Buying instant coffee today leaves me with a guilty feeling that I am in someway cheating on the past.

His first star came in August 1969 and promotion to Major General came August 1, 1971. General Reilly is a graduate of the Air Command and Staff College and the Air War College. His military decorations and awards include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Air Force Commendation Medal and Army Commend-







COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

I borrowed this from Oklahoma, but think you will agree it fits Motley County. To keep cultivated fields and pastures clean, control weeds in the fence rows. Herbicides can be applied as soil sterilants during the winter or early spring to control these weeds during the symmer. An advantage of this early application is the treatments can be made before your work load becomes so heavy. You can't estimate the

money lost to such fence row weeds. Plants which can poison livestock often hide in fence rows, and it's hard to determine if a poisoned animal ate a weed in the pasture or fence row.

You'll find it almost impossible to get rid of weeds if seeds are produced in fence rows each year and distributed over the area where you've used control methods. Many weeds produce large numbers of seeds which spread easily. One lambsquarter plant, for example,

can produce 72,000 seeds, and a mature nutgrass plant may produce more than 2,420 +++

COUNTY AGENT tend to calve early throughout life. Additional time can also be given these animals at calving time.

Use judgement when selecting a bull. Do not select a large, thick shouldered. heavy-muscled bull. When available, use birth weight and calving difficulty records in bull selection.

Purchase bull early. Have him on the place 45 to 60 days prior to breeding time. This allows for the adjustment period.

Evaluate semen and reproductive soundness. Have tests made two weeks before the breeding season. This will detect low fertility animals and give time to replace before a calf crop is missed or reduced.

Provide adequage bull power. One yearling bull for each 15 to 20 cows, and one mature bull for each 25 to 30 cows. Bulls should be in good condition, but not fat. If foot trimming is needed, do so before breeding season.

Ovserve the breeding pasture frequently. See that the bull is finding and breeding animals. Remove, wire, boards and other materials that could cause injury.

testing should be done no later than 4 to 5 months after the breeding season starts. Other work can be done at this time, and remember, it costs \$40 to \$100 to carry an open cow for a year.

Provide adequate nutrition prior to calving. Feed cows about 9 lbs. TDN per head per day. Also provide vitamin A, minerals and salt. Separate two-year olds and These feed separately.

younger animals often suffer from competition from older animals for feed, and this also groups those that may have calving problems.

Observe the herd closely at calving time. Assistance provided on time may not only save the calf, but the cow as well.

Be prepared for calving. Have the equipment you need, and don't hesitate to call a Vet if needed.

Keep birth weights and calving difficulty record. this will help to identify the sires and dams you want to keep or eliminate.


