The Motley County Matadors squeezed by the Amherst Bulldogs in their Homecoming game and won by the come-from-behind score of 8-7, Friday night on Burleson Field.

The Bulldogs were undefeated in District action until they traveled to Matador to play the scrappy Matadors. Amherst lost 5 passes via interceptions, and saw victory grabbed from their hands by a 4th quarter blocked punt.

Before the action started however, Captains Ben Grundy and Joe Campbell Crowned Debbie Clay as Football Sweetheart and presented her with a bouquet of roses.

The Matadors won the toss and received the opening kick-off, and without being able to move the ball, gave it over on downs to the Bulldogs. It wasn't long until the Bulldogs returned the favor with a fumble which was pounced on by Joe Campbell of the Matadors. But Motley was again grateful and gave the ball back to Amherst to see if they could do anything with it. This time they could and Quarterback Richard Holley hit end James Ivery with a pass which gave the Bulldogs the score, the PAT was successful and the Bulldogs went out in front 7-0.

The Matadors began their drive for a score with an

interception by defensive man Grant Johnson. A few plays later Motley Quarterback Harold Dempsey hit End Larry (Duck) Pitts on a 40 yard pass play which put the Matadors on the scoreboard. With the PAT failing the Bulldogs held a slight 7-6 lead at the half.

When the teams came out in the 2nd half, the Matadors' defense began to show what they had. With the complete shutdown of the Amherst team, the Matadors again got the ball with another interception with this one being grabbed by Harold Dempsey. The Matadors again made bad moves as well as good ones, and this time they gave the Bulldogs another chance to score with a fumble from Fullback Joe Campbell. With the Bulldogs in possession the Matadors again began the excellent defensive play which kept the Bulldogs from really doing anything, and the ball was again snatched out of the air by Harold Dempsey. Even though getting the ball the Matadors could not score and the quarter ended with the tally still 7-6.

It was in the 4th quarter that the Matadors really put in their best defensive play and kept the Bulldogs from moving the ball at all. The Matadors continually sacked the quarterback and in one instance made the Bulldogs back up until they were nearly in their own endzone. This was when the Bulldogs spelled their doom as they had to punt from their 5 yard line, with a fantastic rush by Defensive man Jerry Lee who got a hand on the ball and sent it spiraling into the endzone which gave the Matadors the 2 points which won them the ballgame. The Matadors continued to hold off the offensive attack of the Bulldogs and kept them from scoring by intercepting everything which they tried to throw.

The victory raised the District mark of the Matadors to 3-2, and their season mark to 3-3.

The Matadors entertain the Whiteface Antelopes in their last home game of the season Friday night at 7:30 on Burleson Field.

### FIRST BALE

First bale of 1975 cotton in Motley County, as reported to the Tribune, was ginned Tuesday of last week by the Caprock Gin at Flomot. It was grown on the Clovis Murphy place at Flomot, by Jerry Jones.

Rex Johnson, manager of the gin, said the 2360 pounds of bolls produced a 335 pound bale, with 960 pounds of seed. Ginning of the first bale, including tagging and ties was given by the gin. The gin also gave \$100. per ton for the cotton seed. The market value of the cotton was 65c per pound, according to Johnson.

First bale of 1974 cotton was reported by Stanley Degan at the Flomot Gin, and was produced by Billy Roys.

First cotton on the yard at Red Ball Gin, Roaring Springs, was brought in Saturday by Ossie Lee Brown. The cotton was pulled by Mrs. Brown and her children. West Texas Gin here reported five bales ginned Tuesday.

## Ford Mitchell Is Speaker For Club

Ford Mitchell of Lubbock, well-known over the South Plains as a radio and television newscaster, was guest speaker Thursday night at El Progresso Club's annual Gentlemen's Evening banquet, held at the First Baptist Church.

Introduced by Mrs. Howard Traweck, and attired in colonial apparel made by students at Monterey High School in Lubbock, Mr. Mitchell presented a most entertaining and enlightening program on *The Washingtons*.

Following his introductory remarks, he accompanied his narration with slides which revealed many facets of the lives of George Washington and his family and of the Revolutionary era which have heretofore, been unknown.

Assistant Vice President-Public Relations at Brier-croft Savings and Loan since January, 1974, Mr. Mitchell has assisted Brier-croft as consultant and buyer for the extensive "Heritage Collection" assembled over a period of several years.

He brought with him and displayed an interesting group of memorabilia from the collection, all original, which he said, could have been used by George Washington, Patrick Henry, Thomas Jefferson or Benjamin Franklin.

These included a powder horn, official documents, a sword made by a London silversmith, a blunderbuss used aboard a naval ship, a map, a copy of the Independent Chronicle Universal Advertiser dated 1879, proclaiming the first national Thanksgiving, and a Philadelphia land sale document on sheepskin parchment dated 1765, the same year as the Stamp Act and ten years older than the Declaration of Independence.

The program featured the Bicentennial, and special music for the occasion was arranged by Terry Keltz of Plainview, who brought an ensemble of drums, electric guitars and violin, played by Larry Keltz, Pam and Randy Miller, Ernest Tillet, Steve Brow and Debbie and Hershel Pool. The group sang a variety of songs, including both religious and patriotic, in the church auditorium.

Invocation was offered by Mrs. Harold Campbell, president of the club, after which the members and their guests assembled in the basement fellowship hall for the meal and remainder of the program. Benediction was by Rev. Lloyd Hearn, pastor of the United Methodist Church.

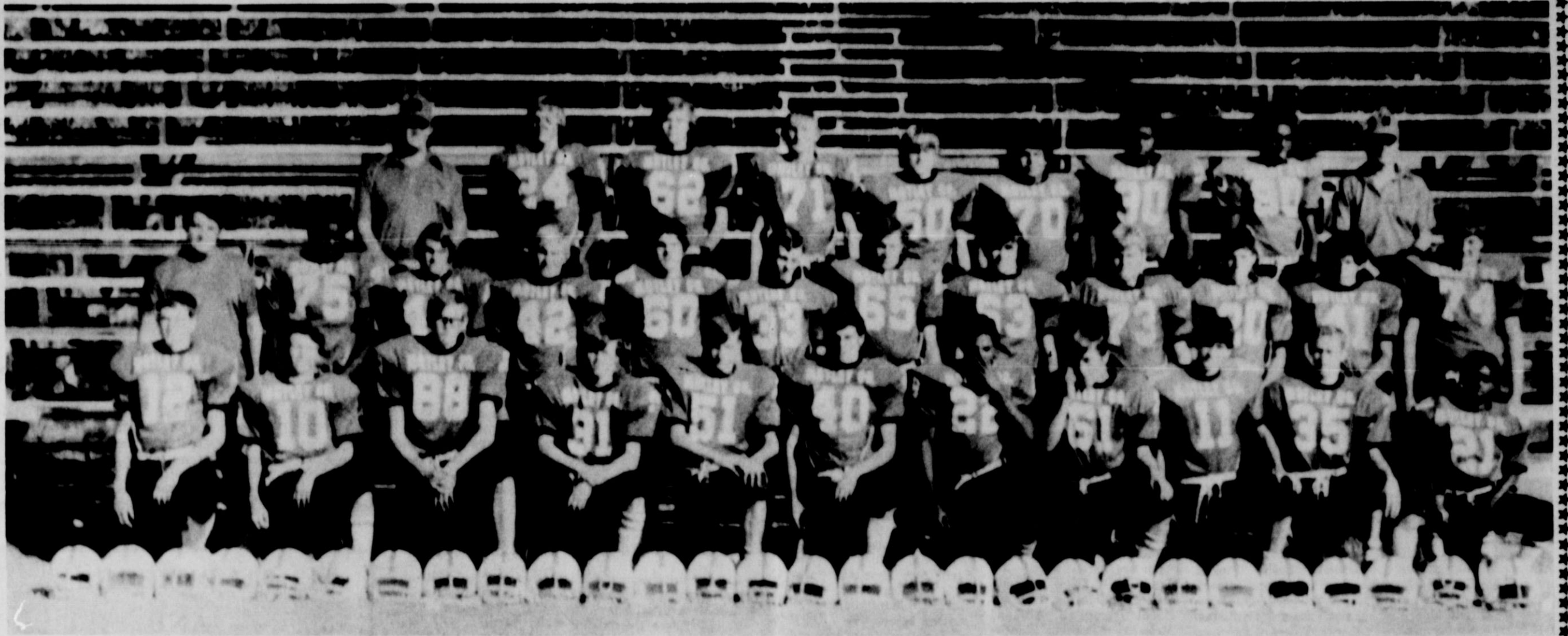

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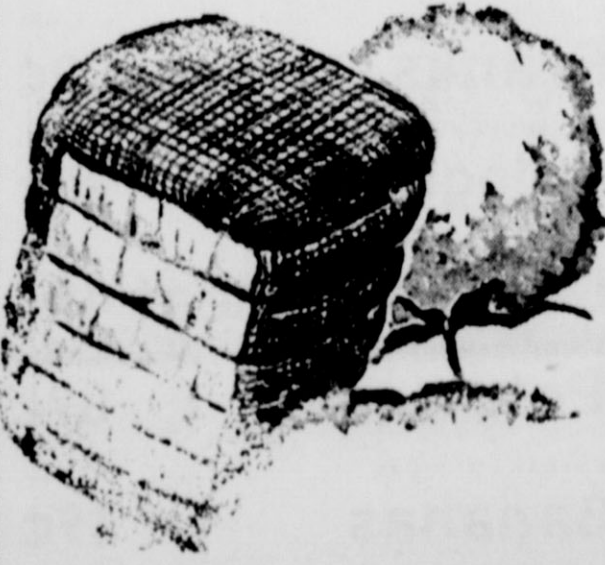

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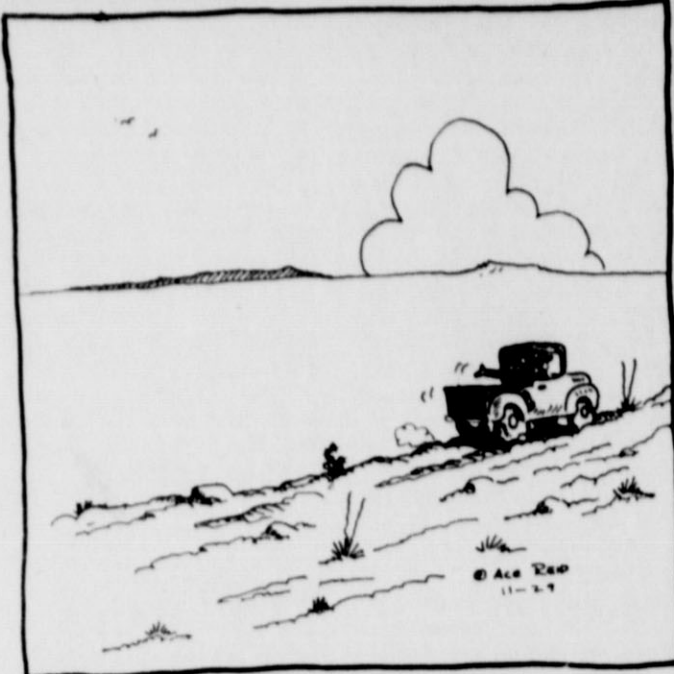
