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County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Cotton, corn, sorghum and sunflower research are featured at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's field day at Halfway, which is 14 miles west of

Plainview on US Highway 70. Starting time is 1:00 p.m. Tuesday September 14th.

A large field machinery display featuring the latest farm implements will also be available for inspection.

The six stop tour will include cotton variety studies, soil fertility, corn irrigation, modified pivot irrigation systems, insect pest management in sorghum, weed control and other research highlights of interest to local farmers.

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Texas farmers and ranchers no longer have to pay sales taxes on certain purchases to be used in the production of food and fiber.

Effective July 20, the Texas sales tax law exempted agricultural producers from sales taxes on such items as bailing wire, fencing supplies, machinery and equipment. A farmer does not automatically qualify for the exemption, and must file an exemption certificate with each firm or business with which they deal. These certificates are available from the Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin, or local branch offices.

To qualify for an exemption, the item purchased must be used exclusively on a farm or ranch, with home gardens not considered a farm.

Certain items are exempt without the use of an exemption certificate, these including feed for farm or ranch animals, fertilizer, seeds and annual plants and animals. Items requiring the

exemption certificate include fungicides, insecticides, herbicides, defoliant, desiccants, all medications for farm or ranch animals, machinery and equipment used in food, grass and reed production, including such items as hand tools, bailing wire, fence wire or posts, gates and storage facilities for bulk commodities.

Natural gas or electricity used on a farm or ranch is also exempt with the certificate if used for pumps for livestock or irrigation water, welding machines, electric fences and lights for barns.

make a blanket increase to take care of this expensive postage-due problem, we are simply going to announce a new policy: postage-due charges (for subscribers who have moved without notifying us in time of changes of address) will simply be added to the subscription renewal price when it comes due again. You won't have to pay it if you don't want to continue the subscription, but you will have to pay it if you want to keep the newspaper coming. We'd prefer, of course, that you let us know that you're planning to move before you do it, so we can make the address

change in time and save a lot of extra expense."

The Tribune may have to adopt a similar policy to compensate for its losses.

Regarding delinquent subscriptions: We send notices each month, with this notation, "This will be your only notice." This was done with the idea of saving postage, as we had formerly mailed "courtesy" past-due notices. Now, we are faced with the painful duty of removing a number of subscribers, who were notified - some as far back as six months. We are unable to continue these any longer. If you are in arrears, this will

be your last issue.

The Tribune cannot absorb these postal increases indefinitely. The solution seems to point to an increase in subscription rates. The last raise was made in 1968 when it advanced from \$3.00 to \$4.00 locally, and from \$3.50 to \$5.00 elsewhere. Prior to that for 14 years, until January 31, 1956, the rate stood at \$2.00 and \$2.50.

Along the same lines, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal has announced its new subscription rates: \$60.00 for 12 months, morning with Sunday. In 1973, the A-J could be bought for \$24.45 per year, and in 1974 and 1975, for \$48.00.

Ray Farabee Listed Among Most Thrifty

Senator Ray Farabee is in the lower 25 per cent of the 31 members of the State Senate as to total expenditures for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1975. This was disclosed with the release of the State Audit published last week covering expenses for members of the 64th Legislature. Senator Farabee stated, "I was pleased to learn of my ranking in regard to expenditures. It is important for those of us in public office to practice what we preach and to set an example with our budgets by conserving the taxpayers' money." "At the same time, there is work to be done to serve my constituents in the 30th District which covers 29 counties and is the second largest Senatorial District in the State. I have been able to see that this work is done in an economical manner with the help of an efficient staff, by avoiding unnecessary travel, and by cutting back on my staff when the Legislature is not in session," Senator Farabee concluded. During his first term in the Texas Senate, 19 bills authored by Senator Farabee were passed into law. He served on the Finance Committee, the Natural Resources Committee and the Jurisprudence Commit-

tee. During the interim between sessions, Senator Farabee is serving on the Texas Legislative Council, the Texas Coordinating Commission for State Health and Welfare Services, the Property Tax Study Committee and the Texas Coastal and Marine Council. Seantor Farabee was cited as "the top Senate newcomer" by Texas Monthly magazine and was presented the Senate Member Outstanding Legislative Service Award by the Texas Farmers Union.
