Firm Celebrates 25th Anniversary

Billy's Grocery this week will begin a celebration of the 25th year in business, of the owner Billy Wason.

The celebration will include many food bargains which will be in effect from Friday, Dec. 12 through Wednesday, the 17th. Free coffee, Coca Cola and ice cream will be served all day Saturday, Dec. 13.

Also starting Saturday at 5

p.m. a turkey will be given away each day through Dec. 20. Signing up for these turkeys will start today (Dec. 11). The birds will be limited one to a household, but winners do not have to be present to receive the gift.

Born and reared in Matador, Billy Wason is the son of Mrs. W. B. Wason and the late Mr. Wason. He is a veteran of World War II and

after returning from service he worked for Spot Cash Grocery until January 1, 1950 when he started in the meat market at Charlie's Grocery. On March 6 of that year he bought half interest in the business, and has been a Matador merchant for the 25 years since that time.

Wason became sole owner of the store early in 1956 when he purchased the half interest of his former partner, Charlie Meador. The name continued as Charlie's Grocery until October, when it officially became Billy's Grocery.

The store was moved Dec. 10-11, 1965 from its former location in the I. O. O. F. building north of the bank, to its present location, across from the American Legion Hall.

Richard Turner, who manages the meat market, has been with the store 20 and a half years. Other personnel includes Joe Fair, seven years, Lee Hurt, six years, Mrs. Faye Slover, 9 years and Mrs. Dortha Carson, three years.

During his youth, Wason was active in the Matador Boy Scout Troop and became an Eagle Scout, one of the few in the county. He is a graduate of Matador High School, and his activities as a businessman and civic leader include past president of Matador Lions Club, member of the Official Board Finance Committee of the United Methodist Church, member of the Masonic Lodge; has served as a member of the school board and as a City Councilman.

Service Officer for the Red Cross and representative of the Salvation Army in Motley County, and has served on the Board of the Community Chest.

He was married Sept. 10, 1950 to the former Maribelen Lewis of Floydada. They have three children, Brenda, a teacher in Lamesa School System, Charla, who is employed with the Texas State Health Department in Lubbock, and Mark, a freshman in Motley County High School.

Mrs. Wason is associated in the business with her husband as bookkeeper.

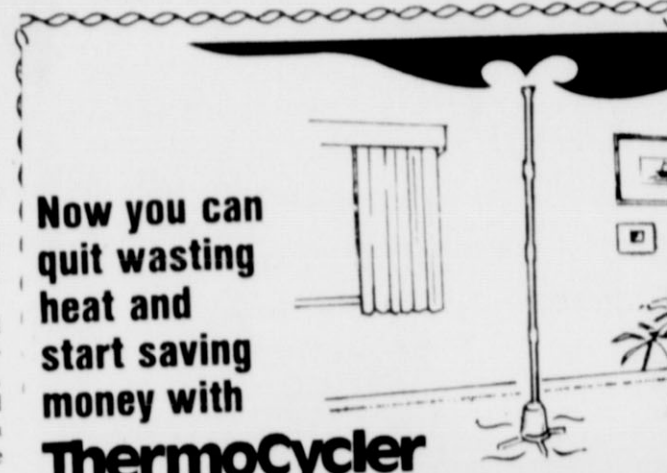

TEXAS TALK

Help may be on the way for lowering the costs of feeding cattle. Initial research on a new compound called monensin has had positive results at several agricultural colleges and test stations. Classified as an antibiotic, the chemical has produced an increase in feed efficiency as high as 13 percent. Average improvement in tests at the University of Nebraska was 11 percent. On that basis a dollar and cents evaluation means a savings of about twenty dollars a head in the average feeding cost for feedlot beef. Food and Drug Administration officials are expected to react more favorably toward the new compound than toward the still controversial DES since monensin acts only in the rumen of the animal and reportedly leaves no residues in tissue. Researchers say the compound enhances gain efficiency when used in amounts small enough to be comparable to adding one pint to 5,000 gallons of water.

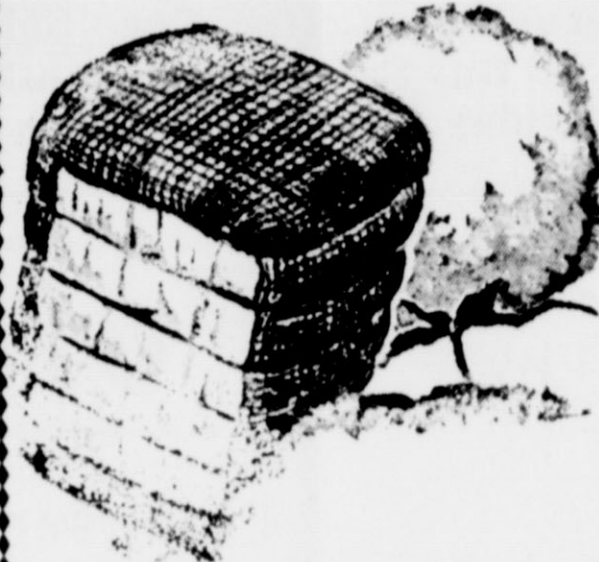

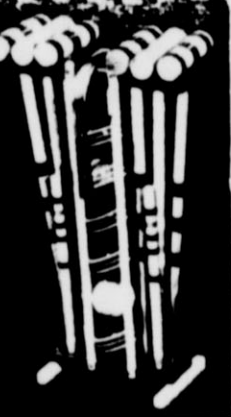
