Lubbock Avalanche-Journal) funds, the two trials will cost Hollums during the A \$51,550 request for federal funds to defend two men accused of murdering Motley County Sheriff Jalmar "Jinks" Wilson was given local approval Tuesday by directors of SPAG.

The request now goes to an advisory committee of the Texas Criminal Justice Division and ultimately to Gov. Dolph Briscoe for approval. In the words of one South Plains Association of Government (SPAG) director, "it's a lot of money to defend two thugs."

SPAG director and Lubbock Mayor Roy Bass offered another view, however, "With due process, every man is entitled to a competent defense. Motley County has to pay for it and it's our duty to help them out

as best we can. Because the crime took place in Motley County, expenses for the two men's defense must be provided by

Forrest Campbell, county judge, said at Tuesday's

every person in Motley County \$25 and possibly \$60. County officials justified their request because of Motley County's low income levels. Population estimates taken in 1974 indicated 40 per

cent of the county's population was over the age of 60 with yearly incomes below poverty level. The request to the TCJD is for unbudgeted funds. According to Dorothy Miller,

SPAG planner who developed the request, "We're going in with our hands open. Whatever funds they have available we're asking for." The Motley County request is the first of its kind of the 15 county SPAG region and only the second in Texas.

For the prosecution, area citizens have received over \$5,000 to begin a special prosecutors fund, according to one of the fund's instigators, former Motley County Sheriff John Stotts He said Plainview attorney Tom Hamilton had been hired to assist 110th Judicial meeting, "Without federal District Attorney Randy

upcoming trials.

For the defense, the county has requested more than \$50,000 in Texas Criminal Justice Division funds to help pay expected costs of the two capital murder trials.

Charged with the Motley County shooting are Stacy Albert Carter, 25, of Olivia, N.C. and Larry C. Fortenberry, 28, of Mount Hermon,

The killing of a police officer is an automatic capital murder offense, meaning it could result in the death penalty. If found guilty, both defendants have the automatic right to appeal the decision through the Texas

Supreme Court System.

Motley County is liable for the trial expenses because of the "indigent defense" law in Texas. It requires the county in which a crime is committed to provide a defense for persons unable to

pay for their own. While Motley County tax payers are required by Texas law to provide an adequate defense for the two defendadequate prosecution of the two suspects, Stotts said.

"The district attorney here had never tried a capital murder case before," Stotts said. "We asked him who he'd like to assist him and he said 'Tom Hamilton.'

Hamilton graduated from Matador High School in Motley County and served as district attorney of the 64th Judicial District from 1969-

The \$5,000 raised by county citizens for the proseuction fund is minimal compared to what county taxpayers will have to pay if the county's request to the Texas Criminal Justice Division for defense funds is turned down. The request for \$51,550 was endorsed Thursday by the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee, a recommending sub-committee of the South Plains Association of Gov-

ernments. The committee's decision came after an appearance by Motley County Judge Forrest Campbell, who offered figures concerning the financial status of the county

"If the county had to pay for the two trails without any assistance," Campbell said, we'd have to increase our taxes almost 100 per cent." Campbell expressed concern that costs of the trials might be more. "If there's one mistake in the judicial process," he said, "the costs could elevate to \$100,000.

Committee members discussing this possibility said if additional funds were needed to finance the trial, Motley County could make another request through SPAG.

The Motley County request is the second of its type put before the Criminal Justice Division. The other case, involving Ignacio Cuevas, resulted in a TCJD fund grant of over \$100,000. Cuevas was charged in the deaths of two hostages during the August 1974 attempt by him and Fred Gomez Carrasco to break out of Huntsville Prison.

March Designated **Nutrition Month**

March has been designated as National Nutrition Month, and in promoting this idea. attention is directed to food additives.

Despite recent consumer concern, food additives are necessary to furnish the entire nation quality food, according to Miss Tina E. Willmann, County Extension

'Before a processor can use an additive, he must present information to the Food and Drug Administration.

'As such, he shows a particular additive will accomplish its intended effect in food - and that the amount used doesn't exceed what'sreasonably necessary.

Spices, natural and synthetic flavors, such as liquid derivities of onion, garlic, cloves and peppermint, make up the largest group of additives - flavors and flavoring agents, the agent continued, discussing various additives.



"Stabilizers, on the other hand, prevent oxidation and spoilage of food.

'For years, people have used salt, sugar, vinegar, heat, freezing, smoke and spices to prevent or delay spoilage. Modern developments brought preservatives such as antioxidants, mold inhibitors and fungicides on the scene.

Without such antioxidants as BHA and BHT, baked goods and other foods using oils and fats - would turn

rancid in a short time. Another group of additives, non-nutritive sweeteners, are sugar substitutes, the agent said. They're used in foods intended for people who can't tolerate sugar.

Certain addivites actually alter food quality.

For example, bleaching and maturing agents speed up the aging process of wheat improving bread - making quality of flour

'Freshly milled flour," she explained, "is yellowish in color and makes poor quality

Although they don't improve eating quality, colors play very important roles.

People become accustomed to a food being a certain color - and refuse to eat it if it looks too pale.

Additives have other uses besides those mentioned, the agent said

These include hardening drying, firming, crisping, sticking, whipping,


