An injury ended Hoang's military service and he entered medical school at the University of Saigon College of Medicine, graduating in 1978 as an M.D.

Hoang and his family were forced to flee the country, in 1979, to escape communist oppression. In the United States,

Hoang enrolled in college at the University of Utah earning a BS in Pre-Med and graduating Cum Laude in 1985 before continuing on to graduate from the College of Osteopathic Medicine, in Pomona, California, as a Doctor of Osteopathy.

Hoang is a member of the American

College of OB/GYN and a member of American Osteopathic Association. he served as Medical Director of Concept Inc. in Rehabilitation from March 1990 to present. Hoang also served as Emergency Room Physician for Southwest Medical Association Inc. from August 1990 until present with more than 4000 hours working in different hospitals in

Dr. Hoang and his wife, Lisa Le have six children. Two of the children are in six cinidral. Two of the children are in college in California and one son who will be a senior. They also have one 12 year old daughter and two sons, ages 6 and 4 1/2. Lisa is a certified medical assistant and will be helping her husband at the clinic



Dallas -- More than 90 percent of all vegetable crops recommended for spring production in North Central Texas also can be planted in the fall, according to Steve George, Extension horticulture specialist. In fact, several crops do much better in the cooler temperature of fall

than in the fieat of late Spring.

George and other Texas A&M horticulturists are commending Surefire, a newtomato variety, one of the best choices for fall vegetable gardening. Transplants of Surefire will be available the first week in July in nurseries and garden centers across North Central Texas.

When shopping for Surefire trans-plants, select dark green plants, six to eight inches tall, with stocky stems and well-developed rootsystems. Transplants under stress can be identified by their light green color with purplish veins on the undersides of leaves, small narrow leaves and spindly stems. Stressed plants never give top performance and should

never give top performance and should be avoided.

When planting transplants, set them slightly deeper than they originally grew so lower leaves are close to the ground. If only leggy plants are available, lay them down in a shallow trench long enough to leave only the top six inches of the plant exposed after covering the root ball and lower stem. Roots will then develop along the buried portion of the stem. Plant transthe buried portion of the stem. Plant transplants or sow seed as soon as possible.

Surefire is also the first vegetable to be designated as "Earth-Kind" by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. When the "Earth-Kind" system for fall tomato production is followed, this variety produces abundant yields with a minimum, or even total elimination, or pesticides.

Criteria for this new system include: raised beds amply amended with organic material.

Social Security Tips

SOCIAL SECURITY REMINDERS FOR THE SELF-EMPLOYED

Iknow there are many men and women in our community who would like to join the ranks of the more than 10 million self-employed Americans. If you are wondering whether now is the right time to become an entrepreneur, I can only site. Calvin Coolidge's observation that "business will be better or worse."

If you think business will be better and take the nlunger you need to be aware that

take the plunge, you need to be aware that self-employed individuals have special responsibilities with regard to their Social Security coverage. For example, the self-employed pay a Social Security tax equal to the combined rate paid by employees.

equal to the combined rate paid by employees and employers.

This year the Social Security tax rate for the self-employed is 15.3 percent on earnings up to \$55,500. Another 2.9 percent on earnings up to \$130,200 pays for Medicare coverage.

If you start a business and have net earnings of more than \$400 in self-employment, you must file a federal income tax return and pay any federal taxes due-and the Social Security tax. The tax is reported on Schedule C (Profit and Loss From Business or Profession) or, where appropriate, Schedule F (Farm Income and Expresses) and Schedule SF (Company State Company Stat and Expenses) and Schedule SE (Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax.)

If you have both wages and self-em-ployment income, you should first figure the amount of wages on which you have paid Social Security taxes and then add your self-employment earnings up to the limits I mentioned earlier. If your wages alone exceed these limits, you do not past Social Security taxes on the additional income earned in self-employment.
