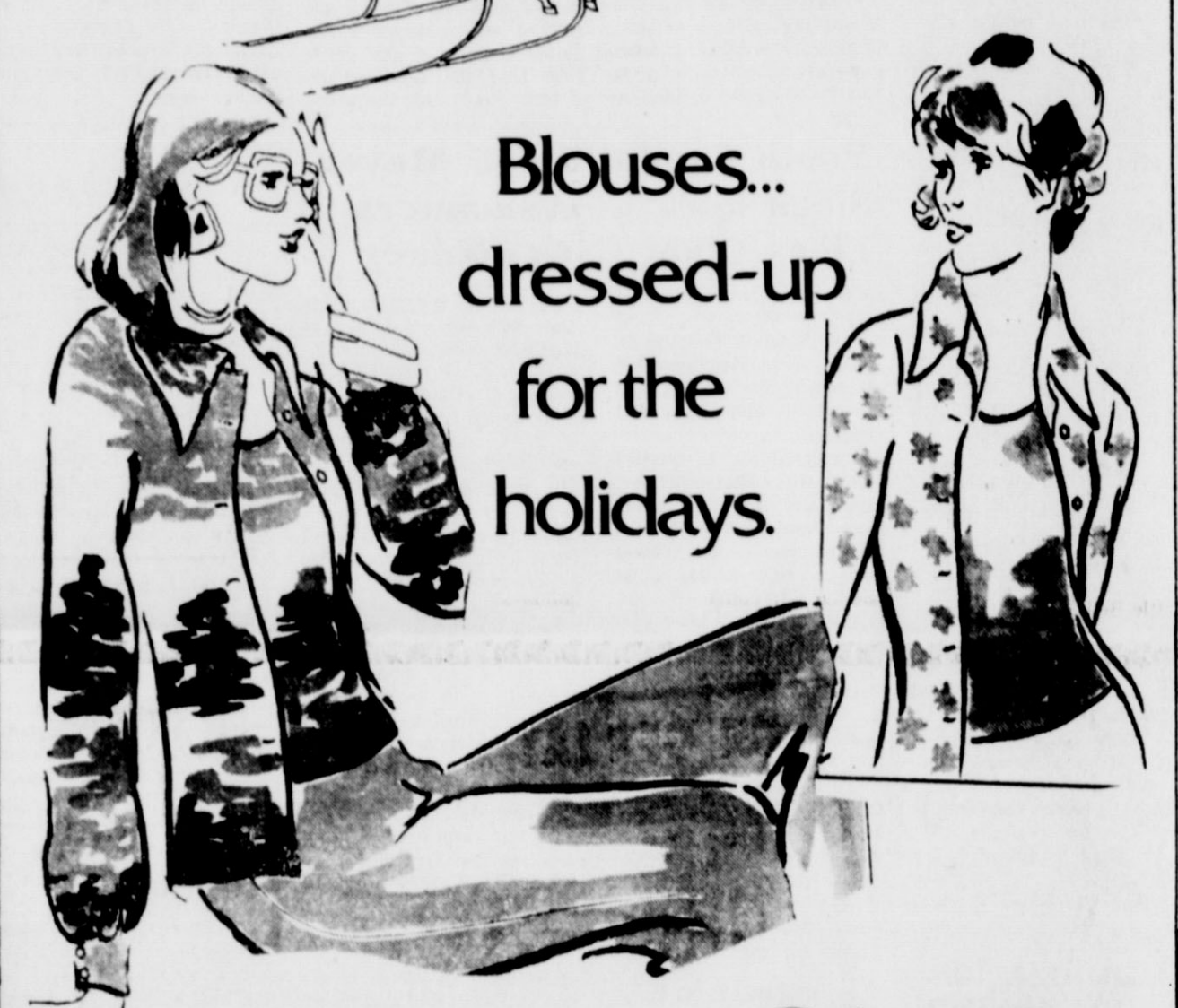
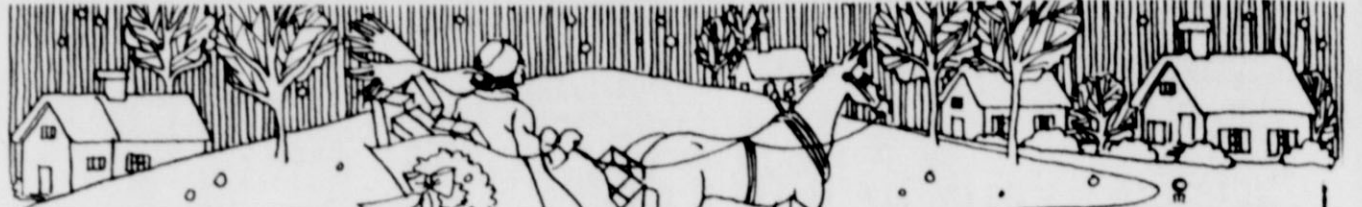
So faith comes from hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ. Ro. 10:17.

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New Texas Almanac Adds Bicentennial Special Features

The American Revolution of 1776 set in motion events that led to the colonization of Texas and eventually to its own struggle for self-government, notes the new 1976-'77 edition of the Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

Those historic events affecting Texas have been traced in an article written especially for the Texas Almanac by the late R. Henderson Shuffler, editor, historian and, at the time of his death in the summer of 1975, executive director of the Institute of Texas Cultures at San Antonio.

"What we call the American Revolution was simply the first stage of the revolution of the Americas," Shuffler wrote. "Texas was affected directly by the American Revolution and the course of its history for centuries to come was shaped by the outcome."

Also in the Almanac's Bicentennial section, Sam Kinch Sr., chairman of American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, tells of the American Bicentennial in Texas. A commission listing of Texas events during the bicentennial year is included.

The new edition also contains a special section on "Gardening in Texas" prepared by specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is a guide for planting vegetables, fruit and nut trees and ornamentals in all sections of the state.

home of the late Lyndon B. Johnson, 36th President of the United States.

"Nowhere else in this land is there a place where, within a distance of a few miles, the story of an American President can be retraced through visiting the settlement of his grandparents, the birthplace, boyhood home, his 'White House' away from Washington, and his ranch where he lived in retirement and where he died and is buried," they wrote.

Other special features of the new Almanac include a history of the Texas Railroad Commission, the latest U. S. Census on manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, the service industries and transportation in Texas, an account of the 10 Travel Trails of Texas, and a history of Texas A & M University observing its 100th anniversary in 1976.

Included also are data on election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations, and sections on agriculture, manufacturing, transportation, and government.

Each Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area, the urban concentrations in which most Texans live, has an editorial page devoted to it.

A new Texas map in color, with major highways, supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department. Tourism and recreation also are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

"This is the 48th edition of the Texas Almanac that has been published since 1857," said Joe M. Dealey, president of The Dallas Morning News. "We believe it continues the high standards that have made this publication the Encyclopedia of Texas."

Fullingim To Head Alcoholism Service

Littlefield (Special) - Mr. E. Bunch Fullingim will be the new Alcoholism Service Worker in Crosby, Floyd, Dickens, Motley and King Counties, according to Jimmy Karr, Executive Director of the Community Action Council of Crosby, Dickens, and Floyd Counties.

Mr. Fullingim will replace Mr. Clarence Walters who has held the position since October, 1974. The position of Alcoholism Service Worker includes intake, guidance, referral and followup of any person in the five county area who request aid in problems resulting from alcohol abuse.

Also persons interested in alcoholism information or educational programs may contact Mr. Fullingim. He will be headquartered in Crosbyton and may be reached by calling the Crosbyton CAA office 806-675-2462.

"Mr. Walters has done an outstanding job in this area. He has helped a great number of persons who had alcoholism or alcoholism related problems," Karr said.

Mr. Fullingim is a native of this area and served a number of years as Mayor of the City of Lorenzo. He has served on the Alcoholism Drug Committee of SPAG and has attended an Alcoholism Institute sponsored by the Texas Commission on Alcoholism. He is a well known speaker in Alcoholics Anonymous groups. He and his wife will speak in Kerrville this month at an AA Convention. Mr. Fullingim is a well known civic leader and attended Texas Tech University.

"I hope I can get into all of my five counties soon. I really feel that our program can relate to the pitiful alcohol abuser and his or her family. I have personally watched this particular alcoholism project and I am proud to be a member of the team of the Alcoholism Service Workers Project," Fullingim said.

The Alcoholism Service Workers Project is sponsored by three community action agencies and covers 14 South Plains rural counties. It has two major goals. One goal is to respond to the cry of the pitiful alcoholic and to carry the message of hope to all ethnic groups in a way the people can understand and accept it.

Other Alcoholism Service Workers are Mr. David Carey, Plainview; and Mrs. Paula Valdez, Post. Joe B. Meador directs the project and is located in Littlefield. Miss Laura Crayton is secretary in the Littlefield office. The project served 395 clients in the first quarter of this program year which began on July 1, 1975.

A cardinal rule for cocktail parties is to have more than enough. Plenty of appetizers are needed as basic refreshments for those who drink little and as steady nourishment for those who drink a lot. Leftover liquor will keep.

In addition to the three senators named by Hobby, the commission will include three members of the House of Representatives appointed by the speaker, three citizens named by the governor, and various state agency heads.

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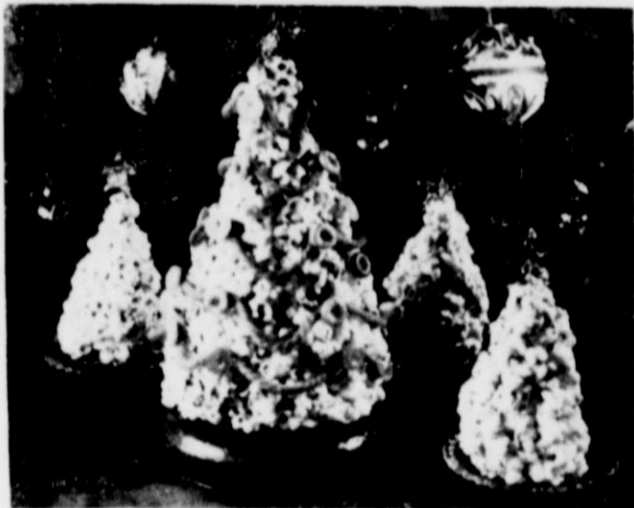

Prepare popcorn according to package directions. Pour into large pot or kettle. Heat sugar, corn syrup and water in small saucepan to 250°-266°F. or until a drop of syrup in cold water forms a hard ball. Remove from heat and stir in butter.

How to make the tree:
1. Roll foil into cone shape;
2. Slip cone completely over pot. Secure bottom;
3. Shape popcorn mixture around cone-decorate.

Four over popcorn and mix thoroughly with a wooden spoon. For a large tree, use small plastic flower pot as base. Roll heavy aluminum foil into cone; place and secure on bottom of flower pot to form tree shape. Use sugar cones for smaller tree forms. Shape popcorn mixture with buttered hands around form.

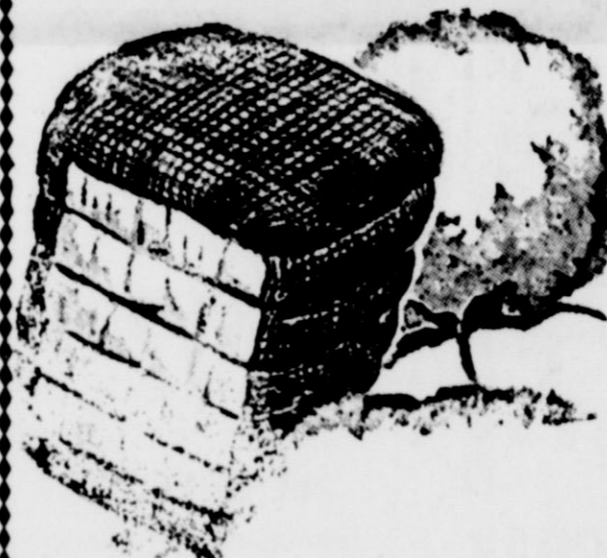
