### Report Given At Meeting

At the March meeting of American Legion-Auxiliary, Mr. and Mrs. Ward Rattan told of their visit to the Freedom Train during its stop in Wichita Falls. One item of particular interest was the Freedom Bell on display.

The Freedom Bell is twice the size of Philadelphia's Liberty Bell after which it was patterned, and was cast on behalf of the nation's youth by the American Legion and its auxiliaries.

The bell, 7½ feet high and weighing 8½ tons was cast last January 17 at the N. V. Petit-Fritsen Bell Foundry, Aarle-Rixtle, Holland. There was no firm in the U.S. that could handle the job. The Dutch firm, though, is an affiliate of the I. T. Verdin Co., Cincinnati, Ohio, the largest bell manufacturer in the U.S.

Made of 80 per cent copper and 20 per cent tin, the bell is tuned to the musical note, "F," exactly one octave below the sound of the Liberty Bell which was rung for the last time in 1846.

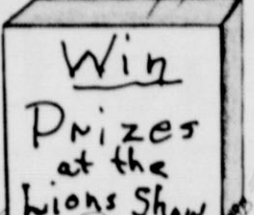

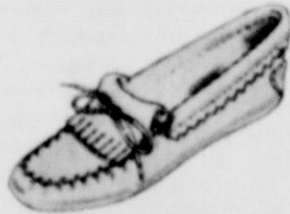

## TEXAS TALK

**Controlled traffic farming** is a concept getting a lot of attention lately... and probably even more in the future. Idea of the operation is to keep tractors moving only on surfaces not used for crops. Basically that seems quite un-reasonable since the crops are in the field and it is usually necessary to get the tractor out there to do any good. None of that has changed. With controlled traffic farming the tractor would be driven on paths between the rows. Paths used only for the machinery. In most concepts of this type operation the paths would be the only points of compaction in the field. Therein lies the reason for concern. If compaction can be reduced, root systems can be more completely developed and higher yields would result. At Auburn University in Alabama a controlled traffic farm experiment resulted in a yield 43 percent higher than crops grown with conventional tillage.
