
The report is a compilation of the best recommendations gleaned from more 10 years of Texas School Performance Reviews conducted by the comptroller's office.

#### SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATION DEADLINE NEARING

Producers are reminded that Thursday, May 25, 2003 is the final date to certify small grains. If a measurement service is requested, a producer still must report the acreage by May 15th and sign a measurment service request. The new Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program requires that all cropland acreage must be accurately reported.

#### **CRP SIGNUP** ANNOUNCED, MOTLEY **COUNTY INELIGIBLE**

CRP signup #26 is scheduled for May 5 through May 30, 2003. Motley County has reached the 25% cropland limitation for the

#### COTTONSEED ASSISTANCE REGULATIONS PUBLISHED IN FEDERAL REGISTER APRIL 25

The application is in the mail for the 2002 Cottonseed Assistance program according to the USDA Farm Service Agency. FSA Administrator Jim Little announced the first step in the process to distribute 2003 Cottonseed Assistance payments in a press release dated April 23, 2003.

Cottonseed program applica-tions are currently being mailed to gins that operated in 2002. Officially the application period for the program runs from May 2 through May 23, 2003. Com-pleted forms must be submitted to FSA headquarters by May 23, 2003 in order to be considered for payment.

All companies that ginned 2002-crop cotton are eligible for program payments. Payments are expected to be made in early June 2003.

Payments will be made in accordance with the provisions of the final regulations published in the Federal Register April 25, 2003.

The 2002 Cottonseed program provides some \$50 million to offset 2002 crop cottonseed price shortfalls.

Payment rates will be determined based on the number of applications and resulting ton-nage of cottonseed for which assitance is requested. USDA estimates that payment rates for the 2002 program will be in the neighborhood of \$8.00 per ton, or about \$3.00 per bale. Ginners who do not receive

#### GAREDEN CHECKLIST **FOR MAY, 2003**

By Dr. William C. Welch, Professor & Landscape Horticulturist Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas.

\* Cut off old blossoms on spring-flowering annuals such as pansies, snapdragons, stock, and calendulas to prolong the flowering season.

\*Continue to fertilize roses every four to six weeks with small amounts of a balanced fer-

tilizer. \*Allow foliage of spring-flowering bulbs to mature and yel-

low before removing. \*Set out plants of portulaca and purslane in sunny areas. Root cuttings of your favorite colors by placing 3-to-4-inch

stems in moist, sandy soils, \* It is not to late to sow directly into seeds of sunflower, zinna, morning glory, portulaca, marigold, cosmos, periwinkles, and gourds. Achimenes, cannas, dahlias, and other summer-flowering bulbs can also be planted in May.

\*Pinch back the terminal growth on newly planted annual and perennial plants. This will result in shorter, more compact, well branched plants with more flowers.

\*Time to plant caladium tubers, impatiens, coleus, begonias, and pentas in sliady areas.

\* Make cuttings of your favorite chrysanthemums and root them in a mixture of sand and peat moss. Cover cutting box with plastic and place in shaded area for 5 or 6 days to prevent

\*Replace or replenish mulch materials in flower beds and shrub borders to conserve moisture and reduce weed growth.

\*Prune climbing roses as they complete their spring bloom season. Remove dead or weak wood as needed.

#### **MORE WEIGHT - MORE** DOLLARS, BUT HOW **MUCH MORE?**

In a recent national beef cattle magazine, some figures were presented on a set of weaned calves kept for awhile, during which time they gained 43lb. It was calculated that, at a price of \$90/cwt, that extra weight was worth \$38.70. But, do you get all of that? Only if the calves would have sold for \$90 both before and after. Let's say the calves started at 500lb and wound up at 543lb. According to last week's USDA-reported Average Summary for 22 Texas Auctions, if 543 lb calves brought \$90, then 500lb calves would

have brought \$92.78. Those 43lb were worth \$38.70. But, in effect, the first 500lb was revalued at \$90/cwt or a reduction of \$13.90 per calf. So, the net increase in dollars per calf was \$28.80, not \$38.90. Looked at another way, those extra 43lbs were not worth \$90/cwt, they were worth only about \$57/cwt. If you can put the extra weight on for less than that, it'll pay. If you can't, it won't. Remember, cattle generally bring less per pound the heavier they get. Figure that into your operation, or you may be disappointed.

#### ANGUS AND CHAROLIAS -STILL SOME DIFFERENCES

Angus and Charolias are the two European breeds most frequently mentioned in today's marketing alliances. While these two breeds have become more similar over the years in size and growth, there are still some big differences in carcass factors. The U.S. Meat Animal Research Center sampled those two breeds and compared them as sires on mature cows.

Charolias-sired steers averaged almost 1 sq. in. larger ribeyes with only 0.34 inch fat cover, compared to Angus-sired with 0.58 fat, so Charolais had Yield Grades of 2.7 compared to 3.6 for Angus. On the other hand, Angus-sired graded 95% Choice, compared to 69% for Charolias-

#### FEED EFFICIENCY VS. FEEDING BEHAVIOR

We've generally thought that better-doing cattle were more consistent in eating habits. That may not be true. Oklahoma and Canadian researchers collabrated on a study measuring individual feeding activity. Steers were classified into HI, AVG, and LO groups based on feed efficiency. As was expected, HI steers consumed more total feed, but they also had greater variation in daily feed consump-tion. And HI went to feed bunk more often, but spent less total time eating.

Kids would rather dig in the dirt than read about it in a classroom. And many rural children have the luxury of doing just that. With thousands of Texas children living on farms or ranches, learning about the science of agriculture and the environment firsthand, real life experiences translate into education.

Unfortunately, kids in larger cities don't have this day-to-day exposure. But it's increasingly important for the message to be heard loud and clear - farmers and ranchers provide the food, fiber and horticultural products that keep our communities - and the world - moving forward. It's a concept that's not easy to grasp unless it is seen or felt firsthand. And the Texas Department of Agriculture has been giving urban kids the opportunity to do just that, with dozens of elementary schoolchildren around the state getting their hands dirty with agricultural ojects in urban settings.

Since its inception in 1999, TDA's Urban School Grant Program has been offering grants to urban elementary public schools in districts with populations of 49,000 or more. The schools use the money, which is now funded solely through donations, to create agricultural projects like butterfly gardens or vegetable gardens right in their own backyards. Since the program began, TDA has awarded more than \$50,000 to fund 22 projects across the state, and about 10 more projects were approved this spring.

These grants help bring the wonder of agriculture to urban classrooms. For many students, this is an eye-opening experience, as they get a true taste of how we grow our food, fiber and horticultural products.


