# **Motley County ISD awarded Reading First Grant**

Motley County ISD is one of ninety-six school districts and charters that has received more than \$45 million in federal Reading First grants to be used to help improve reading instruction.

The Reading First Initiative helps Texas school districts and charter schools focus on the best and most rigorous scientific research available. It helps schools use the research, along assistance to schools to help them select and implement effective reading materials and programs.

Motley County ISD joined together with Floydada, Lorenzo, Crosbyton, Ralls, and Valley to write the grant and uti-lize student numbers to help benefit each district. The grant

award for each district can be up to \$170,000. The award will be

The districts have already begun the teacher training and have all selected a scientifically research based reading program, Voyager, to be used in grades K-3. A reading specialist has been employed at each district and the program is being implemented in a timely manner. At Motley County ISD, Yolanda Kautz will be the Reading Coach and Mrs. Hicks will be the Reading Coordinator.

County will continue to improve and provide all students the opportunity to the best education available," said Superintendent Rick Copp. "We are looking for-ward to working with the other districts in this challenge to have every student able to read on or above grade level by the third grade."







# **Senator Duncan can accept** West Texas compromise

Austin -- Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, said he can accept a compromise on Congressional redistricting that maintains a solid agriculture seat in the Texas delegation for the future.

In a news conference last week with conference committee chairman Sen. Todd Staples, R-Palestine, and Sen. Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, Duncan said the West Texas portion of a map offered by state Rep. Arlene Wohlgemuth, R-Burleson, is acceptable. The Wohlgemuth plan was filed in conjunction with the Republican congressional delegation. Under this plan, 01365C, Lubbock is in a district with San Angelo in District 19; and Midland-Odessa are in a district with Abilene in District 11. "This plan keeps a seat for agriculture well past the next two years. In fact, it will preserve a seat for agriculture through the next redistricting cycle in 2011, which is critical to my constituents in the Lubbock and San Angelo areas. It also creates an oil, gas and ranching district for Midland-Odessa and Abilene," Duncan said. "This is a win for everybody." The voters of Senate District 28 have overwhelmingly said they support the current lines, but they are open to a fair negotiated solution. "To get this issue resolved, I believe this is a reasonable solution," Duncan said. "I met many times with the people of Senate District 28, and although their preference would have been no change to the Congressional lines, I believe this is a plan they will accept. Also, the Speaker's desire for an oil and gas seat is met."

There will be a Cheerleading exhibition for all little girls who want to perform


and a goal kicking contest for elementary boys.

In 1976, Jim Ed Brown teamed up with Helen Cornelius to form one of the most successful recording duos of our time. They have won many awards for their songs. Some of their hits are "Have I Told You Lately That I Love You", "You Don't Bring Me Flowers", "Here Today and Gone Tomorrow". This talented duo will be in

Helen Cornelius was born in Hannibal, Missouri and began performing as a child with her sisters and winning a number of local talent contest including on the national scale a trio of wins on the "Ted Mack Amateur Hour" in the 1970's. But it was her song writing that initially opened the doors to Nashville's Music Row for her. Major artists including Oak Ridge Boys, Reba McIntire, Jeanne C. Riley, Connie Smith, and others had recorded several of her songs.

But when RCA Record executives heard her sing, she won her first major recording contract in 1975.

Jim Ed Brown was born in Sparkman, Arkansas and some of his earliest childhood memories are of close family ties when all the members of the household would gather on Saturday nights to listen to the Grand Ole Opry (which he was later to become a member of), on a battery powered radio. Jim and his sister, Maxine, were fascinated by what they heard and began harmonizing together. Then, they began to perform occasionally on local radio shows. By Jim Ed's second year in college he and Maxine were regular members of the "Barnyard Frolies" in Little Rock and they penned their first hit record, "Looking Back To See". They became members of the Louisiana Hayride. Their sister, Bonnie, joined them and together they had many hits such as "The Three' Bells", "Scarlett Ribbons", and others.

"As the dear pants for the water brook, so pants my soul for You, O God. My soul thirst for God, for the Living God" — Psalms 42: 1-2. The Psalmist was intent in his longing for God. I wonder if the same might be said of us? Do we find our souls really thirsting for God? We are a people surrounded by the material splendor of our culture. Is there a danger that we might not be developing a thirst for spiritual things? It has been said that, "in a material world we easily forget that life is lived from within, not from without."

It is easy to take our lives for granted. Yet Solomon reminds us in Ecclesiastes 12 that this life is liken to a silver thread and is very fragile. Then he tells us our "whole duty is to fear God and keep His commandments." That often gets placed on the back burner. The spiritual aspect of life is not always foremost in our minds. We need to ask ourselves, "How is my spiritual development progressing?"

What is more important to us, the spiritual or material? Which do we place the most emphasis on? In helping us answer this we read the words of Jesus in John 10:10: "...I have come that they may have life, and that they may have it more abundantly." Our Lord helps us to understand that the life we have in Him is spiritual and not based on the material things of this world. All of the pleasure and riches of this world pales into insignificance when compared to the spiritual life that comes through Jesus.

The postmark registration deadline is Friday, November 7. There is also a late registration postmark deadline on November 20 (an additional fee is required for late registration). Students can get information from their high school counselor or register on-line at www.act.org.

ACT scores are accepted by virtually all colleges in the na-tion, including all Ivy League schools. The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement test, not an aptitude test. There are four sections, covering English, reading, math and science. The


Squirrel - No closed season. No bag limit.

Pheasant — December 13-January 11. Daily bag limit: 2 cocks.

Quail - Saturday, October 25, 2003 through Sunday, February 29, 2004. Daily bag limit: 15 (fifteen) quail, 45 in possession.

Dove-(North Zone) September 1- October 30. Daily bag limit: 15 mourning, white-winged, and white-tipped (white-fronted) doves in the aggregate to include not more than 2 whitetipped. Possession Limit: Twice the daily bag limit.

# 2004 PROGRAM SIGN-UP

**BEGINS OCTOBER 1** Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman announced that enrollment for the 2004 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) will begin Oct. 1.

Under the Farm Security and **Rural Investment Act of 2002** (FSRIA) producers must sign contracts annually to participate in the DCP, unlike the onetime sign-up process that was installed under the previous farm program.

Producers have until June 1, 2004, to enroll for the 2004 DCP.


