Motley County Superintendent Gives A Local Point Of View On The Propositions

Texans go to the polls May 1st to vote on three seperate proposed constitutional amendments that could change the way Texas finances its public schools. What these amendments entail is key to understanding their effects on our school and the public in general.

Voters have been and will be inundated with contradictory information on all three constitutional amendments

making the decision on how to vote more confusing than it already is.

Looking at these amendments and trying to explain their effects on Motley County I.S.D. is very difficult, especially state is going to do this.

WEDDING BELLS MEAN WEDDING BILLS.

With the romance, excitement and nervousness of spring fancies and June brides, a couple can easily lose track of the financial aspect of a wedding. An average formal wedding costs more than \$13,000 and may run two to three times that amount. Even a small, informal wedding runs up bills quickly.

For spring or summer weddings, planning has already begun. But it's not too late to get control of spending associated with the big day. Start your budget by writing down the expected cost of items already planned. Add any other antici-

already planned. Add any other anticipated expenses and expect unplanned costs to occur.

For those just beginning to plan, set a tentative budget for the wedding before talking to wedding consultants and service providers. You need to decide what you can spend, not what other people think you should spend. The tentative budget may need adjusting, but your original estimate will help you stay on target by reminding you to trim expenses wher-

by reminding you to trim expenses wher-

ever you can.
In setting a budget, consider whether to include these items:

* Invitations, announcements and

postage

* Engagement and wedding rings.

* Blood tests

* Marriage certificate

* Fees for the ceremony (music, clergy)

* Rental cost for facility (ceremony, reception and rehearsal)

* Bride and groom's attire

- * Bride and groom's attire

 * Attendants' attire

 * Transportation to ceremony

 * Flowers (including, ceremony, re-

- * Wedding cake

 * Reception food and drink, decorations and entertainment
- * Gifts for attendants, family, wed-
- ding guests

 * Meals for guests or attendants (re-hearsal dinner, seated or buffet reception, out -of-town guests)

 * Lodging and transportation for out-
- of-town guests

 * Wedding coordinator

* Honeymoon trip.

Decide who will pay for what. Traditionally, the bride's family has shouldered most of the wedding cost. That trend is changing. Many couples today pay for their own weddings or share costs

equally between families. Be sure to include everyone who is paying in the budget discussions. One person, for example, may be planning on simple floral greenery, while another anticipates elaborate decorations. Discussing it beforehand eases tensions later.

Smaller weddings generally cost less than those with more guests. For example, most bakers charge for the wedding cake by number of guests. Larger weddings will require a larger facility, which will increase rental charges. Larger weddings usually have more attendants, increasing the costs associated with atincreasing the costs associated with attendants' food, clothing, gifts and trans-

portation.
Allowing plenty of time can save money and tempers. Printers are likely to charge extra for "rush" orders on invitations or announcements. Low-cost facili-ties or service providers may be booked up for your wedding date if you wait too late to schedule. Starting early allows you to buy the bride's, groom's, and attendants' attire on lay-away, budgeting your

money as you go.

Be sure to get all arrangements in writing. While you may view your wedding with romantic illusion, it is business to service providers. Make sure you know your obligation in case of changes or cancellations, get written quotes on costs

and keep receipts for any deposits or early payments.

After setting up by your budget, review it regularly. Look at it weekly at first and daily as the wedding date nears. As expenses mount, see if you can anticipate and prevent unexpected expenses or compensate for them by cutting down somewhere else. Evaluate whether you

somewhere esse. Evaluate whether you can pay some costs ahead of time to save finance charges or reduce the lump sum which will need to be paid later, if expenses are getting out of hand, discuss whether some items can be cut from the budget to save money.

As your wedding nears you can relax and enjoy, it knowing that you are in

As your wedding nears you can relax and enjoy it, knowing that you are in control of your finances. Extra expenses will undoubtedly crop up, but you willnot be staggered by the overall total you owe as you start your life together.
