Absence, in making the heart grow fonder, may also increase its vulnerability to the attraction of another lonely heart.

Scars of poverty still remain on the lean, brown shoulder of New Mexico. Fields of lava beds like a storm-tossed sea turned to stone, challenge life, as do the blistering mountains and alkali plains. Crumbling adobe walls remain as monuments to dreams and failure. Modern pioneers have met a similar fate and in some instances have deserted modern homes, leaving vacant picture windows to reflect the light of stars. But there is a new tempo in the land of enchantment, a spirit and understanding of problems that defeated the early homesteaders. The larger cities are growing like saucy kittens.

A green trail in the vast, brown desert, the Rio Grande continues, as it has for centuries, to sustain its thousands of dependents. The fertile valley soil and the magic water produce endless fields of alfalfa, fruits and vegetables and sustain the blessed cottonwoods. Winding through the mountains and plains, past small Indian pueblos, adobe shacks and bustling cities, the river is the giver of life. It feeds small mouths of children, as it fed the mouths of grandparents now buried in the lonely little cemeteries. Every precious drop of water is drained into the irrigation ditches, and wells pierce the valley sands for more. A mighty river whose destiny is to carry the life blood of generations yet unborn.

Albuquerque has the throbs of prosperity, reaching the fingers of new streets out on the bleak mesas, and pouring a substantial foundation of industry into what was once a resort town for "the sick." It has the same altitude as Denver. Romantic Old Santa Fe is writhing in growing pains and losing much of the tranquil atmosphere that was its charm. Unchanged is La Fonda Hotel which refused to compromise with lesser splendor than its builders conceived. It is one of the world's truly fine hotels, and also small, it is dedicated to gracious living. (Tribune files June 14, 1956)

Clinic Scheduled Tuesday

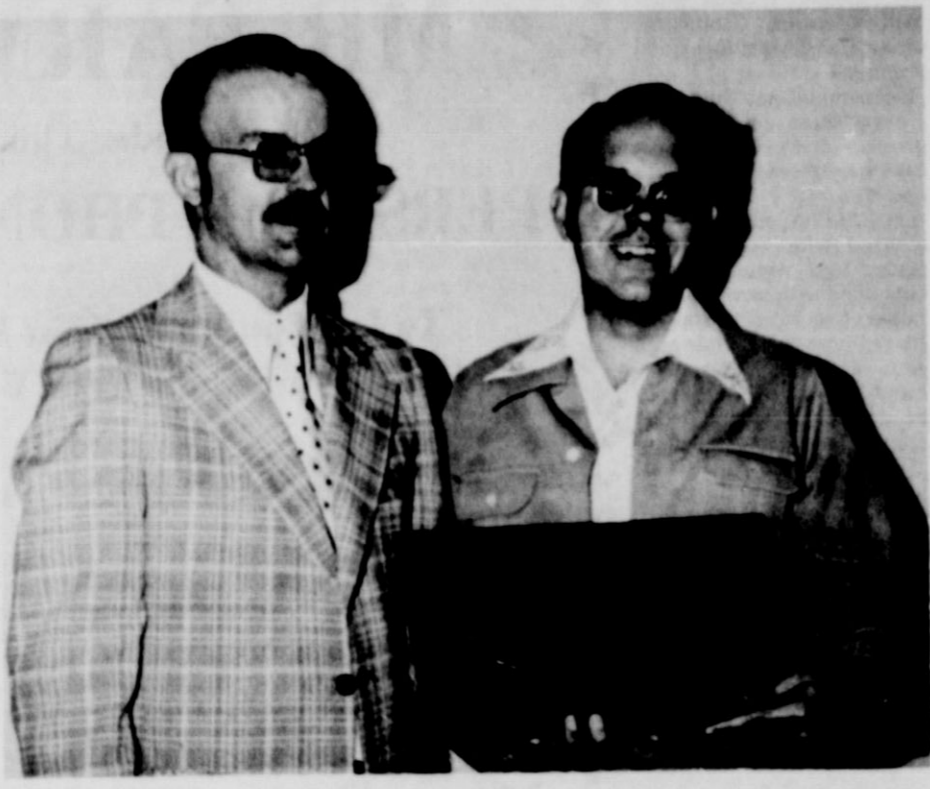

James Stanley Is Lion Of The Year

SERVICE to his club and community were cited as factors in the selection of James Stanley as "Lion of the Year," when the announcement was made Tuesday night at the club's Ladies Night banquet in the basement of the United Methodist Church.

Tony Dean made the presentation of the award plaque after declaring that "this award is long overdue." District 2T-1 Governor-Elect Jimmie Pigman of Dalhart, introduced by Lion L. B. Campbell, was speaker for the evening and installed officers for the club, for the coming year.

A special guest was Gary Campbell, who entertained with "Music Country Style." Included in his repertoire were hits by Glen Campbell, John Denver and the late Hank Williams.

The son of County Judge Forrest Campbell and the late Jerry Campbell, the versatile singer and guitarist also included two of his own compositions - "The Lonely Nightingale" which he composed about ten years ago, and was recorded by the Sourdough Singers, a group of local high school students, and "Silver Horses," which he composed recently. He used harmonica accompaniment

along with the guitar for several numbers.

Incoming Boss Lion Larry Hoyle presided in the absence of Boss Lion J. M. (Sonny) Russell, who was in Houston with Dr. Thuy Danh Do and Dr. Hoang Y Do, for their State Board examinations.

In his address, Lion Pigman outlined goals for District 2T-1, in connection with Texas Lionism efforts. These include the Crippled children's camp, diabetic clinic, youth exchange program, eye bank and membership emphasis.

A delicious buffet was served by women of the Methodist Church, with table decorations featuring the Bicentennial theme with top hats, and table runners decorated with stars and stripes. Lion Larry Hoyle expressed appreciation to the women on behalf of the club, for serving the "best meals in the entire district."

Lion Hoyle also presented Miss Rachel Patton a gift of appreciation from the club for her faithful tenure as Lions Sweetheart, an office she has held since 1934, and also presented Miss Charise Cullin, outgoing Lions Queen, with a small silver Lions plate.

Lions To Sponsor Blood Donations

Matador Lions Club will again sponsor donations of blood for Blood Services of Lubbock, it was announced this week.

The clinic for donors will be held at the Motley County school, Wednesday, June 23 from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. Ages between 17 and 65 are eligible to donate plasma. However, 17 year old donors must have parental permission, using a Blood Service form for this purpose. These donor permits are available at Bob Stanley Pharmacy.

It is stressed that the Blood Services of Lubbock provides services for all hospitals in the Lubbock area.

The Lions Club was disappointed in the low turnout at the last drive, and Motley County residents are encouraged to mark June 23 on their calendars. Many simply forgot the date last time and missed the opportunity to donate to this worthwhile cause. It was pointed out that the blood donation program is an unselfish program and should be supported not only by the community in which the drive is held, but county-wide.

All blood donors and their immediate families are insured for all blood required by them for a six month period, free of charge from the blood center. In addition, one donation may benefit or even save the lives of as many as four persons.

Some of the requirements of a donor are these: Weight, at least 110 lb.; no current health problems; can not have had major surgery within past six months; can not have had tooth extraction within past 72 hours; can not be pregnant now or in the past six months; can not have been in malaria endemic area in past three years; can not have received blood in past six months; can not have had tattoo in past six months; can not have had viral hepatitis or "yellow jaundice," malaria, diabetes (requiring insulin or oral drug therapy) or surgery for cancer, other than skin.

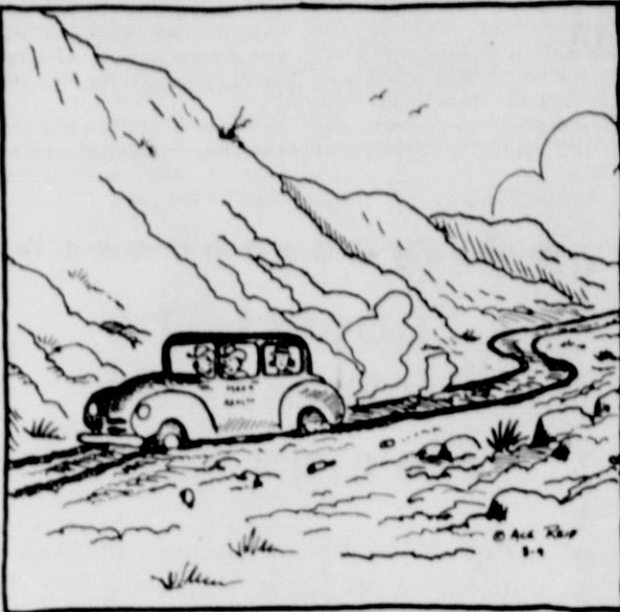
