New School Tax Laws Aired At Lions Club

OPPOSITION to new school tax laws which might double school taxes in Motley County within two years, was expressed Tuesday at regular luncheon-meeting of Matador Lions Club, held in the United Methodist Church basement dining hall.

Lions Charlie Johnson and Forrest Campbell presented

a program outlining the serious economic impact of the new school tax laws hurriedly enacted during the closing hours of the last legislature in 1975.

It was pointed out that failure of the next legislature to rectify or repeal these laws could double school taxes in Motley County.

Basic school requirements are paid for by the Minimum Foundation School Program, to the extent of 80 per cent, with the remaining 20 per cent paid for by the school district. It was explained, however, that the amount assumed by the districts vary, depending on each district's ability to pay. The amount formerly was determined by the State Education Agency, on an economic index formula of (1) Income of the district; (2) Tax assessed values and (3) number of students.

"The Legislature was persuaded by urban districts to base the school districts' local fund assignment on full market value of properties, rather than on income productivity. In two years, instead of \$80,000, we will pay something like \$250,000 school taxes. The rural districts will suffer if the law is allowed to remain," said Lion Campbell, who is Ex-Officio County School Superintendent.

He urged interested citizens to support "Texas for Equitable Taxation Inc.," a newly formed group dedicated to fair taxation policies for the rural areas.

Lion Johnson, Superintendent of Motley County Independent School District, discussed the school's budget for the coming year, and the importance of parents keeping their children in school. He stressed average daily attendance, since the amount which the school district receives from the state is based on the scholastic attendance records. If a student misses school, the school is penalized, he pointed out. "If you have school age children, be sure they are in school... you're the ones who are going to pay for their absences," he stressed.

The speakers urged that persons concerned about the situation should get in contact with Representative Phil Danks, Shamrock, Tex., and Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, and voice opposition to House Bill 1126. The bill added over one billion dollars to the cost of the Foundation School Program for the period of 1975-77.

Boss Lion Larry Hoyle presided at the meeting. Lion Bob Stanley introduced the visitors, including Gary Campbell and small daughter, Jerri Ann, with the observation that Jerri had not only her father, but grandfather (Forrest Campbell) and great-grandfather (R.E. "Pappy" Campbell) present. Also a visitor was Leroy Stone of Turkey.

The members lauded Walter Jones for another excellent barbecued beef lunch.

Screwworms Hit County

"Screwworms have been confirmed in Motley County again, making just another insect pest for the local people to contend with this year," said Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer this week.

The following guidelines are given for Motley County livestock producers who want to help keep this pest under control.

1. Watch livestock closely, and if worms are detected, treat the case, collect ten worms if possible, and mail to Mission for confirmation. (It doesn't make any difference what you think they are, because if a sample is not sent to the lab in Mission, no help will be available.)
2. Delay working stock if possible, and if not possible, apply a repellent to the wound.

Extension Agent Pallmeyer has mailing kits for those who have lost or misplaced their vials. Information required is included in the mailing kits. Kits are also available from Boyce Hart, John Briscoe and James Ed Russell.

Pallmeyer says that because of the mild winter survival of all types of insects is high, thereby resulting in greater populations of the pests. "No one likes to be out the time and money it takes to control insects, but there are times when control by insecticides is the only economical solution," he pointed out.
