

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I'm writing this letter to acknowledge this honorable accomplishments of a good friend and classmate, a former resident of Matador, and a graduate of the Matador High School class of '65 - William "Butch" Waybourn. Butch lives in Washington D.C. and is the founder and director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, an or-canization that provides campaien funds Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, an or-ganization that provides campaign funds and assistance to openly-gay and lesbian political candidates across the United States. Among many others, the Victory Fund recently helped elect Texas State Representative Glen Maxey. The Vic-tory Fund is presently helping fund a campaign to remove the ban against homosexuals in the Armed Forces. A few weeks ago, Butch and a handful of other national gay and lesbian leaders of other national gay and lesbian leaders met with President Bill Clinton at the White House. This was an historical moment because it marked the first time in history that the President had ever conducted an official meeting in the White House with members af the gay and les-

bian community. I recently spoke with Butch and he told me that part of the conversation he had with President Clinton revolved around the similarities of their growing-up in the small towns of Matador, Texas and Hope, Arkansas. As a lifetime subscriber to the Mata-

As a lifetime subscriber to the Mata-dor Tribune, I have been saddened, an-gered, and somewhat dismayed at the vitriolic statements made by some sanc-timonious, closed-minded citizens whohave written editorial comments for the Tribune. I was astounded by the comment from a subscriber who stated comment from a subscriber who stated that if he was a "corpman" (sic) on the battlefield, he would allow a gay person to bleed to death before he would provide any assistance. Perhaps that writer should be informed that if the situation was re-versed, he wouldn't have to worry about versed, he wouldn't have to worry about such a dereliction of duty. All medical units of U.S. armed forces are composed of a high percentage of homosexuals, all of whom perform their duties regardless of a person's sexual status. Not every gay man has AIDS; the armed forces routeinely screens applicants for the pres-ence of HIV. AIDS aside, morally it is offensive that anyone, especially some-one from Motley County, would ever one from Motley County, would ever turn his back on a dying human being -gay or straight. Perhaps that myopic edi-torialist should be reminded of the Golden torialist should be reminded of the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Our Constitution recognizes that "all men arc created equal" and instills in each of us a right to the "pursuit of happiness". This right should not be denied simply because some feel threatened, frightened, or angered by the

threatened, frightened, or angered by the sexual status others possess from birth. All Americans, and especially the citi-zens of Motley County, should be proud of Butch Waybourn. He is standing up for the same principles which freed Ameri-cans from the yoke of a British monar-chy, freed African-Americans from the



oppressions of slavery, and granted equal rights, suffrage, and the right to serve in the military to both African-Americans the military to both African-Americans and women. In the final analysis, we all want to be able to look back on our lives and ask ourselves, "did I do anything to make this place a better world for oth-ers"? Regardless of how you feel person-ally about William "Butch" Waybourn and the principles and values he stands for, Butch Waybourn will be able to answer that question with a resounding "YES".

Local Producers Required 'To Keep Records On Pesticide Use ness and other information in which you

As of May 10, 1993, new United States Department of Agriculture regulations requires all certified pesticide applica-tors, including private applicators, to maintain records for each restricted-use pesticide they use. Currently, there is not a standardized Federal record keeping form. The regula-tons require basic information to be main-

tained on restricted use pesticide applications.

The recordkeeping requirements are: (1) The brand or product name of the restricted use pesticide that was applied; (2) The EPA registration number of

(2) The EFA registration number of the pesticide;(3) The total amount of the restricted

use pesticide applied; (4) The location of the treatment; (5) Size of the area treated;

(6) Crop, commodity, or stored prod-uct to which the restricted use pesticide

was applied; (7) Month, day and year of applica-(8) Name and certification number of

All commercial applicators are re-quired to provide a copy of restricted pesticide applications to customers within 30 days of each treatment.

The above information is only required by the USDA for restricted use pesticide applications. In order to further protect yourself as a certified applicator, I en-courage you to also include additional weather conditions such as wind speed and direction, relative humidity, cloudi-

feel is relevant. These records must be retained for 2 years from the date of application. Indi-viduals are not required at this time to submit the information to any govern-mental entity. However, if requested by an authorized representative, the certi-fied annificator must provide access to refied applicator must provide access to restricted use pesticide records. Applica-tors will be surveyed by officials respon-sible for developing a national pesticide

use report. Fines and penalities will be assessed for violation of the Federal pesticide recordkeeping requirements. Violators include private and commercial applica-tors who refuse to maintain appropriate records or provide access to authorized representatives of the Secretary of Agri-culture or designated state agencies.

These requirements are only for feder-ally restricted use pesticides. At this time there are no recordkeeping regulations for general use pesticides. However, new and updated environmental regulations

As a farmer or rancher, I would get in the habit of keeping and maintaining accurate records on all pesticides (re-stricted, state-limited, and general use) applied. Accurate recordkeeping of pes-ticide use may help keep you in business and out of the court room.




