The attempted murder of Rogers occurred November 12, 1976 approximately three miles east of Matador on U.S. Highway 70 and was the same occurrence in which Jinks Wilson, Motley County sheriff was killed. Testifying in the case were Rogers and the defendant, Stacy Albert Carter.

Representing the State of Texas was Randy Hollums, District Attorney of the 110th Judicial District and Tom Hamilton, special prosecutor. Representing the defendant were John Monford and Mark Hall, torneys from Lubbock

The defendant was sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary. The term of 20 years is the maximum for a penitentiary sentence which can be assessed for this

Charges of capital murder for the killing of Sheriff Wilson are still pending against the defendant in the 72nd district court, Lubbock, where the case was transferred in change of venue. Carter waived his right to
