Motley County Historical Commission Awarded Distinguished Service Award

Texas House Speaker Pete Laney's office was first to notify the Motley County Historical Commission this week that it is to receive a coveted Distinguished Service Award for outstanding preservation work accomplished in 1992.

The award will be presented at the Texas Historical Commission's annual conference in Austin on April 30.

County commission members, Lee Peacock, Beverly Vinson, and Marisue Potts fulfilled all requirements for the award in four different categories. County Organizational Structure included reporting local activities and developing long range plans for historical preservation in the county.

The Historic Cemeteries report noted the outstanding work of Mrs. Peacock, Ossie Lee Brown, and the Roaring Springs Volunteers on the cleanup and restoration of Mount Zion Cemetery.

Recognizing the efforts of Beverly Vinson and Josephine Hamilton in compiling a display for the centennial anniversary of the First Methodist Church, was the Historic Photograph division which utilized photographs of the church's pioneer families.

In the Folklife Preservation category, Marisue Potts submitted a report on the

museum's historic photographs of Comanche, Apache, and Kiowa Indians in the Reverend A.E. Butterfield's collection. The missionary's photograph album reflecting the lifestyle of the reservations in Indian Territory was donated to the museum by Butterfield's granddaughter, Mrs. Grace Tilson.

The activity report included representative photos of vernacular architectural styles, traditional folk dress, local cultural influences, ceremonial event, and artifacts associated with the Indians who

once lived in this region.

"We appreciate the efforts of these chairpersons, their committees, and all who have diligently supported the guest to preserve the history of Motley County for their help in winning our fourth consecutive DSA award," said Potts. "Our work of 1993 is already underway in the categories of Historic Barns, Veterans, and Museum Assistance, and we look forward to those challenges presented by the Texas Historical Commission."

Roaring Springs Club Members To Participate In Great Texas Trash-Off

The eighth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off", scheduled for Saturday, April 3, will involve more than 25,000 volunteers throughout the state in the largest one-day clean-up effort in the nation. Twenty of those volunteers are located in Roaring Springs.

The Texas Adopt-a-Highway program sponsored by the Texas Department of

Transportation, is the first of its kind in the nation. More than 45 other states have since developed similar programs.

More than 4,000 groups have joined the Adopt-a-Highway program since it was introduced in March 1985 in Tyler, Texas.

Jury Gives Cruse 7-Year Term

MEMPHIS — Weldon Paul Cruse, who was convicted of voluntary manslaughter on Tuesday, was sentenced to seven years in prison last Wednesday, Cruse's attorney said.

In addition to the prison sentence, the seven-woman, five-man jury gave the 62-year-old Turkey man a \$7,000 fine, his attorney, Jim Brown, said.

Cruse, who was convicted of the August 19 shooting death of Northfield resident Eddie (Petesy) Timmons, faced a maximum of 20 years in prison for the second-degree felony.

Brown said the seven-year sentence was "a victory for us."

"We'd like to have probation, but seven years is better than 70," he said. "Considering the facts of the case, I think we came out all right. I think the facts were so bad they could not help but send him to jail for a while."

David McCoy, the 100th Judicial District attorney, said the sentence was a disappointment.

"I feel terrible," he said. "I busted my backside. I went the last mile on the case. The facts were so heinous. That's awful cheap for a human life."

McCoy said a combination of Cruse's age, the fact that he had no prior criminal history, and the fact that Eddie Timmons had a previous murder conviction might have influenced the jury to impose a sentence less than the maximum penalty.

Brown said another factor might have been that voluntary manslaughter "means there was provocation by the guy that got killed."

McCoy said Cruse must serve at least one-fourth of the seven years - about one year, nine months - before he will be eligible for parole.

Brown said Cruse is out on bond and will spend time with his family for the next week to 10 days before he begins serving his sentence. Brown said he did not expect to file an appeal in the case.

According to testimony during Cruse's trial, Cruse was embroiled in a feud over land with Timmons, his 49-year-old brother-in-law.

Timmons' partially burned body was discovered early Aug. 20 stuffed head-first in a trash barrel in an alley behind Cruse's home in Turkey.

Timmons had been shot once in the head from close range with a 12-gauge shotgun, according to testimony.

* Approved assessment of Property taxes by the Motley County Appraisal District.

* Elected to approve joint election in Motley County. All other entities agreed so they will file a resolution with Washington DC

* Meeting went into closed session to

approve personnel contracts.

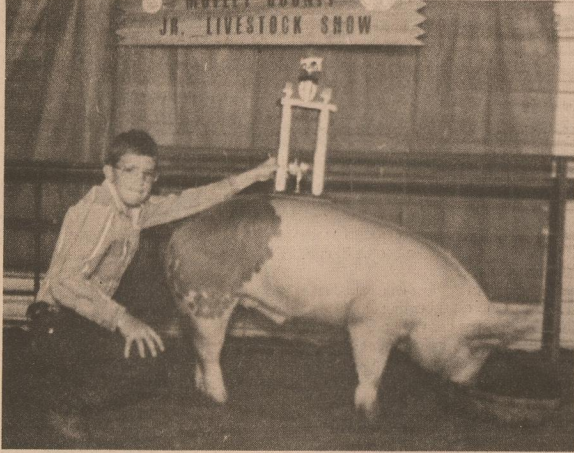

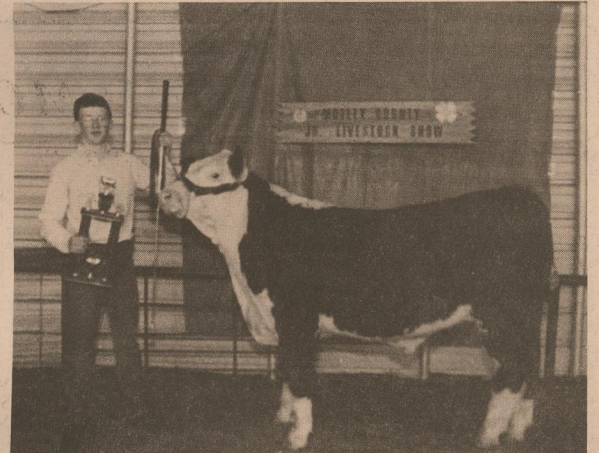
