Contract Let For City Water System

BIDS for a water supply line and pump station were opened May 5 at a meeting of the Matador Water District Board at City Hall, and a contract let for construction of a new city water line.

Of a total of five bids received, low bid was submitted by Bowles Construction of Burkburnett, in the amount of \$269,026.01. This will be for the construction of line, pumps,

pump stations reservoir and other facilities necessary to complete the water system from the well field one mile East of Roaring Springs to the City of Matador.

The line will be constructed of about one-third 10 inch pipe and two-thirds 8 inch PVC pipe.

Earlier, the Water District had purchased 121 acres from Mance King of Texarkana, Tex., in order to obtain the water rights.

Construction should begin within 60 days, according to information released by board members.

The new source of water was sought because of quality and quantity of water from existing sources.

Samples from the two new wells are reported to be a great deal better than the present supply, being classified as "very good." The new wells are capable of producing approximately 600 gallons per minute, each.

The Water District Board anticipates that the new water supply should be in the City of Matador by September 1.

Shelley Seigler Wins Title Of Lions Queen

Mistrial Declared

Stacy Albert Carter Tuesday afternoon entered a surprise plea of guilty to the charge of attempted murder of John D. Rogers, in case No. 1002, District Court, Motley County. The plea of guilty was heard by Judge George D. Miller, 110th Judicial District, in the district court room in Matador.

The attempted murder of Rogers occurred November 12, 1976 approximately three miles east of Matador on U.S. Highway 70 and was the same occurrence in which Jinks Wilson, Motley County sheriff was killed. Testifying in the case were Rogers and the defendant, Stacy Albert Carter.

Representing the State of Texas was Randy Hollums, District Attorney of the 110th Judicial District and Tom Hamilton, special prosecutor. Representing the defendant were John Monford and Mark Hall, attorneys from Lubbock.

The defendant was sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary. The term of 20 years is the maximum for a penitentiary sentence which can be assessed for this offense.

Charges of capital murder for the killing of Sheriff Wilson are still pending against the defendant in the 72nd district court, Lubbock, where the case was transferred in change of venue.

Carter waived his right to appeal the sentence. In a news bulletin late Wednesday, it was learned that the case has been declared a mistrial. The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal is carrying coverage of the proceedings by staff reporter Frank Patrick. Further development of the case will be carried in this morning's edition of the A-J.

Gordon Harmon, Superintendent of Schools in Temple for the past three years has been named Superintendent of Schools in Abilene effective July 1. Abilene schools have an enrollment of over 18,000 students.

Harmon, a 1950 graduate of Roaring Springs High School, received his B.S. degree in education from Texas Tech University in 1955, his Masters in Education degree from Sul Ross State University in 1960.

Prior to going to Temple as Superintendent, he served as Superintendent of Schools in San Marcos. Before San Marcos, Harmon served as Assistant Superintendent in Pharr-San Juan-Alamo I.S.D. Principal of Lorenzo High School, Principal of Balmorhea High School, and teacher-coach at Sanderson High School.

He is currently serving as President of the Texas Association of School Administrators which has been instrumental in the passage of a school finance bill out of the House of Representatives.

Harmon is married to the former Freddie Sandlin of Paducah, and they have four children; Sandy, a sophomore at Baylor University; Kyle, a senior at Temple High School who was quarter back for the 4-A state finalist Temple Wildcats who lost only one game to San Antonio Churchill, that being the state championship game by a score of 10-0; Sharon a seventh grader, and Kimberly a second grader.

CASES SETTLED OUT OF COURT ON VIOLATIONS OF THE U.S. PLANT VARIETY PROTECTION ACT ON ACCO COTTON PLANTING SEED

Plainview, Texas, May 5, 1977 — ACCO Seed announced today settlement of damages on violations against their protected variety of Paymaster 303 Cotton Planting Seed. All of these were settled out of court in ACCO Seed's favor.

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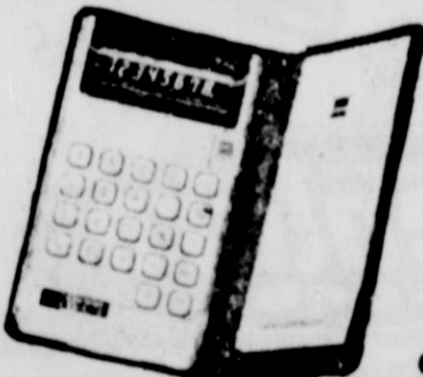
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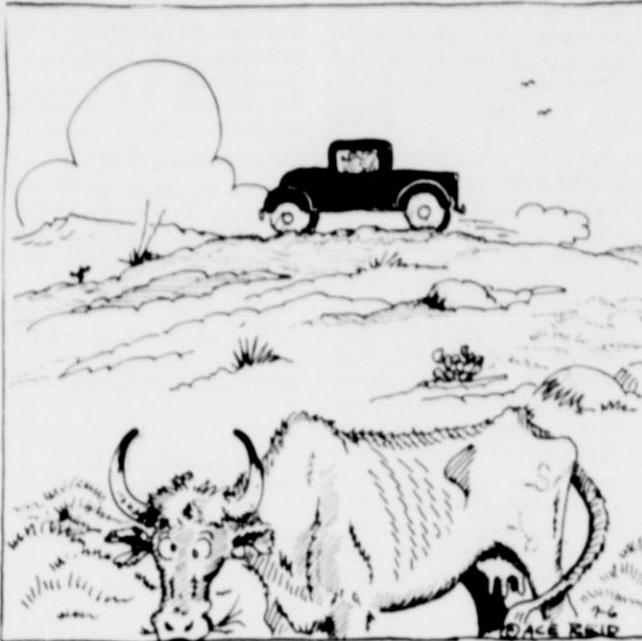
