What Senate Bill 7 Means To Motley County ISD

Most people have read Articles dealing with the new finance bill (SB7) passed by the legislature to equalize school funding

The most significant affect of the new bill is most schools will receive less state aid (rich or poor) causing school districts to rely more on local taxes to operate their schools.

4. The effective tax rate for 1993-1994 is \$1.12, (an effective tax rate is the amount of taxes required to raise the same amount of revenue that was needed the preceding upon).

The basic impact of SB7 on Motley County ISD will be:

1. Basic allotment per student was dropped from \$2400.00 per student to \$2300.00 per student. Motley County will lose approximately \$27,000.00 in

2. Local incentive was dropped from \$22.50 to \$20.00 per WADA. Motley County will lose approximately \$20,000.00.

3. School districts are required to raise



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
