The city of Porral Chih, Mexico, is one of history and customs. Porral Chih is known for its infamous silver and gold

Allown for its intantous stret and gott mines and the legendary Pancho Villa; yet, one woman left this city of tradition for a dream. Magdelina Carlson always dreamed of coming to the United States and pursu-ing her hopes. "I always would dream to change my

"I always would dream to change my destiny...to come to the United States," said Magdelina. At 30 years old, Magdelina was work-

At 30 years old, Magdelina was work-ing in Ft. Stockton, Texas on a provi-sional Visa. Suddenly, her life changed completely with her marriage to Charles Carlson. Her "destiny" brought her to Matador after marrying Charles on May 7, 1970. Magdelina was a legal resident of the U.S. only 60 days later. Magdelina came from a big business family. She began working for an uncle when she was very voung in Mexico at a

when she was very young in Mexico at a country and western store. Magdelina says since that time she has always had a feeling to be in sales

While living in Matador and helping with housework, Magdelina came to a conclusion. She wanted to do something different, so she decided to jump into her own business. Magdelina's husband and son, Jack, helped her call the State Comp troller's office in Austin to acquire a build-ing to lease. Soon, Magdelina was ac-quiring all kinds of items for her second hand store

nand store. Once the word got out, many local residents began bringing loads of clothes, ceramics, antiques, furniture, and books to the store. At first, Magdelina felt a bit timid about the business. However, she continued to learn from her endeavor and gained many out of town customers, including several antique dealers.

"I am very pleased to live in this part of the country," commened Magdelina, "I am very comfortable. There is nothing better than to work for yourself." Magdelina has two sisters and one

brother still residing in Mexico. One owns a large business supplying groceries to several supermarkets while the other maintains a small restaurant. Her brother continued on page 2
