Principles Count Seniors Are Told

Pertinent Advice Given Graduates At Baccalaureate

The principles taught by Christ and his apostles over 2000 years ago are just as true today as they were then, Matador High School graduates were assured in a baccalaureate message Sunday night in the school auditorium.

Minister Weldon Bennett, Bible professor at Abilene Christian College, Abilene, spoke to the class, their parents and friends on the subject of material possessions, with an introduction from the third chapter of Acts. Emphasis was on verse 6: "... Silver and gold have I none; but such as I

have give I thee..." "Money can't always buy health or happiness," Mr. Bennett declared. "Life is more than material possessions. It's the little things in life that count for the most... God takes the little thing and uses it in a big way."

He cited many instances in the Bible to illustrate his subject.

"You are responsible for whatever talents or gifts you may be endowed with... God expects us to take advantage of every opportunity, no matter how insignificant it might seem. Whatever you have or may acquire, use it for the Glory of God... if it is money, use it in a beneficial way... but don't underestimate the little things of life. Make your motto in life, 'What I have, give I thee.'"

Invocation was by C. W. Giesecke and congregational singing was led by Bennie Billington. Announcements were by Supt. Charles Johnson and special music was a two-piano duet by Elaine Dixon and Judy Marrs. Benediction was by Rev. Larry Heard.

WITH THE APOLLO TEN RECOVERY FORCE - Seaman Joe M. Scott, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Scott of Roaring Springs, Tex., is serving aboard the destroyer USS Rich, a unit of Task Force 140 for the manned flight of Apollo 10.

Rich will be stationed approximately 400 miles east of Cape Kennedy, on the first revolution ground track of the spacecraft to recover the astronauts should there be a launch vehicle malfunction

prior to orbital insertion.

The 364 Ft. 3,100-ton Saturn Five launch vehicle is carrying astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, Eugene Cernan and John Young on a scheduled eight-day flight, following blast-off Sunday.

The Apollo 10 mission is one of the final steps before reaching the ultimate goal of the Apollo program, to land men on the moon for limited observation and exploration and assure their safe recovery upon return to earth.

Assistance Urged In Acreage Survey

During the last half of May, some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer says it will be the annual acreage survey and that many farmers in Motley County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Palmer, state statistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature, explains the county agent, has provided a program of estimates for each county. Because Texas covers

such a wide area, state totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry; hence, the need for county information. The program is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The county agent urges all farmers in the county who receive the questionnaire to fill it out accurately and completely and return it as soon as possible to the Reporting Service.

Compliance Survey To Be Conducted by Internal Revenue

DALLAS — (Special) — A "compliance survey" of many Motley County business firms to determine if they are filing all required federal tax returns will begin soon, the Internal Revenue Service said today.

District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr., said the survey will take about three months to complete and will be conducted by Revenue Officers. A cross section of non-farm businesses will be checked to see if all required tax returns are being filed.

Mr. Campbell said the current survey is not designed to determine whether returns are accurate but only whether all required returns are filed. The survey will also be used to check the completeness of the IRS Master File of business taxpayers.

Most businesses comply conscientiously with the tax laws, Mr. Campbell said. However, he added, these laws are complex, and some business taxpayers may not be fully aware of all the tax returns which apply to their particular business operations. These may include returns covering income, withholding, social security, and a variety of miscellaneous excise taxes.

"Compliance surveys" Mr. Campbell said, are a continuous part of the regular IRS program to maintain high levels of taxpayer compliance.

Most of the delinquencies brought to light will be the result of honest misunderstandings and oversight. But the rare instances of flagrant abuse which may be discovered will, of course, be dealt with according to law, he added.
