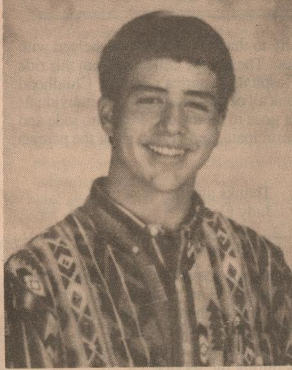

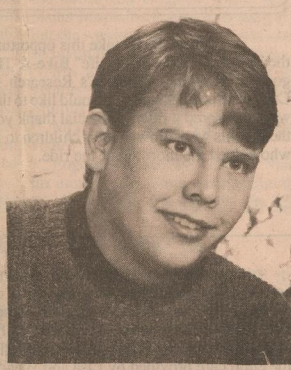
School will dismiss on Friday, May 28. There will be an awards program at 1:30 p.m. in the gym and busses will run immediately afterwards.

FmHA Has Loan Funds Available To Help Socially Disadvantaged

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Dickens or Motley counties, Larry Clements, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership

loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Clements said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration County Office in their area, Larry Clements said.

The city of Porral Chih, Mexico, is one of history and customs. Porral Chih is known for its infamous silver and gold mines and the legendary Pancho Villa; yet, one woman left this city of tradition for a dream.

Magdalena Carlson always dreamed of coming to the United States and pursuing her hopes.

"I always would dream to change my destiny...to come to the United States," said Magdalena.

At 30 years old, Magdalena was working in Ft. Stockton, Texas on a provisional Visa. Suddenly, her life changed completely with her marriage to Charles Carlson. While living in Matador and helping with housework, Magdalena came to a conclusion. She wanted to do something different, so she decided to jump into her own business. Magdalena's husband and son, Jack, helped her call the State Comptroller's office in Austin to acquire a building to lease. Soon, Magdalena was acquiring all kinds of items for her second hand store.

Once the word got out, many local residents began bringing loads of clothes, ceramics, antiques, furniture, and books to the store. At first, Magdalena felt a bit timid about the business. However, she continued to learn from her endeavor and gained many out of town customers, including several antique dealers.

"I am very pleased to live in this part of the country," commended Magdalena, "I am very comfortable. There is nothing better than to work for yourself."

Magdalena has two sisters and one brother still residing in Mexico. One owns a large business supplying groceries to several supermarkets while the other maintains a small restaurant. Her brother

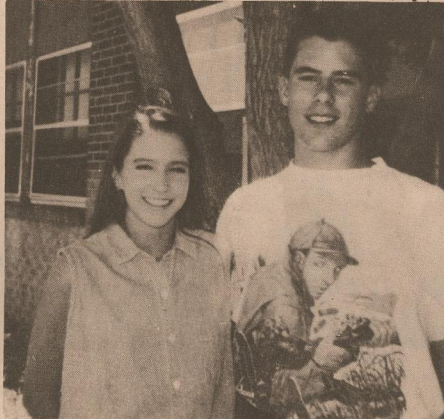
