Plans Ready For 4H Rodeo

Events Will Start 8:00 p.m. Friday

Rainfall Less Than Last Year

Thunderstorms this week dumped 93 inches of rain in Matador, and left some damage in areas of town. A heavy storm Monday night, with 60 mph winds, brought 55 inches of precipitation, and unconfirmed reports of trees being uprooted. Large branches were reported blown from trees at several residences. Late Tuesday storm clouds passed over, leaving 38 inches of moisture, bringing to a total, 1.29, rainfall for June through the 22nd, and a total of 8.21 for the year. Last year's total for the same period was 8.30, as recorded by Bob Stanley.

PLANS are complete for the two-day rodeo Friday and Saturday, June 25-26, sponsored by the Motley County 4-H Clubs, it was announced this week. Events will start at 8 p.m. each evening, at the Old Settlers Rodeo Arena. Although the rodeo is sponsored by the Motley County 4-H Clubs, volunteer help with the concession stands will be appreciated, it was announced by Max Barton, 4-H adult leader. Approximately 200 entries have been received, according to Mrs. Kenneth Thompson, rodeo secretary, and good performances both evenings are anticipated. Entries have been received from a wide area, extending from Oklahoma, to Texas City. Events will include bareback riding, calf roping, barrel racing, poll bending, ribbon roping, flag racing, bull riding and calf riding. Competing will be three age groups, Pee Wee, 11 years and under; juniors, 12 to 15 years of age, and seniors, 16 through 18 years. The show will be produced by Doc Edwards of Girard. Scheduled Saturday night is a dance in the Old Settlers Pavilion, with music by the Country Impressions of Amarillo. Rodeo admissions will be \$1.75 for adults and \$1.00 for students. Children under six years of age will be admitted free. The public is invited and urged to attend the rodeo and support the youth organization. All proceeds from the entertainment will go to the Motley County 4-H Clubs.

Announcement was made Wednesday by the Motley County Hospital Board that formal opening of the Motley County Clinic (former Trawek Hospital) has been set for July 10, as a feature of the Bicentennial celebration. Dr. Thuy Danh Do and Dr. Y Hoang Do will have offices in the clinic and will start their medical practice here July 5, according to the announcement by J.M. "Sonny" Russell, president of the hospital board.

Several organizations are selling tickets for gift drawings which will be held on the evening of the Bicentennial celebration. Matador Garden Club has announced tentative plans to hold a brief dedication service in the Pioneer Memorial Park north of the courthouse, where the plaque presented to the late Douglas Meador by the Cimarron Valley Historical Society, has been placed on a recently constructed brick foundation.

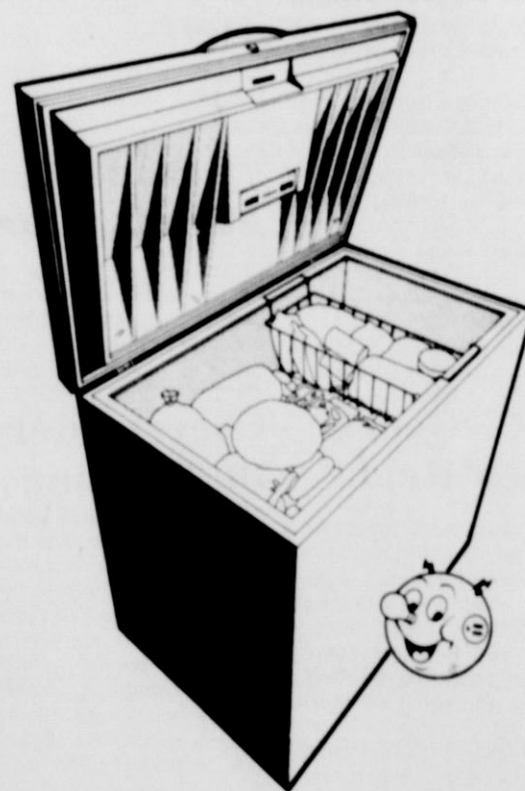

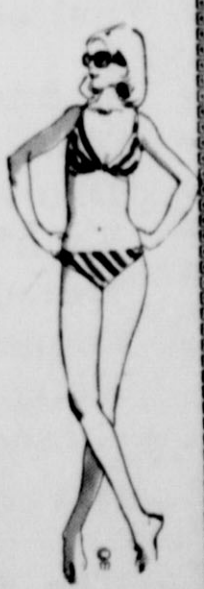

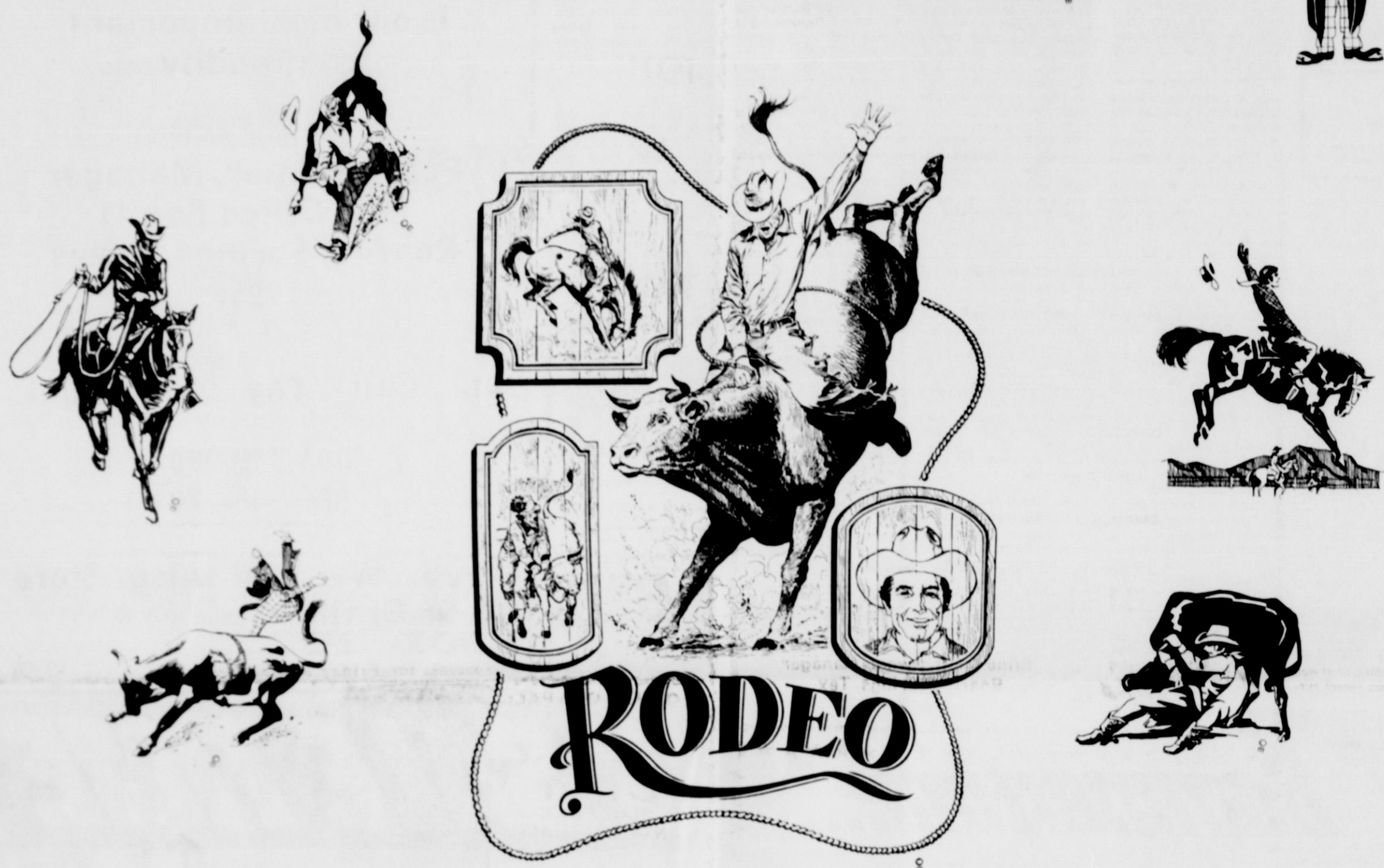
