He had been in failing health for some time and had suffered mild heart attacks during the past month.

Services were held at 10:00 a.m. Saturday in Dopkins Funeral Chapel in Dinuba. Officiating was the Rev. Charles Douglas, Baptist minister of Visalia, California. Burial was in Smith Mountain Cemetery, located

between Orosi and Dinuba. Mr Tunnell was school superintendent here for 17 years, from 1929 until 1946, when he resigned and moved to the West Coast.



However, when jailer Ray Webb took breakfast to prisoner Michael Wayne King Friday, the jail was empty. It was 8 o'clock, one hour earlier than the usual breakfast time. The reason was that King was to be taken to Lubbock for questioning on other charges.

Jailer Webb called Sheriff Jinks Wilson and further investigations were made. A bar had been sawed from a north window in the runaround, and an opening of 634 inches had been made. One end of the bar had previously been sawed and welded, but the welding was not secure.

How did the Bible-reading prisoner get out of the security area? The door is released by a lever encased in an iron box. It is considered impossible to reach the lever from the cell. The 28-year-old rapist had been locked in the maximum confinement cell the night

Jailer Webb noticed that King did not eat his evening meal the day before. It is thought that he was trying to keep himself thin enough to pass through the narrow

King's wife Brenda Joyce King, was also missing Friday morning. Many theories have been advanced as to how the 'impossible' escape was made and a popular one is that he had help from the outside.

King made his escape from the jail on the previous Saturday by an attack on Deputy Fred "Snow" Crenshaw. He was recaptured the next morning

He had pleaded guilty to a rape charge August 13 and had been sentenced to 10 awaiting transfer at the time of his second escape.

## Auxilliary Power Plant Ready For Service Here

ELECTRIC power is supplied here from three directions by the West Texas Utilities Company, but at times the voltage may vary because of the increased

To protect the area, the company last week located a portable auxiliary unit at the sub station west of town. It is a giant machine weighing over 130,000 pounds and requiring 50 wheels "on the ground" to move it here from Marfa. It cost the company \$5000 to move.

The plant is completely automatic. Any time the current falls low, the plant starts up. Resalto Engineer Jimmy Tom from Haskell (Paint Rock plant) was here last week directing the location of the plant.

The plant has a 1,440 HP motor to drive the generator. Capacity is 400 gallons of

plant 18 hours. It requires 275 gallons of lubricating oil "to change the oil." The cooling equipment requires 230 gallons of water

It was bought new 18 years ago from General Motors and used by West Texas Utilities Company. It was shipped by the factory on railway trucks, which were later sent back after the plant was located at Marfa. It has a railroad coupling and was made especially as a portable plant. The car is 561/2 feet long, over 101/2 feet wide and over 15 feet tall.

Mashburn Trucking Co. of Childress made the delivery on special equipment valued in the neighborhood of \$200,000.


