these standards in your kitchen: — Does your refrigerator maintain a temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below and the freezer 0 degrees F. or below? The only way to verify this is to use an appliance thermometer. — Are the contents of the refrigerator

— Are the contents of the retrigerator arranged so that cold air can circulate freely throughout? Are most perishable foods such as eggs, milk, meats, poultry, fish and other protein foods stored in the coldest areas of the refrigerator, never on the door? Eggs should be stored in the critical carton.


tion Area continued to be an important project for Sarpalius, as he recently accomplished opening up about 7,000 acres


