Born in Hanoi, May 1, 1950, Hoang moved to Saigon in 1952 and fought in the Vietnam War as an Ensign in the South Vietnamese Navy.

An injury ended Hoang's military service and he entered medical school at the University of Saigon College of Medicine, graduating in 1978 as an M.D.

Hoang and his family were forced to flee the country, in 1979, to escape communist oppression. In the United States,

Hoang enrolled in college at the University of Utah earning a BS in Pre-Med and graduating Cum Laude in 1985 before continuing on to graduate from the College of Osteopathic Medicine, in Pomona, California, as a Doctor of Osteopathy.

Hoang is a member of the American

College of OB/GYN and a member of American Osteopathic Association. He served as Medical Director of Concept Inc. in Rehabilitation from March 1990 to present. Hoang also served as Emergency Room Physician for Southwest Medical Association Inc. from August 1990 until present with more than 4000 hours working in different hospitals in West Texas.

Dr. Hoang and his wife, Lisa Le have six children. Two of the children are in college in California and one son who will be a senior. They also have one 12 year old daughter and two sons, ages 6 and 4 1/2. Lisa is a certified medical assistant and will be helping her husband at the clinic.

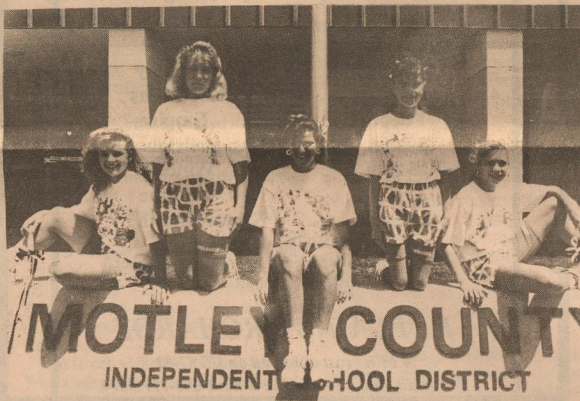
The Hoangs will move into their new home at 800 West Missouri this weekend. Plans are currently underway for a reception to honor the Hoangs and welcome them to the community.

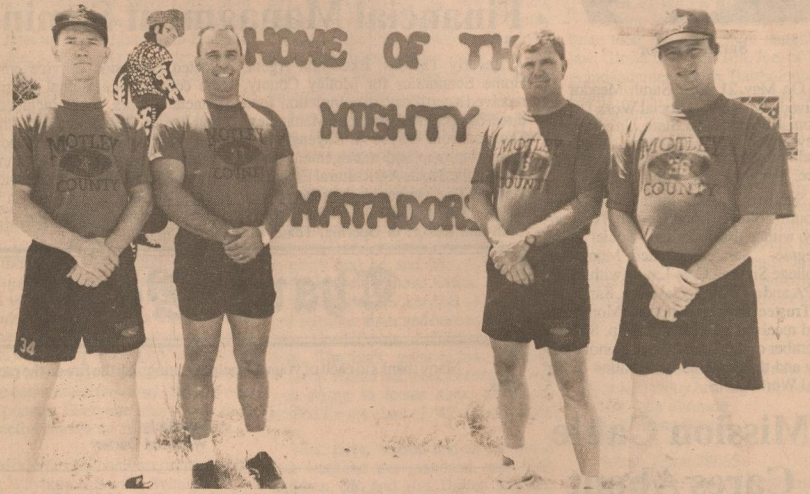

Charles Prather, from Southland ISD and Lubbock, will be coaching the Off-

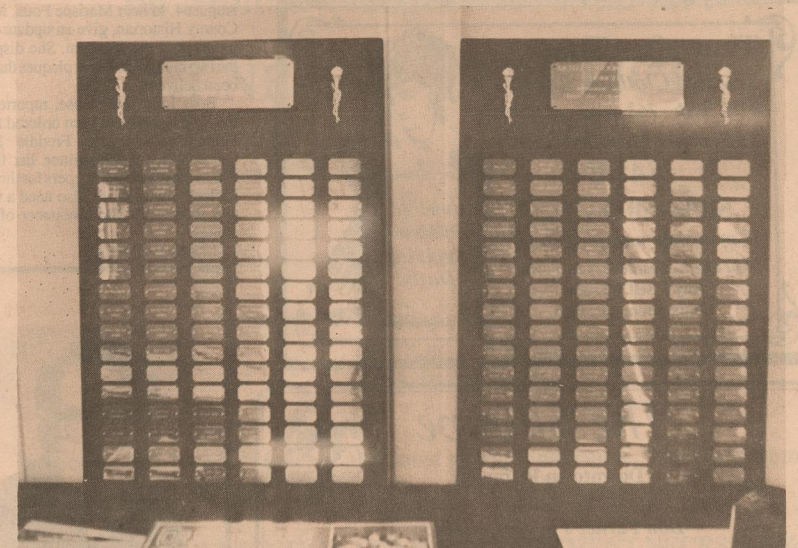
sive Line and Defensive Line as well as Boys Basketball.

Beverly Vinson shared items designated for the "school" room, the school desk donated by Anna B. Cloyd, the school bell from the colored school, and a U.S. flag with 48 stars.

Joyce Campbell is in charge of the operating room and trying to locate items

which once furnished the hospital lobby. Next to the snack area with the nickle peanut machine and nickle coke machine,

Joyce and Leo Archer will display a collection of working phonographs, from the wind-up Victrola types to a fifties style record player.

After the meeting adjourned Donnie Anderson Jenkins related the history of the original hospital building in which she had resided as a nurse.

Another branding board will be started and when all are finished will hang in the long hall on the lower floor.

Exciting things are beginning to happen at the Motley County Museum.

## Home Economically Speaking

### SIDEBAR - FALL TOMATO OFFERS SUREFIRE HARVEST

Dallas -- More than 90 percent of all vegetable crops recommended for spring production in North Central Texas also can be planted in the fall, according to Steve George, Extension horticulture specialist. In fact, several crops do much better in the cooler temperature of fall than in the heat of late Spring.

George and other Texas A&M horticulturists are commending Surefire, a new tomato variety, one of the best choices for fall vegetable gardening. Transplants of Surefire will be available the first week in July in nurseries and garden centers across North Central Texas.

When shopping for Surefire transplants, select dark green plants, six to eight inches tall, with stocky stems and well-developed root systems. Transplants under stress can be identified by their light green color with purplish veins on the undersides of leaves, small narrow leaves and spindly stems. Stressed plants never give top performance and should be avoided.

When planting transplants, set them slightly deeper than they originally grew so lower leaves are close to the ground. If only leggy plants are available, lay them down in a shallow trench long enough to leave only the top six inches of the plant exposed after covering the root ball and lower stem. Roots will then develop along the buried portion of the stem. Plant transplants or sow seed as soon as possible.

Surefire is also the first vegetable to be designated as "Earth-Kind" by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. When the "Earth-Kind" system for fall tomato production is followed, this variety produces abundant yields with a minimum, or even total elimination, of pesticides.

Criteria for this new system include:  
— raised beds amply amended with organic material.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are for people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap, or national origin.

## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer a new optional service called Remote Access to Call Forwarding (RACF) on a permanent basis beginning September 7, 1992.

RACF is an optional service that is intended for use by residence and business customers. RACF permits a customer who subscribes to the optional service Call Forwarding to activate, deactivate or change the Call Forwarding destination from a location other than the customer's premises. In order for RACF to function, it must be accessed from a push-button telephone.

The proposed monthly rate for RACF for residence customers is \$1.00, and the proposed monthly rate for business customers is \$2.75. These rates are in addition to the rates for basic local exchange service and regular Call Forwarding. (The monthly rates for Call Forwarding are \$2.10 for residence customers and \$2.65 for business customers.)

RACF is expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$643,000.

Persons who wish to comment on this application, which has been assigned Tariff Control Number 11316, should notify the PUC by August 28, 1992. ## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to begin charging \$3.00 per bill, for duplicate paper copies of a customer's bill up to 15 pages. If the customer's bill exceeds 15 pages, an additional five cents per page will apply. If the customer's bill is lost or mutilated for reasons other than negligence by the customer, no charge for a duplicate copy will apply if a customer notifies Southwestern Bell within 60 days of the billing date. The effective date of this application is December 4, 1992.

If approved by the PUC, this application will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$835,000, which is an increase of approximately two one-hundredths of 1 percent (.02 percent) in the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1991. The application could affect all of the Company's approximately 4.6 million residence customers and all of its approximately 575,000 business customers should they choose to request duplicate copies of their bills.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline to intervene is August 7, 1992. ## Social Security Tips

### SOCIAL SECURITY REMINDERS FOR THE SELF-EMPLOYED

I know there are many men and women in our community who would like to join the ranks of the more than 10 million self-employed Americans. If you are wondering whether now is the right time to become an entrepreneur, I can only cite Calvin Coolidge's observation that "business will be better or worse."

If you think business will be better and take the plunge, you need to be aware that self-employed individuals have special responsibilities with regard to their Social Security coverage. For example, the self-employed pay a Social Security tax equal to the combined rate paid by employees and employers.

This year the Social Security tax rate for the self-employed is 15.3 percent on earnings up to \$55,500. Another 2.9 percent on earnings up to \$130,200 pays for Medicare coverage.

If you start a business and have net earnings of more than \$400 in self-employment, you must file a federal income tax return and pay any federal taxes due and the Social Security tax. The tax is reported on Schedule C (Profit and Loss From Business or Profession) or, where appropriate, Schedule F (Farm Income and Expenses) and Schedule SE (Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax.)

If you have both wages and self-employment income, you should first figure the amount of wages on which you have paid Social Security taxes and then add your self-employment earnings up to the limits I mentioned earlier. If your wages alone exceed these limits, you do not pay Social Security taxes on the additional income earned in self-employment.
