

Michael Crowley, Sr., Minister of the Roaring Springs and Matador Church of Christ, presented a moving tribute to Frank Mitchell and all Veterans during the special ceremony to dedicate Frank Mitchell Memorial Loop, Tuesday, November 11th, at Roaring Springs.

officially dedicated the Frank Mitchell Memorial Loop, Tuesday, November 11, with a special ceremony. Mayor Corky Marshall welcomed the crowd and introduced Michael Crowley, Minister of the Matador and Roaring Springs Church of Christ, who presented the dedication.

Mr. Crowley presented the following moving tribute:

"The phrase 'Congressional Medal of Honor' causes pause. It causes us to reflect upon all that it means. There is a certain in-take of breath when it is mention in the presence of those who understand its meaning.

We are here today to dedicate this loop to the memory of Frank Mitchell. This monument, the highway loop will stand as a mute testimony to the great sacrifice Frank made to guarantee us and his country, the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. There will

his sacrifice. And so, we are gathered here today at this place to re-

member and pay homage to the gallant young man who was so willing to make the ultimate sacrifice for the cause of freedom. We must however, keep in mind that those freedoms so

dearly paid for in blood by our nations' finest, can, unless guarded very carefully, be lost in just one careless generation.

Abe Lincoln - "A nation with no regard for its past will have little worth remembering in its future.'

John Adams - "I am well aware of the toil, and blood, and treasure, that it will cost to maintain this declaration, and support and defend these states. I can see that the end is worth more than all the means. To those who sacrificed for our freedom, the end was worth the painful means. Where will we be

today and pay the price to insure America's Freedom."

"Posterity - you will never know how much it has costs my generation to preserve your freedom. I hope you will make good use of it." John Quincy Adams.

"What we obtain too cheaply, we esteem too lightly; it is dearness only that gives everything its value. Heaven knows how to put a price upon its goods and it would be strange indeed if so celestial an article as freedom should not be highly rated." Thomas Payne,

Frank exercised leadership initiative by that appropriate action in the absence of orders. He did not compromise his integrity nor his moral courage. He did not forget nor let his men forget that they were professionals.

Senior Citizens Center will hold fund-raisers to match grants

Citizens Center will be holding fund raisers in the near future to raise funds in order to match grants. The Center is currently applying for a grant, through the County, for an addition to the building to be used for additional kitchen room and storage. A cash match of \$5,400 must be raised locally. An additional cost will be an Administration Share Cost fee that will be paid to AAA in the amount of \$1,724.04.

Matador Volunteer Fire Department awarded grant

Matador Volunteer Fire Department was one of eleven communities in Texas which recently received a grant through the 2003 Assistance to Firefighters Grant program. Michael D. Brown, Under

Secretary of Homeland Security for Emergency Preparedness and Response, announced the 242 grants to fire departments throughout the U.S. in the twenty-first round of the program, November 6. The grants will ultimately total approximately 7,000 awards worth \$750 million in direct assistance to firefighters. In addition to Matador, ten other communities in Texas were also awarded grants, including Avery, Orange, Howardwick, El Paso, Brazos, Wall, Dripping Springs, Beasley, Glenn Heights and Hutto.

"In California we have seen the benefits of the suppression efforts made by the nation's fire fighters, and it underscores the importance of putting fire grant funds directly into the communities," said Brown. "President Bush, Homeland Security and FEMA are committed to the prevention and preparedness of all fires, as we are to providing firefighters with the critical financial support they need, through the AFG program."





Plans were made for the Christmas Party. Nova Dale will



History of Library outlined at Open House

Motley County Library held a special celebration Sunday afternoon, November 9, giving patrons a chance to see the new bookshelves, carpeting and murals. A standing room only crowd gathered and heard Mrs. Virginia Taylor of Floydada present a very entertaining 'cowboy poem' (printed elsewhere in this edition), and Ms. Marisue Potts present a history

of the Library.
Mrs. Potts stated in her presentation that Librarian Suzanne Abbott had recently related to the Lions Club, "The library of today is not the library of your mothers." What we see today is a modern, up to date facility that uses all the technology that the West Texas Library System can muster out of the benevolence of the state of Texas.

In her report, Ms. Potts, said that the Library was first established in Matador by the El Progresso Study Club in 1929 with each member donating one book. Mrs. Mary Keith served as librarian. The number of volumes grew to 600, but with no facilities available to house the books, the project was handed over to the Matador public

A movement in 1969 was spearheaded by the Eternas Jr. Study Club to establish a county library in the courthouse, but after learning that county taxes would increase 10% to maintain the library, plans again fell

In 1980 a survey by the West Texas Library System turned up counties that were not served by libraries, Motley County being one of the few. Coordinator Jim Schwepke met with citizens to garner support for founding a library A commit-tee of four, Michelle Bearden, Marie Linson, Ronnie Thacker and Syd Pipkin, set up a telephone survey to poll county residents on their interest and received overwhelming support for the project. At the next county commissioners meeting a group approached the court for funding. The committee of four, with the addition of Darla Gwinn, were appointed as board members.

Ms. Potts continued, "To these five board members," related Michelle Bearden Jeffers, "this library meant ever so much more than simply a room full of books. With the reading of books comes knowledge; with knowledge the Board could envision a community of people reaching toward personal growth and enrichment which might actually perpetuate the taste for progress.'

The five women, with the help of the coordinator, researched and sent their application to Austin. They were given a one-year trial, by the Motley County School Board to use a room in the old Elementary School. In June of 1981 the board learned that Motley County was the recipient of a \$20,000 establishment grant With the application of Beverly Darsey, a teacher with a Library Science minor, the Library was

In October, 1981, the official grand opening honored special guests State Representative Foster Whaley, Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, and Coordinator Jim Schwepke. County funding amounted to \$4,000 in 1981, the City of Matador, \$200; the City of Roaring Springs, \$100; and \$1,000 from Friends of the Li-

brary. After the May, 1984 tornado destroyed the new school, the rooms that housed the library were needed for classes. The American Legion came to the rescue by offering the front of their building and the library was relocated.

In October, 1985, Sarah Hurt took over Librarian duties. Although library board members appreciated the use of the American Legion building, they longed for a home. With funds from the proceeds of the Sesquicentennial celebration, a Roaring Springs Cookbook, History Day at the Ranch, Lions Club light bulb sale, and others, an account to buy a building was established.

Geneva Wilson made available the rock clad county barn, and a trade was eventually made with Sonny Russell for the Commercial Grocery building, which had been used for storage for many years.

After much restoration to the building, January 9, 1988, found another open house cel-

Ms. Potts said, in closing, "Today we find the library, not that of our mothers, but one specially molded to the needs of a society that is rapidly changing. As Michelle wrote: "That which was just an idea is indeed a reality now. So much time, work and effort has gone into realizing this dream of having a library - is that a grand thing to accomplish?"

Motley County School has been awarded two Tech Prep grants totaling approximately \$4000. These grants will be used to purchase accounting instructional supplies, a digital camera, a scanner and a color laser printer. These grants were written by Cathey Turner with the assistance of Shelley Cox.

Tech Prep is a program that encourages students to take classes that will lead to employability in a timely fashion after high school. Through the program, students can earn articulated credit in selected high school vocational classes. This means that students earn high school credit and credit at a community college at the same time. These classes are taken and credits are awarded without costs to the student. Motley County ISD is able to offer the following classes for articulated credit: BCIS I and II, Accounting, and Child Development.

Veterans' Oral History project announced

The annual Veterans' Day Program at Motley County High School was held Tuesday, November 11, 2003. One of the highlights of this year's program was the announcement of a new project to honor Motley County Veterans. The following is the text of the presentation made by Stachia Baxter, President of the Motley County High School Student Council:

For a number of years, the

Motley County High School Stu-dent Council in cooperation with the local American Legion Post and Auxiliary Unit 337 have sponsored an annual Veterans' Day Program to honor the veterans of Motley County. Today we are excited to announce a new joint project to preserve the rich history of military experiences of our veterans. Student council members, assisted by American Legion or Auxiliary members and the technology staff at the school will interview every willing veteran in Motley County to obtain an oral history of their military service. Families of deceased veterans will also be interviewed so that their history can be included. This history will be preserved on CD, DVD, and/or videotape. One copy will be given to each vet-eran interviewed. A copy will also be given to the Motley County Museum for their archives and to the Motley County Library. Additional copies can be purchased for family members or friends for the cost of a tape or CD. Students will not only be doing the interviews, but will also be learning by assist-ing in the video editing, and write ups of each interview. A written copy of each interview will be available for publication in the Motley County Tribune as they are done. Every veteran is encouraged to participate and should not consider their service "too insignificant." All veterans, not just American Legion and VFW members, will be included.

The interview team would like to have the spouse present at the time of the interview for input of their experiences. As the poet, John Milton, wrote,

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"They also serve who only stand and wait." And as noted by Ellen Secrest, "Unfortunately, there are no medals for them, no commendations for making it through long and very lonely nights. There are no ribbons for coping with the fear and dread of having a loved one far away and in possible danger."

Miss Baxter then asked the spouses and family members of all veterans to stand and acknowledged them for their courage and sacrifices for military service.

Every Veteran will be given a copy of sample questions ahead of time so that they can be thinking of stories to share at the interview. They will also be asked to gather some photographs and other memorabilia, which can be included in the video. A photograph of the veteran in uniform, one of their unit or company, one of their plane, tank, ship, etc. would be great to include.

These interviews and the follow up editing and write-ups will be very time consuming. This project may take several years to complete but the students are very excited and committed to seeing this through and passing it on to future student council members. We really want each and every veteran and family to participate. It doesn't matter if you were a private or an admiral, saw combat or not, your memories need to be preserved for your families and for history. Someone recently viewed a videotape interview of their dad, and mentioned that it was a cherished possession to hear him tell these stories in his own words.

We would like to start with the World War II veterans and then jump to those recently returned from duty while memories are still fresh in their minds. If you are as excited as we are and ready to jump on the bandwagon, please let us know so that we can set up an appointment. Archer, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Jack, Wise, Stephens, Palo Pinto and Parker counties.


