

> A marked decline in the number of varieties being grown commercially is one of the unusual things about Texas' number one cash crop cotton. In 1910. F. J. Tyler, in an article entitled Varieties of American Upland Cotton, reported for the United States Department of Agriculture that there were 613 varieties of cotton being grown. Sixty-five years later there are fewer than 50 with only about ten of those commonly used. Two reasons are predominant for the unusual turn-around. First the boll weevil infestation wiped out many susceptible longstaple varieties. Second, producers have developed the varieties they like best and are satisfied with the increases in crop yields, the storm resistant boll (for machine harvest) and the generally shorter growing season provided by relatively few types. Evidence of the success of the varieties being used is amply illustrated when comparing current yield per acre with that of 1950.
