The designation is necessary before the communities within those counties may

Service Corps for the assignment of Corps physicians or dentists to practice their profession in a private clinic setting. The earliest date for assignment would be July 1, 1976.

with the County Judges and Mayors as well as the medical community in each of the counties to develop the documentation as required by HEW. The SPAG Board reviewed the request at their April meeting and asked HEW to grant the designa-

According to the an-

nouncement, South Plains Health Provider Organization has notified SPAG of intent to apply for the assignment of health professionals to work within these counties. SPHPO will work closely with local elected officials and the medical community in developing the application. The organization

would provide all administrative functions for the physicians or dentist, allowing that person to spend his time serving the medical and dental needs of underserved rural counties.

Other counties previously designated as critical health manpower shortage areas include Dickens and King counties in the South Plains region as well as Kent and Briscoe counties in neighboring Councils of Governments "This is the largest contiguous area in Texas that HEW recognizes as needing additional health manpower to meet the medical needs of Rural America," said Beck.

In addition, Yoakum County had also been named earlier as a shortage area.


