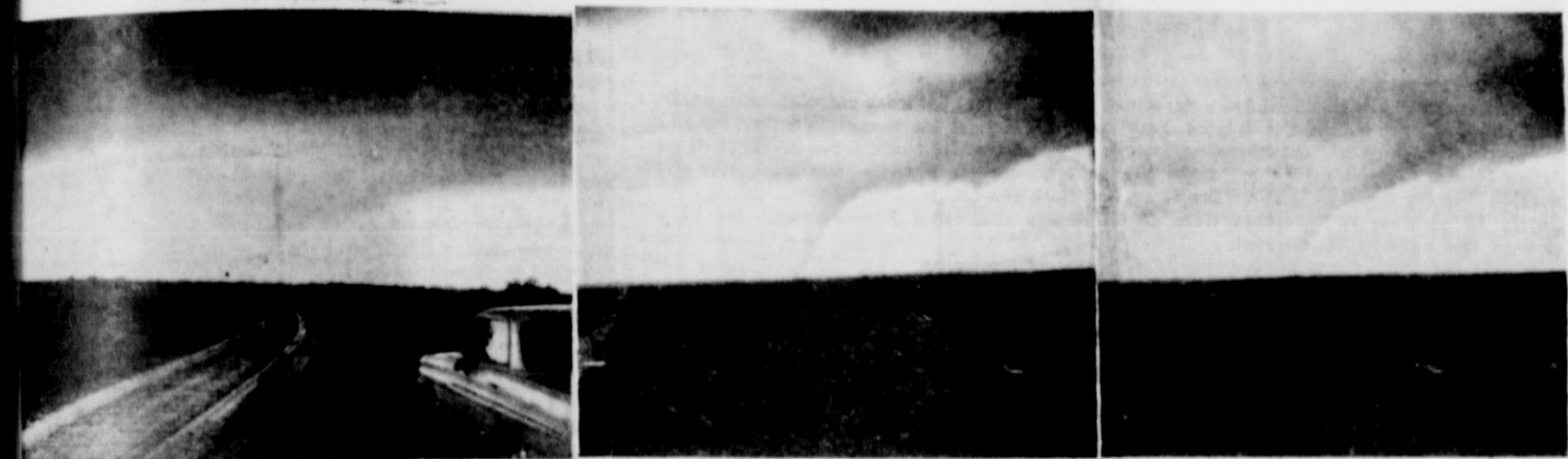

DREADED FUNNEL IN MOTLEY COUNTY—These exceptionally fine Polaroid photographs were made Tuesday afternoon by Charles Long Jr. of Roaring Springs, as a tornado swept northward across the foothills, not more than 3 miles away. The funnel was seen by scores of people. The photos were made along Farm Road No. 684 looking west from Roaring Springs. The tornado crossed the road 5 1/2 miles west of

Roaring Springs, tearing down fences, splintering and uprooting Mesquite trees, but apparently missing any houses or farm buildings. Car seen in some of the pictures, is Dean McInroe's, who accompanied Long in making the pictures. Point of the funnel is very narrow and where it crossed the highway, was about 50 yards wide.

Rains, Hail, Winds Pound County in Storm Series

A FULL BLOWN TORNADO topped the rugged weather picture across Motley County Tuesday. Heavy rains, hail squalls, high winds and a series of damages resulting from lightning completed the nerve-racking portrait.

Starting the day with high south winds, laced with dust and thin, fleeting clouds, the weather appeared to be resigned to wind and heat until about 3:30 p.m. Suddenly a cloud cover appeared from the south, with rain starting. The heavy winds and dust continued for a time.

Soon a series of heavy showers started, and hail mingled with the rain. Sidewalk in front of the Tribune was covered with small hail at one time, and some stones almost the size of golf balls fell. The series of showers, driven by the continuing wind, were extended with the sun breaking through at intervals.

Another bank of clouds about 5 p.m. was accompanied by severe lightning, with more rain and hail. A short time later the fire alarm sounded and fire trucks were dispatched north and then south. It was actually a tornado alarm and a fire alarm at the same time.

Flash!

Motley County's Senate Bill No. 227, seeking the right to hold an election to determine whether or not the citizens want to create a hospital district, passed yesterday morning.

State Representative Bill Heatly called County Judge Elbert Reeves and said the bill had passed the Senate on a local and uncontested calendar.

Deputy Sounds Alarm
Deputy Bobby Williams, whose home is in Roaring Springs, had seen the funnel on the ground to the west and rushed to Matador to give the alarm.

Lightning had set fire to a washing machine at the J. D. Craven home north of town. Also a report was received that a powerline transformer was burning at the west edge of town. Mrs. Bill Dunning went home during the storm and found a wall connection burning. An electric hot water heater was destroyed at the R. E. Campbell Jr. home on State Highway 70 northwest of town. Mrs. Campbell said one power line pole was struck three times.

The storm here had passed when it was learned that the tornado had passed west of Roaring Springs. It was reported the tornado lifted just before it reached the Curt Martin ranch home about ten miles west of Matador, as it crossed US Highway 70. It apparently went back into the clouds.

Rainfall is Varied

The moisture was highly beneficial here, totalling 1.57 inches according to Bob Stanley's gauge. Total at Roaring Springs was in the neighborhood of 60-inch. Heavy, washing rains were reported in other areas, while some sections received little or small amount.

A storm coming out of the west about 9 p.m. brought the most moisture here. Ballard Creek reached the highest point of flow in more than a year.

Jameson Brothers, who had built an earthen tank on their property east of town (old golf course site) had a problem but they were happy. The swift rain filled the dam to a point almost to the State Highway 70 bridge. The dam, which had been built in one afternoon, was about to go out. The brothers worked all night to save the dam and the water. They are now raising the dam one foot until a new and larger dam can be constructed farther down the creek.

Flomol Approved For "Head Start"

Flomol school has been approved for a federal grant of \$3,076 on the project "Head Start," to aid 16 children during the summer, selected "without regard to race, color, creed or national origin."

Supt. A. J. Barron, in a statement to the Tribune, said he had a telephone conversation with Congressman Walter Rogers on May 20, in which he was informed of the project's approval. Of the approved amount the school district will provide \$307 in the form of class rooms, transportation and administration.

Barron said the project will provide one degree teacher, part-time administrator, an assistant, medical program, transportation, lunch room and custodian services.

He said present schedule is for classes to start on July 5 (8:30 a.m.). Teachers will attend a workshop at SMU beginning June 7.

Judge Reeves said all enrollees will be certified through the State Employment Commission, according to plans.

He said many details remain to be worked out on the county level for the federal program to get underway by the scheduled date.

More details of the program will be made public as they are approved with application to this county. Judge Reeves said the Dallas office is rushed with applications for youth employment projects.
