# **Postal Rate Hikes** Affect Newspapers

The postal rate hike which went into effect in July increased by about 25 per cent, the mailing cost of smaller daily and weekly newspapers. The new rates affected newspapers and magazines (second-class mail) as well as nonprofit bulk third-class mail and special fourth-class rates for books, records and other material. Letters and other first-class mail were not affected

This notice to subscribers will serve a threefold purpose: A request for cooperation in sending us, direct, any change in address; to remind of delinquent subscriptions, and to notify of a possible advance in subscription

First, we will repeat to out of town subscribers, a request made many times previously. Please send us your change of address. Just leaving a forwarding address at the post office will not suffice for second-class mailing of newspapers or maga-

zines. Newspapers that cannot be delivered as addressed, are discarded, and the label is returned to the newspaper, in a 25 cents-due envelope, under new postal charges. The Tribune received three such envelopes the past week. Since this charge was first started by the Postal Service, it has advanced from 5 cents, to 10 cents, to 13 cents, and now to 25 cents. Some publishers are adding this penalty to the

subscription cost. As stated by Ben Ezzell in The Canadian Record: Since the Postal Service has a quaint habit of letting these undeliverable publications accumulate sometimes for two or three weeks before mailing the first change of address notice, it is easily possible for the cost to the publisher to become 50 cents or even 75 cents before correction can be made or the mailing stopped on a single subscription are already facing sky-

rocketing costs of mailing our publications and are still trying to hold the line on current subscription rates outside our immediate area. We may have to raise that rate anyway, but rather than

# PUBLIC NOTICE

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976** 

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest

rate limit on such bonds. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution.

#### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as estab-lished by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

> "A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes.

be your last issue The Tribune cannot absorb these postal increases indefinitely. The solution sems to point to an increase in subscription rates. The last raise was made in 1968 when it advanced from \$3.00 to \$4.00 locally, and from \$3.50 to \$5.00 elsewhere. Prior to that for 14 years, until January 31, 1956, the rate stood at \$2.00 and \$2.50. Along the same lines, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal has announced its new subscription rates: \$60.00 for 12 months; morning with Sunday. # ------Ray Farabee Listed Among Most Thrifty


