Public Schools Week Announced

Motley County School will observe "Texas Public Schools Week," with special features from Monday, Feb. 28 through Friday, March 4. This will be a week earlier than the formal state-wide observance, according to Arnold Parker, schools principal. Highlight of the week will be a Variety Show Friday night starting at 7:30 in the high school auditorium. This will replace the amateur competition which the school has staged for a number of years. Matador Lions Club will meet at the school luncheon Tuesday for its regular meeting, a custom followed in the past.

Wednesday is designated as parents' visitation day. Parents are invited to eat in the lunchroom with their children, and to visit the class rooms. Prices of

lunches will be \$1.35 for adults and 55 cents for preschoolers.

Elementary grades will have displays in various rooms throughout the week. It was further announced.

"Texas Public Schools Week was organized in 1950 so that community members might have the opportunity to observe first-hand how their local public school system operates.

"Citizens of the county are invited to pay us a visit," the school officials stated. "It is our aim to help students develop personal knowledge, skills and competence to maximum capacity. We attempt to teach behaviour patterns which will make each one a responsible member of society. We welcome public evaluation of our efforts during Texas Public Schools Week."

Try-outs for the Variety Show announced for Friday, 7:30 p.m. March 4 at the Motley County School auditorium, were held Monday and first rehearsals set for Friday morning.

Suspects Moved From Crosbyton

One of the two men charged with the murder of Motley County Sheriff Jalmar "Jinks" Wilson remains in Lubbock County Jail following his transfer Thursday from Crosbyton.

Stacy Albert Carter, 25, of Olivia, N.C., was taken to Lubbock on a court order, after his attorneys, John Montford and Mark Hall of Lubbock, requested the move, reportedly to be able to communicate more easily with their client.

Carter and Larry Cornell Fortenberry, 28, of Mount Hermon, La., each have been charged with capital murder, attempted murder, aggravated robbery and prohibited use of a motor vehicle.

Wilson was shotgunned to death and John D. Rogers, also of Matador, was wounded by two men about 11:40 a.m. Nov. 12, 1976 about three miles east of Matador on U.S. 70. Department of Public Safety trooper Kenneth Witt arrested Carter and Fortenberry about two hours later eight miles from Crosbyton on U.S. 82.

Fortenberry was transferred to the Hale County Jail Feb. 1, at the similar request of his attorneys, Joe Cox and Steve Hurt of Plainview. (Lubbock Avalanche-Journal)

Cotton Production Meeting Announced

A meeting designed to help cotton producers increase their returns is scheduled Wednesday, March 2, starting at 2:00 p.m. in the Motley County courthouse.

Dr. Dave Weaver, Extension Weed Control Specialist from College Station will cover weed control; Jim Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, Lubbock, will cover soil fertility; and Dr. Dale Lovelace, Area Agronomist, Vernon, will cover varieties and production items.

This team of Extension Service specialists have been secured by Extension Agent Bill Pallmeyer to bring the

latest information to local producers as recommended by members of the Program Building Committee, a group of local people who help plan the programs needed for the county.

According to Pallmeyer, this county needs held. "When you look at the production records of Dickens, King, Cottle, Childress and Hall counties and see that their yield per acre is greater than Motley County, something needs to be done," he stressed. "Local producers are the ones who are missing out on this added income. Are you getting the production from your cotton that you would like? If not, attend this important meeting."

Despite a childhood accident which forces him to kick with an artificial leg from the knee down, Brian Hall has become one of the top kicking specialists in Texas Tech history. He has lettered three years as a varsity athlete at Tech and led the team in scoring in 1975. Through the first eight games of 1976 he again led the Red Raiders in scoring and is ranked among the

nation's leaders in both scoring and field goal kicking.

Hall is an extremely personable and talented young man. In December he was named winner of the Kern Tips Memorial Award as the outstanding senior football player in the Southwest Conference.

The award is given each year in honor of the late S.W.C. radio broadcaster. It is based on athletic ability, academic standing, good sportsmanship and high moral character.

Texas Tech head football coach Steve Sloan said, "It is a rare privilege, indeed, when a football coach has the opportunity to be associated with a young man who possesses the courage, ability and love for life as does Brian Hall. He is one of the most outstanding young men I have ever known. Not only has he done an excellent job on the field for us, his presence alone means a lot. Brian Hall is an incredible young man - one of a kind."

He is active in many campus activities and also is a much sought after speaker for banquets and award dinners in the West Texas area. His good humor and readiness to accept a challenge have made him a favorite of audiences.
