



Using guidelines drawn by the Texas Criminal Justice Council, the SPAG regional concept is backed by built-in provisions for individual local considerations, ing in new public safety benefits for the various communities while serving the region's common bond.

Partial funding for the South Plains equipment procurement comes through capital grants from the Law **Enforcement Assistance** Administration.

Similar General Electric regional communication systems already are serving or will serve, more than 10 regional planning districts throughout the state.


County led at halftime 24-7. In the third quarter Sudan again scored and at the end of the third quarter the score stood at 24-13.

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

## Public Health Aid To Serve County

Operating as a "central umbrella agency," the Lubbock headquarters of Public Health Region 2 has opened its office at 3411 Knoxville Ave. to serve 32 West Texas counties with Texas State Department of Health pro-

Dr. John P. Board Jr., regional director of the new office, said the region stretches south to the Mexican border and north to Bailey, Hale, Floyd, and Motley counties.

'Our office is part of a decentralization of the state health office in Austin," Dr. Board said. "All health programs will be directed through our office for 21 West Texas counties currently not being served by city or county health departments.

"The health needs of West Texas are completely different from the health needs in East Texas. That is one reason for decentralization of the Austin headquarters -- to find out what those needs are." Dr. Board said.






