Motley County ISD awarded Reading First Grant

Motley County ISD is one of ninety-six school districts and charters that has received more than \$45 million in federal Reading First grants to be used to help improve reading instruction.

The Reading First Initiative helps Texas school districts and charter schools focus on the best and most rigorous scientific research available. It helps schools use the research, along with proven instructional and testing tools, to teach all children to read. The initiative will provide training and technical

assistance to schools to help them select and implement effective reading materials and programs.

Motley County ISD joined together with Floydada, Lorenzo, Crosbyton, Ralls, and Valley to write the grant and utilize student numbers to help benefit each district. The grant award for each district can be up to \$170,000. The award will be for at least three years and up to six if the districts show adequate yearly progress in reading programs.

The districts have already begun the teacher training and have all selected a scientifically research based reading program, Voyager, to be used in grades K-3. A reading specialist has been employed at each district and the program is being implemented in a timely manner. At Motley County ISD, Yolanda Kautz will be the Reading Coach and Mrs. Hicks will be the Reading Coordinator. "With the leadership and guidance of these two professionals, our kindergarten through third grade teachers at Motley

County will continue to improve and provide all students the opportunity to the best education available," said Superintendent Rick Copp. "We are looking forward to working with the other districts in this challenge to have every student able to read on or above grade level by the third grade."

The federal grant program works hand in hand with the Texas Reading First Initiative, which has its goal to have all children reading on grade level or above by the third grade.

Roaring Springs City Council meets

The Roaring Springs City Council met in regular session September 8. Five people attended the open forum meeting for the 2003 tax rate. There was no opposition.

All council members were in attendance. Also attending were City Secretary, Zella Palmer; Water Manager, Robert Osborn; Suzanne Abbott, Ken Abbott, Vince Taylor, Mickey Brooks and Brandt Bearden.

Suzanne Abbott thanked the Council for their support of the Library and asked for their continued support. A motion was made by Councilman Timmy Brooks, seconded by Kelly Keltz, and carried unanimously to donate \$400 to the Library. The motion carried with four votes, as PK Green abstained from voting.

Vince Taylor expressed concern about the Roaring Springs Volunteer Fire Department giving financial reports to the Council. The fire department agreed to give quarterly reports to the Council.

Bids for the construction of a maintenance shed were opened and received. Presenting bids were Davis Construction, Marshall Bros., Inc., and Meredith Construction. The lowest bid by Marshall Bros. was accepted. Letters were sent to each sending bids thanking them for their cooperation.

Minutes from the August 11 regular council meeting were approved as written. Bills were reviewed and approved to be paid as presented.

Council approved an Emergency Management Ordinance

and appointed Mayor Corky Marshall as Emergency Management Coordinator.

Due to the rising cost of

electricity, council approved to increase RV parking fees to \$175 per month and \$20 per day.

Rainfall locations affecting status of Motley County's cotton crops

Location of rainfall in September in Motley County is influencing the status of the Cotton crops. There was an expression in the 1940s when somebody had a bumper cotton crop and was getting a good price when selling it, they were said to be "walking in tall cotton." This expression can't be used for the majority of Motley County farmers in 2003.

Cloud cover slowed down the heat the last of the month and pleasant autumn weather was welcomed. A cool front draped

across Motley County Oct. 4-5 sparking some showers.

This is a benefit for wheat and feed land. Also reported, the boll weevil control program helped tremendously in keeping weevil infestations down.

The Motley County National Weather Service Volunteers report the total rainfall for September 2003: Buzz Thacker, Roaring Springs 1.75; Kelly Meyer, Matador 1.00; Betty Simpson, Northfield 1.41; Jim Stockton, Whiteflat 1.20 and Tommie Jo Cruise, Flomot 2.20 inches.

Matadors run over New Home Leopards for 52-0 halftime win

The MC Matadors got a big win over the Leopards when they traveled to New Home last Friday for their last game before District play begins. The Matadors completely shut down the Leopards in the first quarter with a 28-0 score when the quarter ended. The game was called at half-time due to the 45-point rule and the Matadors took the win at 52-0.

Total rushing yards for the game were 299. Total offensive yards were 339. Seagram Sims was leading rusher with 237 yards. Lorenzo Salazar had 32

and Levi Buckner rushed for 34 yards. Seagram was also lead scorer with 30 points. Levi Buckner and Lorenzo Salazar each scored 10.

Leading tacklers for the game were Brandon Gressett with 2 unassisted tackles. Leading in assisted tackles were Matt Hanzler with 4 and Levi Buckner with 3.

The Matadors have rushed 1,197 total rushing yards for the season. Seagram Sims has a total of 937 rushing yards at this point and Lorenzo Salazar has 108.

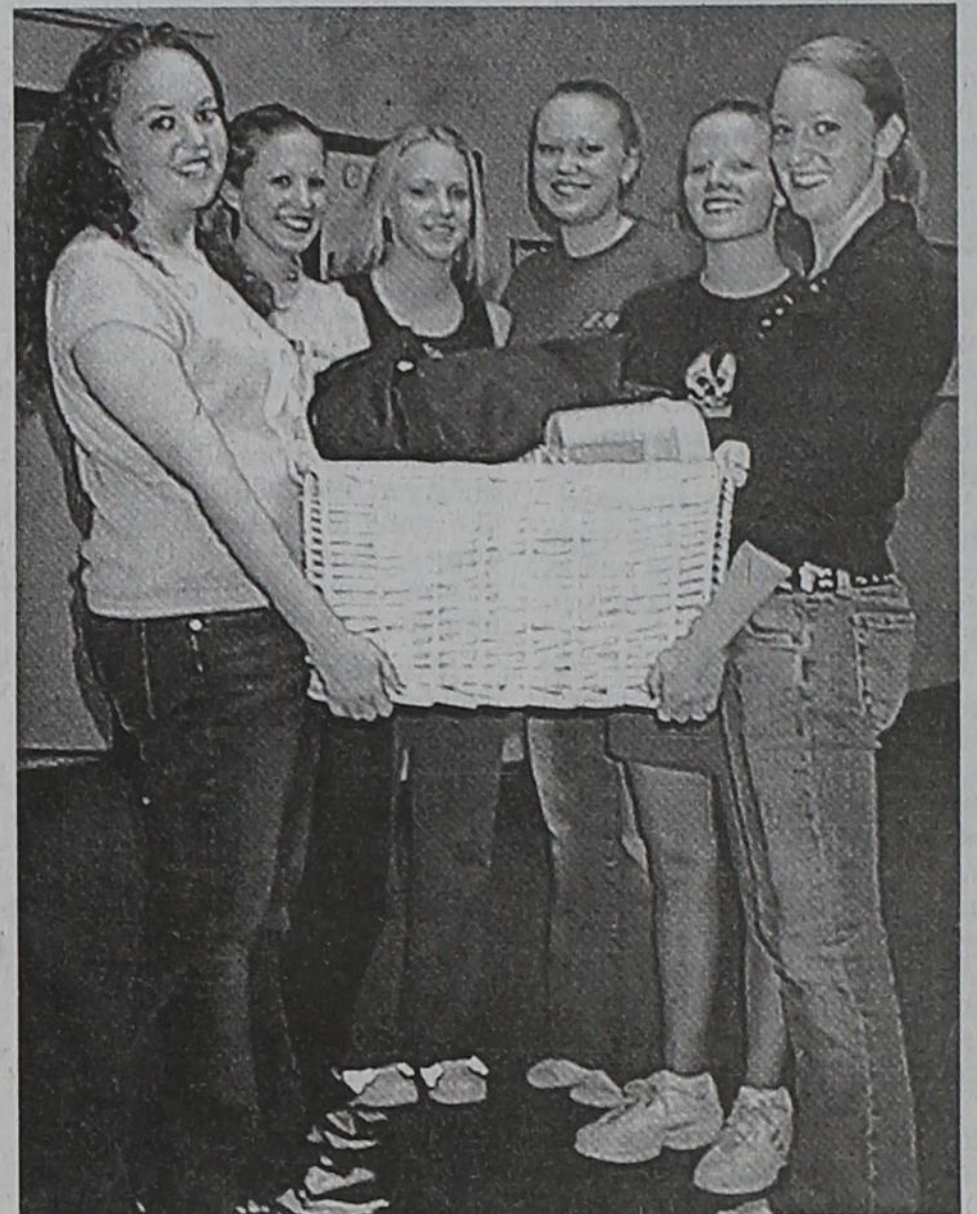
There will be a Cheerleading exhibition for all little girls who want to perform

Senator Duncan can accept West Texas compromise

Austin -- Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, said he can accept a compromise on Congressional redistricting that maintains a solid agriculture seat in the Texas delegation for the future.

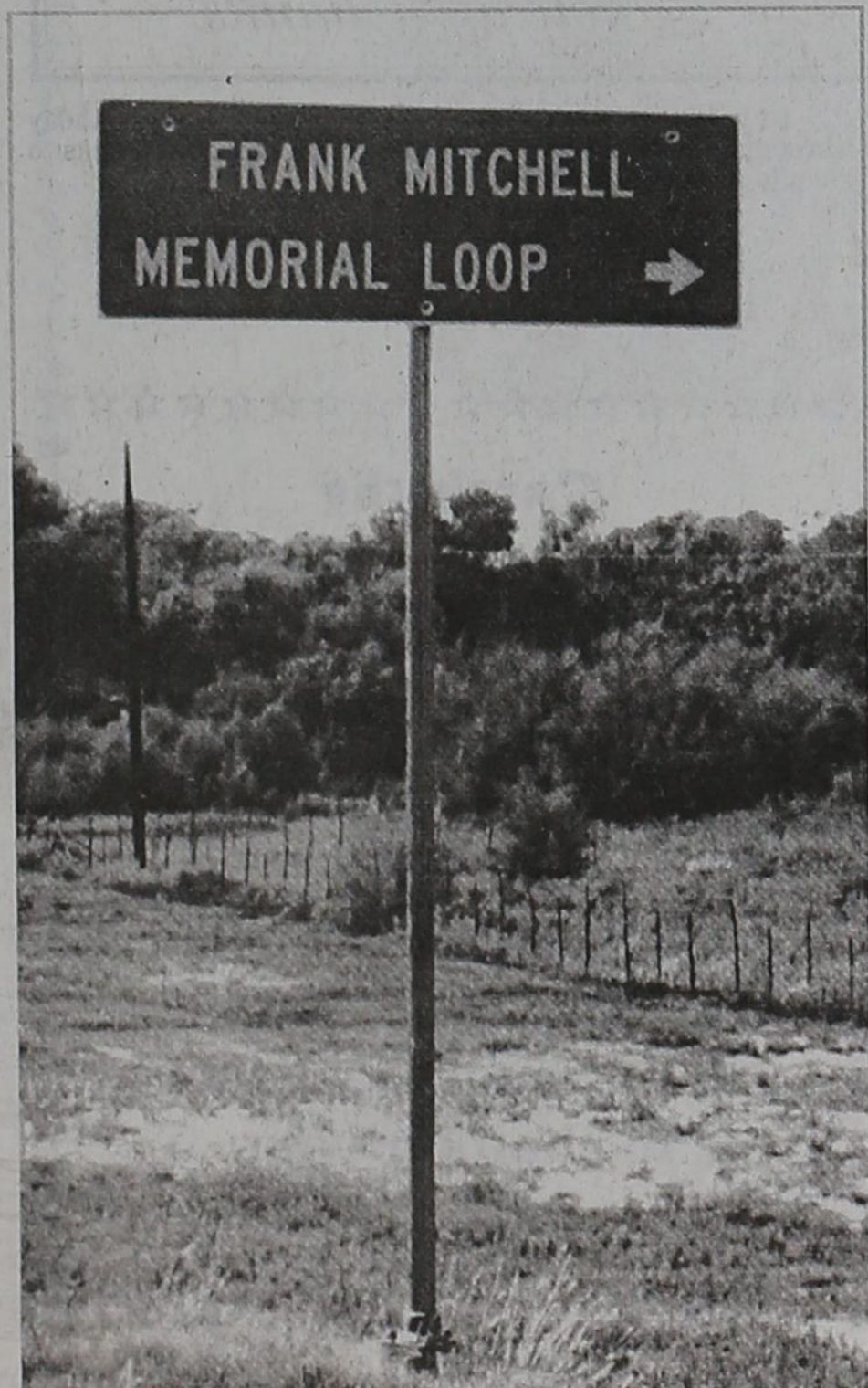
In a news conference last week with conference committee chairman Sen. Todd Staples, R-Palestine, and Sen. Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, Duncan said the West Texas portion of a map offered by state Rep. Arlene Wohlgenuth, R-Burleson, is acceptable.

The Wohlgenuth plan was filed in conjunction with the Republican congressional delegation. Under this plan, 01365C, Lubbock is in a district with San Angelo in District 19; and Midland-Odessa are in a district with Abilene in District 11.

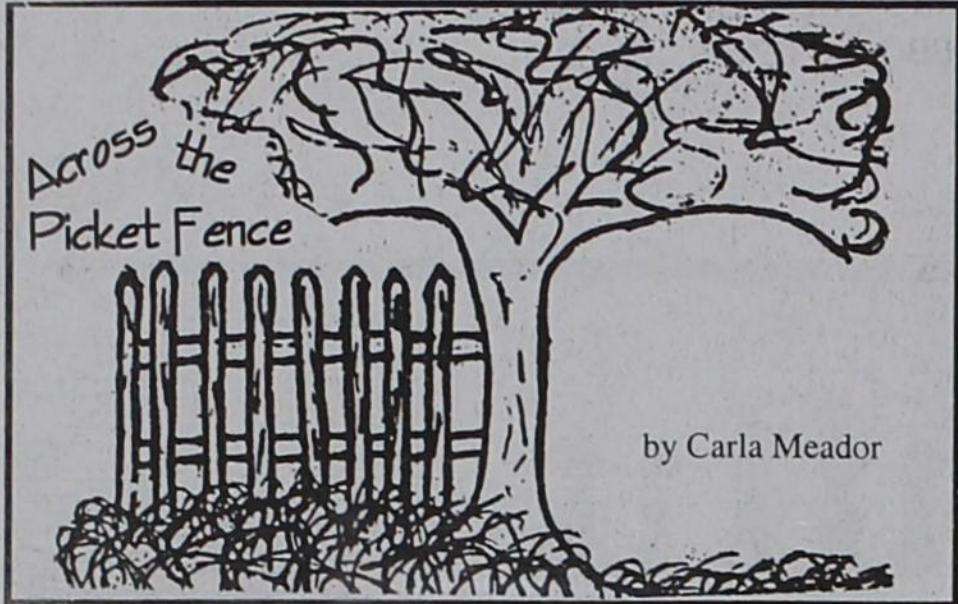
"This plan keeps a seat for agriculture well past the next two years. In fact, it will preserve a seat for agriculture through the next redistricting cycle in 2011, which is critical to my constituents in the Lubbock and San Angelo areas. It also creates an oil, gas and ranching district for Midland-Odessa and Abilene," Duncan said. "This is a win for everybody."

The voters of Senate District 28 have overwhelmingly said they support the current lines, but they are open to a fair negotiated solution.

"To get this issue resolved, I believe this is a reasonable solution," Duncan said. "I met many times with the people of Senate District 28, and although their preference would have been no change to the Congressional lines, I believe this is a plan they will accept. Also, the Speaker's desire for an oil and gas seat is met."



NEW SIGN — Sometimes you never know what may happen between pasting up the paper and printing it, but somehow the sign picture disappeared in last week's paper. As stated last week, this new sign designating Frank Mitchell Memorial Loop was recently erected at the north and south entrances to Roaring Springs, due to the efforts of the City of Roaring Springs and Senator Robert Duncan's office. Tentative plans are to officially dedicate the signs November 11. Marine First Lieutenant, Frank N. Mitchell, a Roaring Springs native, lost his life in the Korean War, November 26, 1950, and earned the Congressional Medal of Honor.

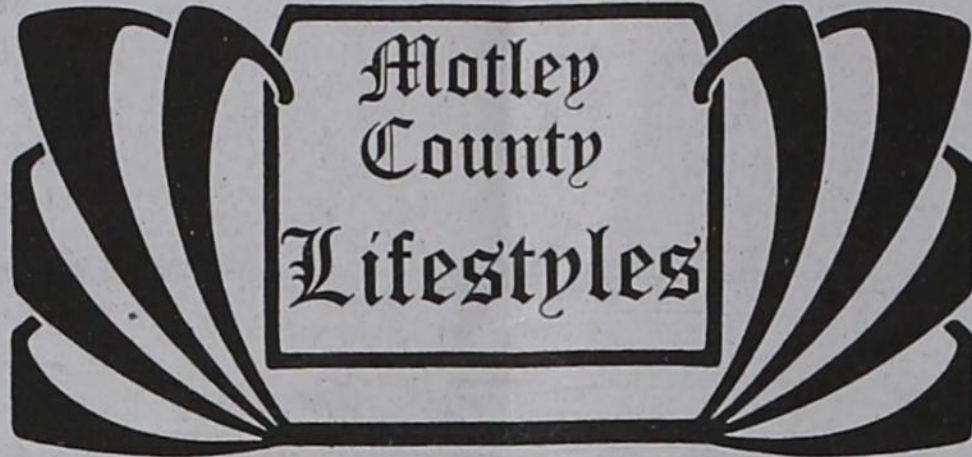

In 1976, Jim Ed Brown teamed up with Helen Cornelius to form one of the most successful recording duos of our time. They have won many awards for their songs. Some of their hits are "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You", "You Don't Bring Me Flowers", "Here Today and Gone Tomorrow".

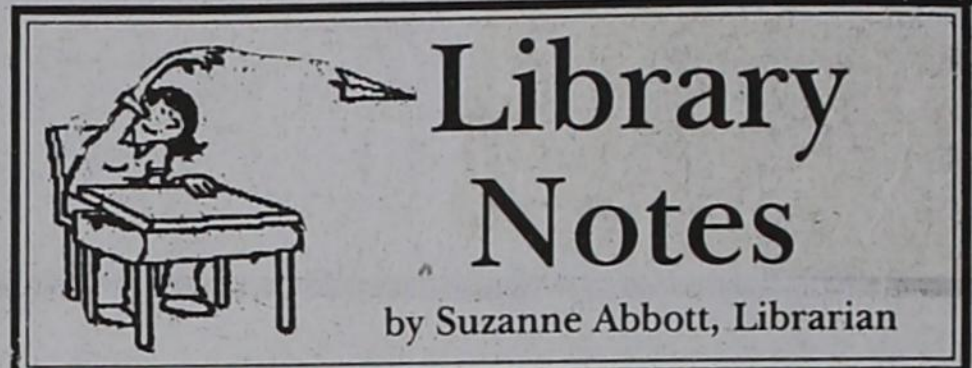
This talented duo will be in concert on Saturday, October 11, 2003, at the Bob Wills Center Gymnasium in Turkey, Texas. Showtime will be at 7:00 p.m. Admission is \$20 per person. Helen Cornelius was born in Hannibal, Missouri and began performing as a child with her sisters and winning a number of local talent contests including on the national scale a trio of wins on the "Ted Mack Amateur Hour" in the 1970's. But it was her song writing that initially opened the doors to Nashville's Music Row for her. Major artists including Oak Ridge Boys, Reba McEntire, Jeanne C. Riley, Connie Smith, and others had recorded several of her songs.

But when RCA Record executives heard her sing, she won her first major recording contract in 1975.

Jim Ed Brown was born in Sparkman, Arkansas and some of his earliest childhood memories are of close family ties when all the members of the household would gather on Saturday nights to listen to the Grand Ole Opry (which he was later to become a member of), on a battery powered radio. Jim and his sister, Maxine, were fascinated by what they heard and began harmonizing together. Then, they began to perform occasionally on local radio shows. By Jim Ed's second year in college he and Maxine were regular members of the "Barnyard Frolics" in Little Rock and they penned their first hit record, "Looking Back To See". They became members of the Louisiana Hayride. Their sister, Bonnie, joined them and together they had many hits such as "The Three Bells", "Scarlett Ribbons", and others.

Longing For God

Registration deadline is November 7 for next ACT test

College-bound high school students who want to take the ACT test for college admissions have two changes to register before the December 13 national test date. The postmark registration deadline is Friday, November 7. There is also a late registration postmark deadline on November 20 (an additional fee is required for late registration). Students can get information from their high school counselor or register on-line at www.act.org.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the nation, including all Ivy League schools. The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement test, not an aptitude test. There are four sections, covering English, reading, math and science. The

tests cover material that students study in high school.

ACT scores are considered by colleges for admissions and course placement, along with several other important factors including high school GPA, college prep courses taken in high school, extracurricular activities, personal background and other information. The test fee is \$26 (\$29 in Florida).

Homecoming Queen Candidates and their Fathers will be introduced at 4:45 p.m. The Queen will be crowned at half-time.

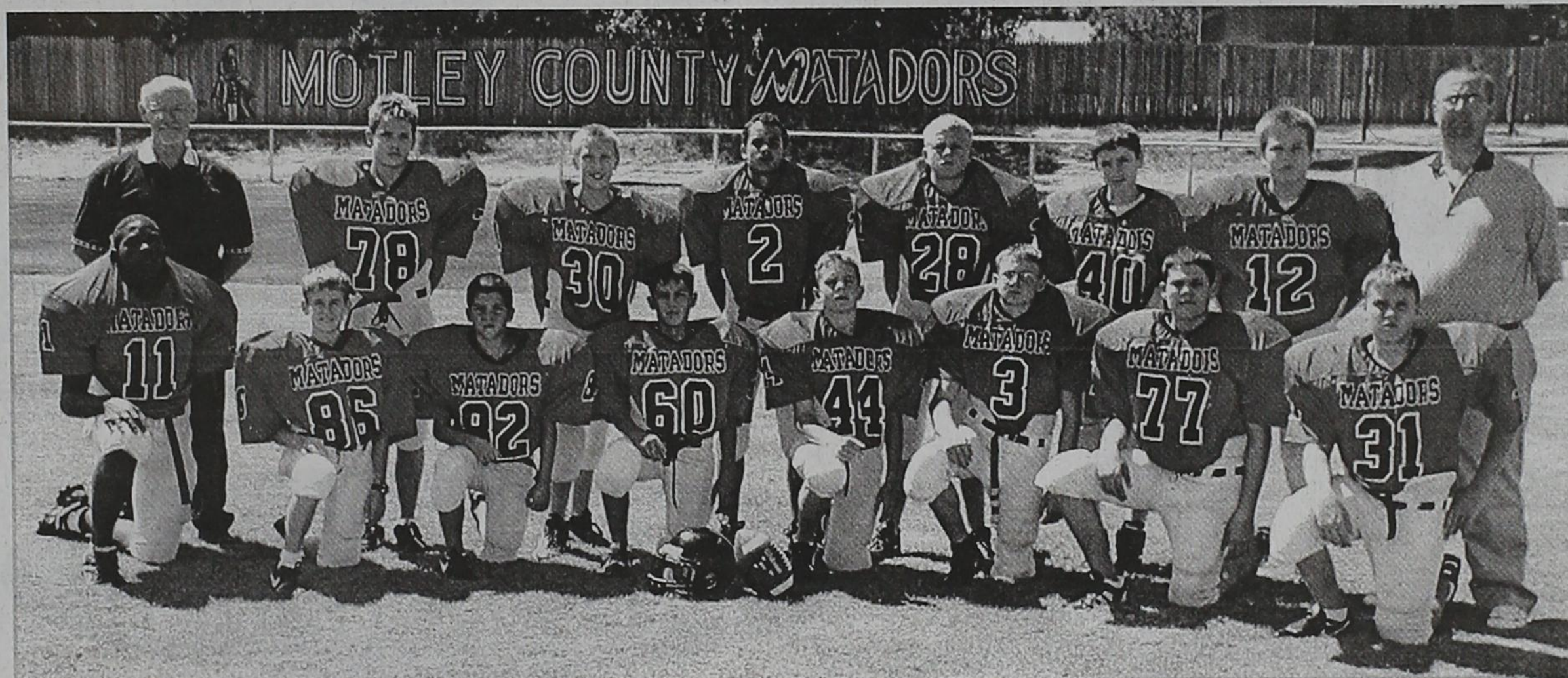

White-tailed Deer - (West Zone 1-Buck County) Archery Season: September 27-October 26; General Season: November 1-January 4 (November 1-30, no antlerless permit required except on MLD property; December 1-January 4, antlerless by permit only - countywide). Bag limit: 3 (1 buck and 2 antlerless, all seasons combined).

Mule deer - Archery Season: September 27-October 26 (buck only); General Season: November 22-December 7 (antlerless by permit only). Bag limit: 2 (no more than 1 buck, all seasons combined).

Squirrel - No closed season. No bag limit.

Pheasant - December 13-January 11. Daily bag limit: 2 cocks.

Turkey - Archery Season: September 27-October 26 (either sex); General Season: November 1-January 4 (either sex); Spring Season: April 3-May 9 (gobblers only). Bag limit: 4 (all seasons combined).

Quail - Saturday, October 25, 2003 through Sunday, February 29, 2004. Daily bag limit: 15 (fifteen) quail, 45 in possession.

Dove - (North Zone) September 1 - October 30. Daily bag limit: 15 mourning, white-winged, and white-tipped (white-fronted) doves in the aggregate to include not more than 2 white-tipped. Possession Limit: Twice the daily bag limit.

2004 PROGRAM SIGN-UP BEGINS OCTOBER 1

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman announced that enrollment for the 2004 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) will begin Oct. 1.

Under the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (FSRIA) producers must sign contracts annually to participate in the DCP, unlike the one-time sign-up process that was installed under the previous farm program.

Producers have until June 1, 2004, to enroll for the 2004 DCP.

Late-filed applications will be accepted through Sept. 30, 2004, if accompanied by a \$100 fee.

Producers can opt out of participating in the program any year if they choose. For both the 2002 and 2003 programs, more than 98% of the eligible base acres were enrolled.

The 2002 Farm Bill authorizes direct and counter-cyclical payments to enrolled producers. Both payments are computed using the base acres and payment yields established for each farm.

The table above refers ONLY to 2004 - crop DCP payments, no announcement has yet been made regarding 2003 Counter-cyclical payments. Any announcement pertaining to the 2003 CC payment would come during the month of October.

Producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute, regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payment rates, on the other hand, vary depending on market prices.

Counter - cyclical payments are issued only when the effective price (which takes into account the direct payment rate, market price and loan rate) for a crop is below the target price for the commodity.

For "other oilseeds," because of the existing loan rate, the maximum counter - cyclical payment rate is zero.

The following is the schedule of payments for 2004 DCP:

December 2003 - 50% advance direct payment;
October 2004 - 50% final direct payment;

rect payment;

October 2004 - first advance counter - cyclical payment (up to 35% of projected payment);

February 2005 - second advance counter - cyclical payment (up to 70% of projected payment less first advance);

Dates vary by crop - In general, 30 days following the end of the marketing year. Final counter - cyclical payment (100% of actual payment, less any advances received).


By the end of October 2003, USDA reports that producers will have received some \$8 billion in DCP payments for the 2002 crops, the 2003 crop direct payments, and the first advance counter - cyclical payments for 2003 crops.

For all years, refunds to USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) will be due if there is a violation of eligibility requirements or, in case of counter - cyclical payments, if the advance payments exceed the final payment rate.
