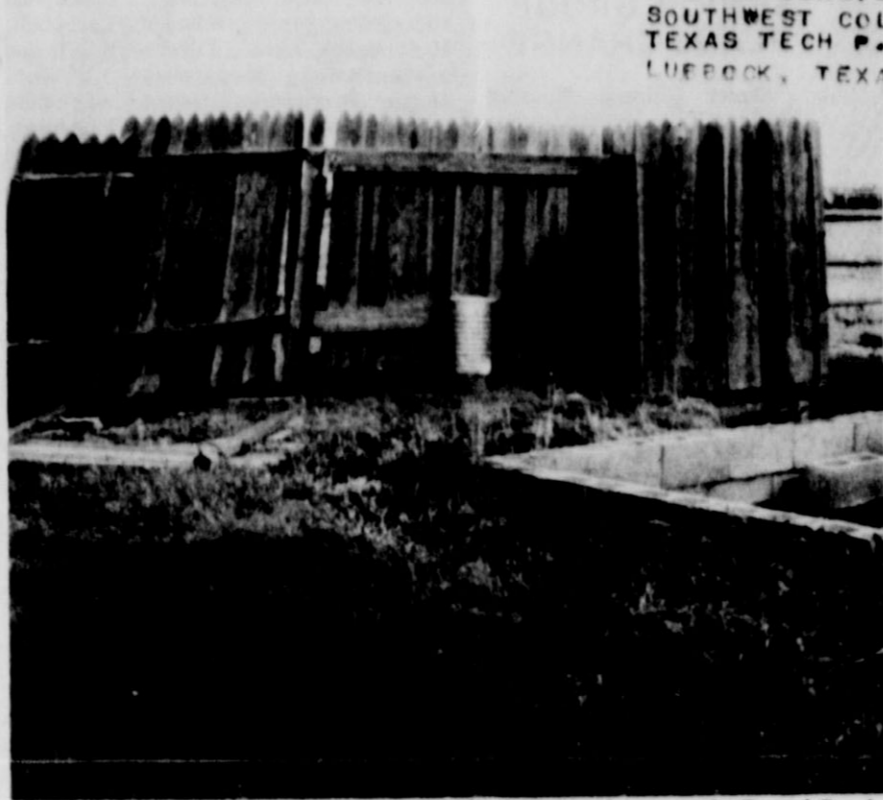

Purchase of the new truck was made necessary after the 1952 GMC truck failed to meet minimum requirements for certification by the State. Failure of the city to keep an approved 500 gallon pumper truck would have resulted in a sizeable increase in fire insurance rates for residents of Matador.

The 1952 GMC truck will be retained by the department as a back-up truck, and will be used to carry fire hose. The 1950 Chevrolet truck will be phased out of service, according to a member of the City Council.

The truck is mounted on a F-600 Ford chassis purchased from Matador Auto Company. It is equipped with a class A 500 g.p.m. midship type pump, as well as a 120 g.p.m. power-take-off driven booster pump.

Tornado Kills Ranch Family

A MATADOR business associate, his wife and 11-month-old son were victims of a tornado which leveled their home on the Barrel Creek Ranch approximately 15 miles northeast of Silverton, Sunday evening.

The rain Sunday night brought with it a tornado -- the third fatal storm in less than 20 years -- which came roaring up Palo Duro Canyon to claim the lives of rancher Leland Hugh Wood, 26, his wife, Rita, 26, and their son Ky, 11 months.

Leland Hugh Wood was co-partner with Robert H. Hill as owners of the Ranchers and Farmers Supply, which they established here last September.

What started as a gentle summer rain brought a flood of sorrow to Briscoe County's farming community.

The tornado was spawned in a system of severe thunder showers crossing the area between 7:30 and 8:30 p.m. Sunday.

The bodies of the 26-year-old rancher and his family weren't discovered until about 8 a.m. Monday by a neighbor, Glen Lindsey.

Lindsey said he had been at home Sunday throughout the storm.

Monday morning he drove down to the east section of his farm to check his crops for storm damage.

"I looked over to the Wood house," he said, "and noticed that the house and barn were missing. It was one of those situations where you hope you won't find the worst, but you're afraid you will. It was a feeling of dread."

Lindsey drove down to the site of the Wood home on the ridge of Palo Duro Canyon, passing the family's truck along the road.

He found the body of the child about 30 yards north of where the house had stood.

The rancher's body was about 75 yards north of the child.

A clock found in the debris had stopped at 8:34 p.m.

Unable to find the body of Mrs. Wood, Lindsey returned

to the rancher's truck which was mired in a barrow ditch about 3/4 mile from the homesite.

Mrs. Wood, about three months pregnant, was slumped dead on the front seat, her apparent attempt to get help unsuccessful.

Lindsey, who has been farming since the early 1960's had owned Service Elevator in Silverton until he sold it to the ambitious young rancher, Leland Wood.

Wood and his family supervised operation of the 15,000-acre Barrel Creek Ranch northeast of Silverton. The ranch was owned by his uncle, Billy Shipman of Abernathy, who had been visiting the Wood family the night of their deaths.

"We left not more than half an hour before the tornado struck," said a tearful Mrs. Shipman. "That's why we left, in fact, we were afraid the roads would get too bad."

"When we left, it was raining and hailing something terrible. It was just an awful night."

Late Monday afternoon the initial shock had worn off, and the people of Silverton became reflective.

"It's on everybody's mind," said Mrs. Charles Sarchet, who, with her husband, publishes the Briscoe County News.

The Wood auto was virtually untouched by the

twister but a nearby house was rocked off its foundation.

The Wood home itself was demolished. Debris was scattered more than 100 feet from the home.

And the ironic:

"Back during our 1970 tornado," said Mrs. Sarchet, "the auto of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Nunnally of Richardson was blown off the road. Neither was seriously injured, but it turns out that Mrs. Nunnally is Leland Wood's sister. Now isn't that odd?"

Sarchet, assistant chief of the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department, was among the first at the scene.

Mrs. Sarchet recalled past storm tragedies. "We lost one person in the 1970 tornado. We lost 21 in the 1957 storm. Now we've lost three more."

Joint funeral services for the three members of the Wood family were Tuesday, at 3 p.m. in the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. Larry Wilson, pastor, and Earl Cantwell, minister of Rock Creek Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in Silverton Cemetery by Silverton Funeral Home.

Wood was born in Amarillo, Sept. 4, 1948. He operated the Barrel Creek Ranch, and also owned interests in the Silverton Service Elevator and McKinney Feed Mill and was part owner of the Farmers and Ranchers Supply in Matador, and was in the cattle feeding business.

He was a graduate of Silverton High School and Tarleton State College.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leland Wood Sr. of Silverton; two brothers, Roy Dale and Ken, both of Silverton; three sisters, Twila Wood of Silverton, Evelyn Wood of Denver, Colo. and Mrs. Nell Dean Nunnally of Richardson; his grandparents, Mrs. R. C. Wood of Claude and Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Shipman of Abernathy.

Mrs. Wood, born at Floydada, Sept. 26, 1948, was a graduate of Floydada High School and Texas Tech University. She had taught homemaking in Silverton High School in the 1973-74 school year and was presently assisting Mr. Wood in business.

Leland Wood Married Rita Taylor on November 3, 1973 in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Mrs. Wood is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Urseil Taylor of South Plains; two brothers, Ray Taylor of South Plains and Danny Francis of Silverton; a sister, Mrs. Kay Gilbert of Howell, Michigan; and her grandmother, Mrs. Ora Jacobs of Quitaque.

Ky Ray Wood was born July 16, 1974 in Plainview.

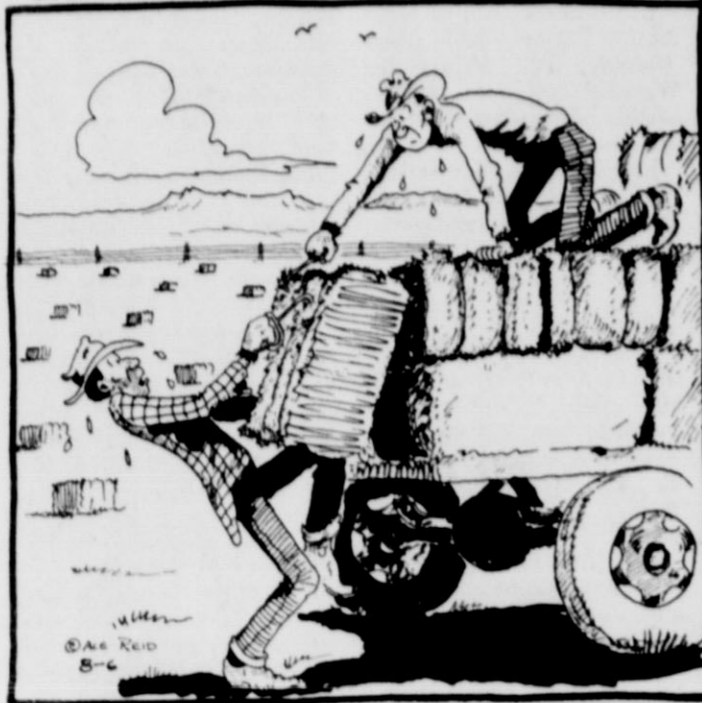

TEXAS TALK

Mix a little cotton with your orange juice and it nearly equals milk. At least in protein percentage. This is just one of the many possibilities now being considered for the new gossypol-free cottonseed flour produced by what is called the Liquid Cyclone Process. LCP for cotton flour will soon be utilized on a commercial scale by the plains Cooperative Oil Mill at Lubbock. The new food-grade cottonseed flour will have as much as 65 percent protein compared to about 13 percent for wheat flour. Unusually high protein content of the flour was the primary reason for the concentrated research. Scientists say that as much as six percent of the total world supply of protein is in cottonseed, but until LCP was discovered the protein could not be utilized directly by humans because of the toxic gossypol pigment in the cottonseed. LCP's success in making possible the production of the food-grade flour is being hailed as a major achievement by world nutritionists.
