## Advice for Charting Life Given Class in Baccalaureate Message

Matador High School graduates heard a message of timely advice and inspiration Sunday night in Baccalaureate Services at the First Baptist Church. Speaker was Rev. Larry Heard, pastor.

Taking his text from the 43rd chapter of Genesis, Rev. Heard stressed the importance of a proper pilot and purpose, and the right emotions.

"For a pilot, take God on your journey through life," he urged. "Don't postpone, or forget to do this... if you will take God first in your life, He will be with you in the end."

### 4-H Youths Carry Out Projects to Aid Nation's Program of Conservation

**SPECIAL** — What is conservation? If 10 people were asked the question, in all probability there would be 10 different answers.

But if they were asked Who is responsible for conservation of the nation's natural resources, they would undoubtedly answer, "Everyone!" And they would be right.

Conservation is everyone's business, even youngsters. Proof of this is in the national 4-H Conservation of Natural Resources program which involves parents, children, educators, and conservation specialists. The 4-H members carry out projects in soil and water conservation, wildlife preservation, reforestation, and anti-pollution.

The farm boy works to prevent soil erosion, water contamination, forest fires, drought and damage to crops and livestock. This boy wants to learn about soil testing, irrigation, land management, weed and insect control to insure profitable farming operations.

Urban 4-H'ers are concerned with protecting towns and cities from air and water pollution,

blight and deterioration. They want to enjoy fishing and swimming in recreational areas where they can catch a prize fish instead of an old boot, or dive into a clean lake instead of one contaminated with rubbish or harmful bacteria.

All 4-H boys and girls want to enjoy the beauty of their own home grounds, parks, forests and countryside. The youths highlight conservation through club activities, community action programs and individual projects. They give talks, appear on television and radio, make exhibits and give out conservation information.

Among the nation's leading 4-H conservationists last year was a teenage boy whose project included raising pheasants for the New Jersey State Division of Fish and Game in connection with wildlife preservation. Another lad perfected a conservation demonstration for television viewers in the West Central part of Colorado. Both boys were involved in county-wide conservation activities.

The 4-H Conservation club members now exceed a quarter million. They are guided and as-

sisted in their individual projects by adult leaders, county extension agents and other qualified persons. Parents often team up with their offspring in tackling the large, long-range projects.

Another participator is John Deere, the 4-H Conservation program sponsor. For the fifth straight year, John Deere has provided funds for county, state and national awards given annually to 4-H'ers who have completed the best conservation projects in the three categories of competition.

The highest award is the \$600 national scholarship presented to six national champions. State winners are delegates to the National 4-H Congress, in Chicago, and county winners receive the conservation medal.

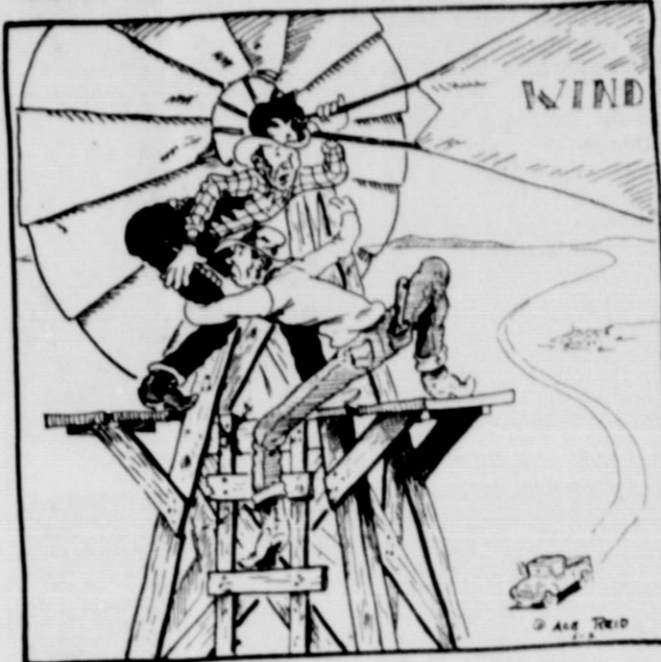

### Rural Progress Spurred by FHA

"Rural community progress in Texas has been spurred by the development of 436 modern water systems, sewer systems, and recreation centers through the Farmers Home Administration," Motley County Supervisor Alfred A. Harrison said today.

Harrison reported on benefits brought to the state under Rural Community Facilities programs that have been enlarged under President Johnson's efforts to improve living conditions in rural areas.

Water supply problems have been solved for more than 180,000 people in rural Texas through 418 water systems made possible by FHA loans and grants totaling more than \$54 million. The new systems serve both rural towns and countryside where the people have had to exist on uncertain and, sometimes, unsafe water supplies.

Harrison reported that three rural communities in the State also have new or improved waste disposal systems through FHA loans and grants approved the past two years. At present, there are 48 waste disposal projects underway in Texas from application stage to those under construction.

"We are beginning to make real progress toward the President's goal of clear, constant water for all of rural America," Harrison said. "Towns benefited by the program are able to improve living standards and accommodate new business and industry when they can offer the same kind of water service as found in the city."

Through insurance of private loan financing, the Agency also has made possible the construction of 15 outdoor recreation centers developed by community associations and servicing an estimated 13,500 people in rural

Texas. The centers give rural families the same opportunity as city and suburban dwellers to enjoy modern swimming pools, playing fields, golf, boating, and other forms of outdoor recreation.

Harrison said the Agency also has made grants to 60 counties of the state for comprehensive planning of the future development of water and waste disposal services in rural areas.

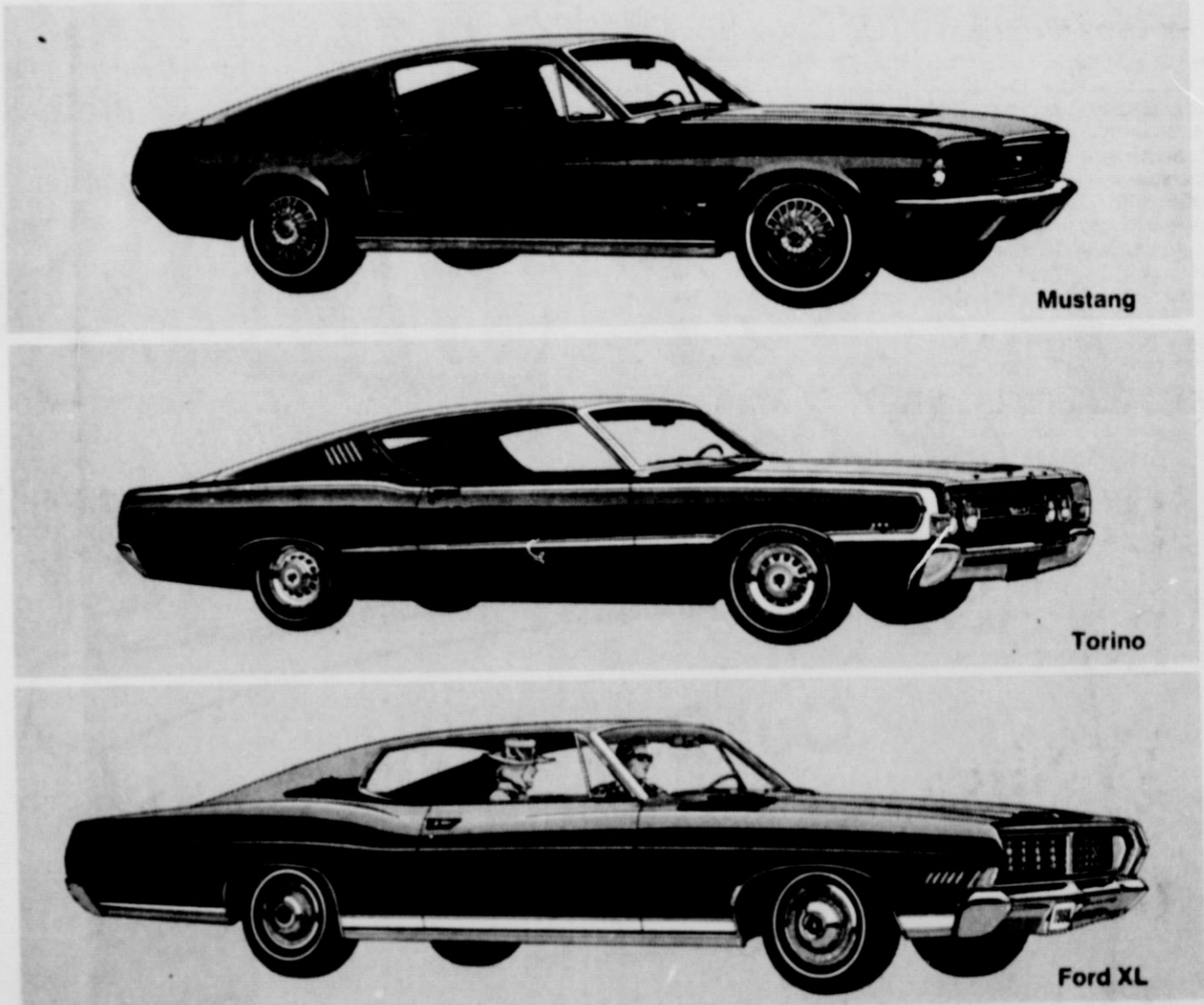

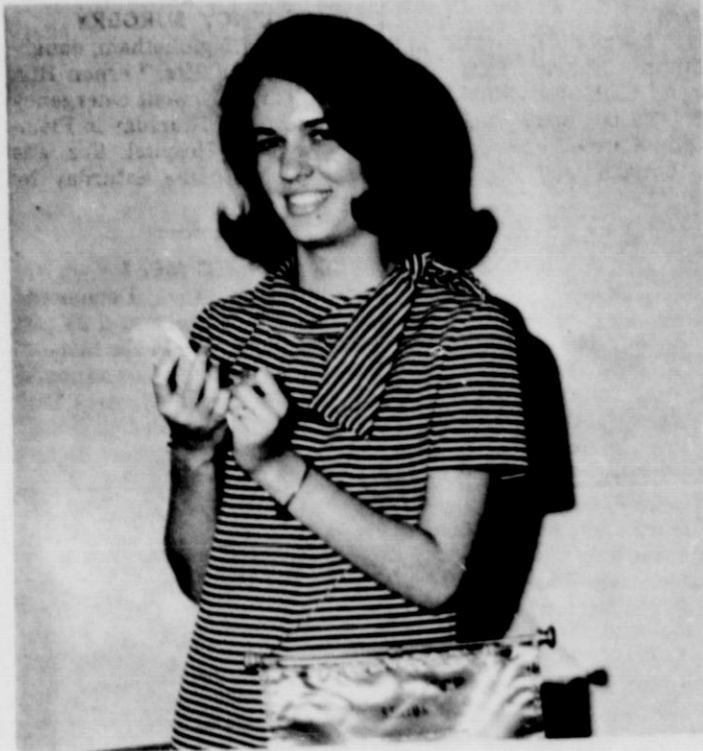

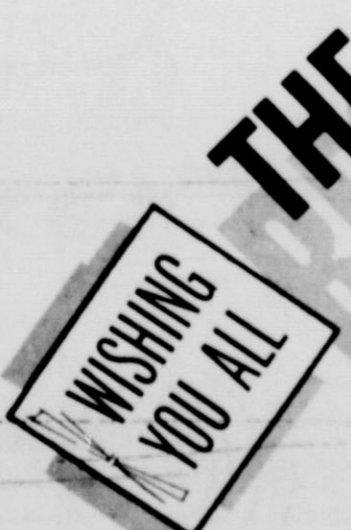

AUSTIN — Presently there are two major topics of speculation in capitol corridors:

1. When will Gov. John Connally call the legislature into special session?

2. Who will win the gubernatorial runoff race . . . Conservative Preston Smith or Liberal Don Yarborough?

As for Item No. 1, Governor Connally must call the lawmakers back to the capitol by mid-June at the latest to pass a 1969 budget and a new tax bill ranging in the \$125,000,000 a year bracket. Congressional approval of the 10 per cent federal income tax surcharge may drive the state tax requirement even higher. This because a reduction in income will affect the sales tax revenue in Texas.

Legislators mention June 4, June 10 and June 11 as probable starting dates. Rumors were widespread at last week's Legislative Budget Board meeting that Connally was considering calling the session before the June 1 runoff election.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith told reporters that he feels it will be "difficult" for the legislature to pass a major tax bill in a 30-day special session, starting cold.

House Appropriations Committee Chairman W. S. Heatly of Paducah noted that never before have lawmakers been called to pass a complete general appropriations bill in a bobtailed session. He said he would like to start his committee to work unofficially on budget proposals even before the session begins, in hope of meeting the deadline.

As if the legislature did not have its hands full with financial matters, liquor-by-the-drink advocates are urging Connally to submit that red hot issue to the special session. Passage of a May 4 referendum favoring mixed-drink-sales by a narrow margin added impetus for early consideration by legislators.

Smith and key lawmakers feel that the referendum was not conclusive enough numerically to be of any great benefit in winning legislative approval of mixed-drink sales.

As for Item No. 2, Smith and Yarborough now are engaged in a runoff battle to determine who will be the Democratic candidate for governor of Texas.

Yarborough led by 36,000 votes in the first primary. But Smith quickly picked up the whole-hearted endorsements of third place candidate Waggoner Carr and fifth place runner Eugene Locke.

Classic liberal-conservative lines are drawn in the Yarborough-Smith clash. Researchers contend that continuing dis-

interest and a light turnout on June 1 could prove disastrous to Smith.

Republican gubernatorial nominee Paul Eggers, who won hands down in a light-vote GOP primary, plans a serious, well-financed general election campaign against the winner of the Yarborough-Smith runoff.

Ren Barnes won the Democratic nomination for lieutenant governor over two opponents, State Rep. Don Gladden and former Rep. Gene Smith, both of Fort Worth. Barnes' near-record majority (exceeding 76 per cent) means that he will be a key figure in the state government during the next two years.

District Judges Tom Reavley of Austin and Sears McGee of Houston are new justices-elect of the State Supreme Court. They won Democratic nomination and are unopposed by Republicans.

**VETERAN DPS CHIEF DIES**—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., 66, Texas' top police officer and head of the vast Department of Public Safety for 30 years, died of cancer.

All of the state's highest officials joined in mourning his loss. "He was one of the most capable and effective law enforcement administrators in America," said Governor Connally. "Under his leadership, the Texas Department of Public Safety has become recognized throughout the nation as a symbol of law and order. Its reputation will live as a personal tribute to Colonel Garrison."

Wilson E. Speir is serving as acting director of DPS.

**COURTS SPEAK**—U. S. Supreme Court has postponed a suit which would require the State of Colorado to meet the obligations of downstream discharges from the Rio Grande as long as the state meets compact requirements for supplying water to Texas and New Mexico. Suit can be resumed any time Colorado fails to comply.

State Supreme Court upheld a \$44,400 damage verdict favoring a Jefferson County woman who claimed she suffered back injuries when a 200-pound bill collector for a loan company pushed her against a wall by forcing open a door. Over-zealous collector came to collect a car note.

High Court set June 12 for review of an insurance company's claim that it is not obligated to pay on its bond covering a building contractor for concrete sold directly to the owner of a new apartment complex that's under construction.

Travis County 126th District Court continued its temporary injunction against the Liquor Control Board enforcing the ban on cash sales in private bottle clubs. Case will be heard in July.

**OIL-GAS LEASES SOLD**—Sale of 34,368 acres of state oil and gas leases the first week in May brought \$1,400,000 in new revenue to the state's coffers. So reports Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler.

Biggest single bid was \$211,235 for 640 acres in Ward County by Humble Oil and Refining Company. Bids on 1,590 acres of sulphur leases brought \$155,267. Highest of these bids was by Duval Corporation for \$76,918 on 40 acres in Culberson County.

**KINDERGARTEN STANDARDS**—For the first time, the State Board of Education has adopted professional standards for Texas kindergarten teachers. This step could be in the direction of recent suggestions of public, state-supported kindergartens.

Board also took note of the state's desegregation problems by approving the appointment of two more staff members to the Texas Education Agency to work solely with local school districts in complying with federal law and court decisions on the subject.

Also getting the Board's endorsement was a preliminary plan to study how best to make use of Texas' educational manpower and to assess pupil needs. Study is being made in conjunction with the U. S. Office of Education to help TEA coordinate programs supported by some \$129,000,000 in federal funds.

**Short Shorts**  
Constitutional revision committee suggests that Texas' top state appellate judges be appointed rather than elected.

General revenue fund dipped into the red to the tune of \$73,200,000 on May 1, but will be coming up soon with franchise and quarterly sales tax collec-

tions, says State Comptroller, Robert S. Calvert.

American Party of Texas now claims a membership of 90,000 or nearly six times the needed 14,000 strength to get Alabaman George Wallace on the November ballot as a presidential candidate.

Legislative Budget Board has recommended a \$657,000 appropriation to build and equip a veterinary diagnostic laboratory on the Texas A&M University campus.

Democratic and Republican executive committees met here Tuesday (May 14) to canvass statewide primary election returns.

Kyle Thompson, veteran UPI newsman who broke in on the Wichita Falls Record-News, is new press secretary to Governor Connally.

During the month of March, 1,873 criminal complaints were filed by the liquor Control Board, with 1,688 convictions, nine jail sentences and fines totalling \$61,236.

State Auditor George W. McNeil named Lee H. Ashmore of Fort Worth as First Assistant State Auditor.

Attorney General Martin has ruled that it is illegal for commercial airliners to serve liquor or beer on flights over Texas.

Also Attorney General Martin reports that his office won 261 lawsuits out of 263 cases tried in April. During the fiscal year 2,297 cases were won by the state and 54 lost. A total of 3,132 cases still are pending.

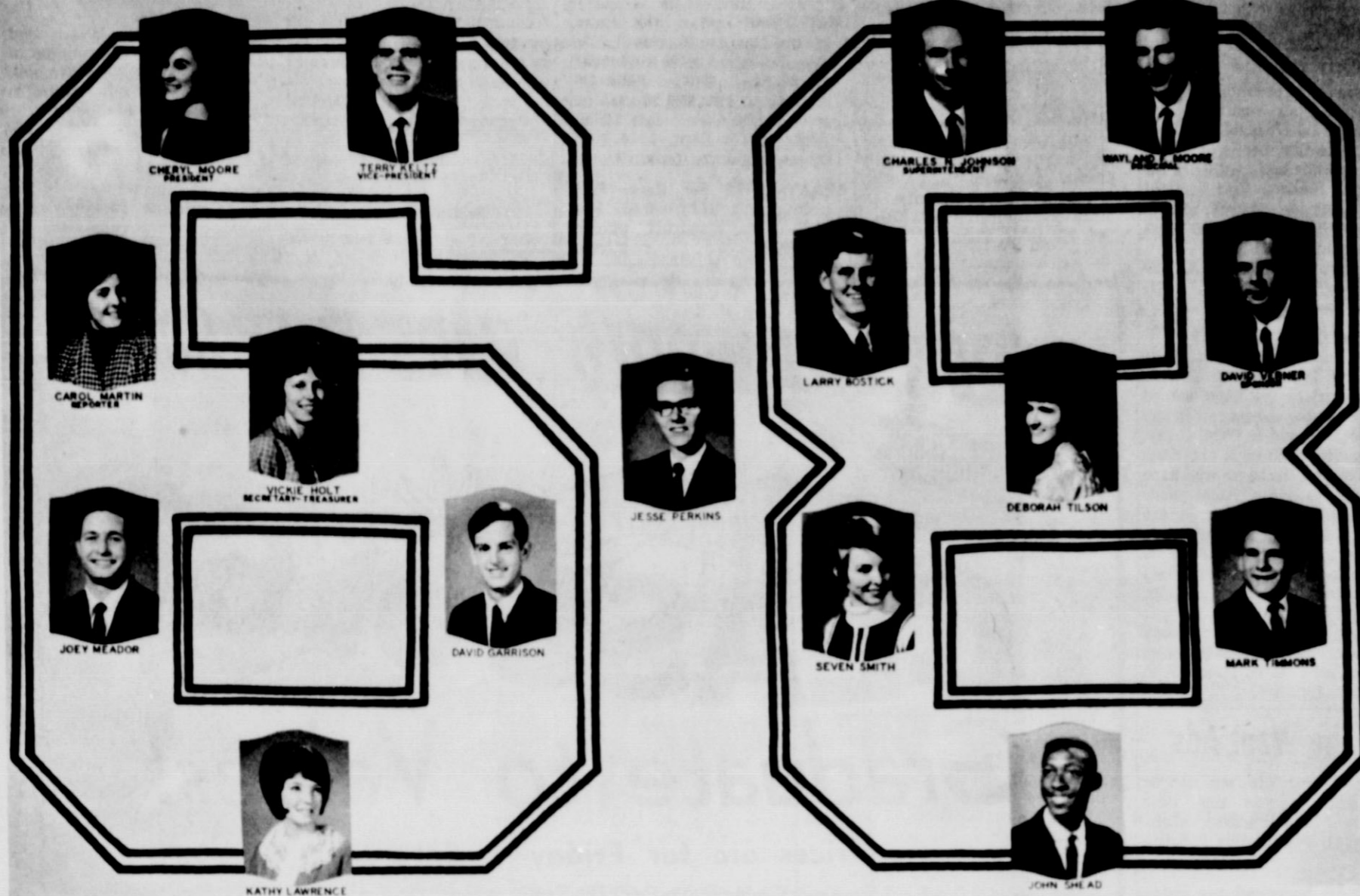

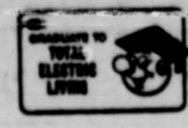
