



Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and imployees of counties or other political subdivisons of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the agcompensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for memof the Legislature bers from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for em-ployees of the State of ployees Texas.

The wording of the pro-posed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state ployees."

We have been happy to have had a part in making this vital service available to the residents of this area, and would gladly continue if it were possible. We sincerely hope that the ambulance service will be continued, and will be superior to that which we have been able to offer in the past. Due to the lack of physicians and medical facilities in the county, the ambulance assumes an even more vital role as our only link with medical aid.

This will be a difficult problem to solve, but our city and county officials are working hard to find an efficient means of providing ambulance service for the residents.

Until such time as an alternate ambulance service is worked out, please feel free to continue to call the funeral home if you need help. Although we cannot make the call personally, we will locate someone qualified to help you. The telephone number for ambulance service will be changed in the very near future, but until that time, we will be glad to take all calls and refer them to the proper people.

We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their concern during my illness, and the assistance of friends and business associates who have made it possible to continue with both the funeral home and ambulance service during this period of convalescence.
