DELEGATES MAKE REPORTS ON MYTHICAL GOVERNMENT TRIPS

Four young people from Motley County have received publicity for recent trips, which they have admitted taking.

These "trips" however were not the LSD kind which have been

so widely publicized in recent years.

Three of the youth made reports of their trips, Monday night at regular monthly meeting of the American Legion and Auxiliary.

Miss Jan Higginbotham, a delegate to Girls State held this year at Seguin, declared that she was "proud of Girls State and proud of being a Texan." Although a tight daily schedule was maintained, the girls, who were there from all over the state, learned the methods of government by performing the duties pertaining to various offices. Miss Higginbotham served in the House of Representatives. "The experience was rewarding, enriching, and has had a definite effect on my thinking," she declared. "One has a deeper feeling of loyalty, sportsmanship, love for fellowman and respect for our country."

"Learn By Doing"

Clarence Woosley, Matador and David Hunter, Flomot, delegates to Boys State in Austin, also learned the functions of government by "doing."

"Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties—the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functioned as a member of his party, attending precinct, county and state conventions and voting in its primary," Woosley explained.

"Highlight of Boys State was a trip to the Capitol on Friday morning, where each elected Boys State Official was given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day. Climaxing the day was the Governor's Ball Friday evening, with girls attending from Austin and surrounding towns," Hunter reported.

Boys State enrollment this year brought the total to 14,939 high school junior boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Post Commander J. M. Thacker announced that Motley County had participated in the program since 1949, and introduced as special guests, former delegates to Boys State. They were Boyd Long of Roaring Springs, who attended in 1957, and Jeff Thacker the 1969 delegate.

Former Girls State delegates present included Carol Martin and Judy Marris of Matador and Cathy Clem of Roaring Springs. Miss Higginbotham was introduced by Mrs. Fred Simpson of the Legion Auxiliary. The other delegate to Girls State, Lucy Reed of Flomot, was unable to be present due to illness in her family.

Other special guests at the meeting, introduced by Commander Thacker, were District Commander Dennis Holland and Mrs. Holland of Dodson, and District President-Elect of the Auxiliary, Mrs. Joyce Webster, and Mr. Webster of Memphis. Also guests at the meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hunter of Flomot.

REPORT TO LIONS MADE BY YOUTHS

FIRST meeting in the new fiscal year of the Matador Lions Club included a program of reports by two local youths. Clarence Woosley and Jan Higginbotham, who recently returned from attending Boys State and Girls State. They were sponsored by the American Legion and Auxiliary.

Both of the young people made brief, concise reports of their experiences. Young Woosley, introduced by Lion Douglas Meador, said he was elected to the mythical House of Representatives at Boys State held at the University of Texas. He was impressed by the addresses he heard made by state leaders. "I think what impressed me most was the experience of learning by doing," he declared, "and we all certainly have a better understanding of the operation of our city, county and state governments."

Miss Higginbotham, who attended Girls State at Seguin, was impressed by the resolutions which may become our laws. "I learned," she declared, "that bills go to committees which consider them . . . that if someone wishes to have a voice in a bill, they must go before a committee where they will be heard . . . going before a committee and voting are the only two methods to make your voice heard." She discussed briefly the state constitution written in 1876, and the many laws which no longer apply to modern life. She said many favored that it be completely rewritten but that the plan was meeting with much opposition.

New Well Started At Roaring Springs

AFTER being dormant for many months the oil industry became active in the west Roaring Springs Field this week. Surface pipe was set Monday night on the Fremont location about 3½ miles east of Roaring Springs.

Location of the well is north of the FM road in the vicinity of the Q.A.P. Railway right of way and near proven production.

Drilling is being done by Jack Bearden Drilling Co. of Wichita Falls and the operator is E. B. Backer of Dallas.

Other interest in the oil business is the leasing of several tracts of land south of Tongue River, near the south county line and into Dickens County near the north border.

The two Roaring Springs Fields with approximately 30 producing wells have produced a substantial share of the county's economy for a number of years.

The revival of oil interest is always welcome by land owners and especially at this period when crop and range conditions are unfavorable as a result of extended dry, hot weather.
