provide immediate assistance for the nation's wheat farmers.

Seventeen Congressmen from wheat - producing states, including House Agriculture Committee Chairman George Mahon of Lubbock, joined Hightower in this appeal. Hightower urged the Presi-

dent to direct Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to adjust the wheat loan level to at least \$2.50 a bushel, which was the level recommended in the Emergency Farm Act of 1975. President Ford vetoed the bill.

'Considering the effect of inflation since the Congress passed the bill on March 21 of last year, the \$2.50 figure is conservative," Hightower said, "but it will give the President an opportunity to compromise and provide immediate relief to farmers and provide some insurance to the banks that finance their operations

The National Association of Wheat Growers told Hightower that only this week the President had turned down the association's request that he adjust the loan level to three dollars.

"I believe his rejection of the Wheat Growers' request reveals the President's lack of understanding about the very real problems confronting grain producers," the Congressman said. "The need is imperative. The President has the authority to do something about it, and those of us who signed the letter hope that he will

exercise that authority."



### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Federal Screwworm Regulations now affect all Texas livestock, and all livestock shipped out of Texas must now meet federal inspection and certification requirements, as announced by the USDA Tuesday Aug. 3rd.

These regulations are the result of action by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) designating the entire state of Texas as an area of recurring screwworm in-Prior to the

announcement, only the 39 southern counties of the state were so designated.

APHIS officials said the change will mean that all livestock, including cattle, sheep, borses, swine, goats, mules and burros shipped from Texas must be inspected by state or federal animal health officials of accredited veterinarians and be certified free of screwworms before shipment. Animals found to be infested with the parasite will be treated, and the entire shipment of livestock will be sprayed or dipped; with USDA approved insecticides.

In addition, all animals shipped from Texas to southeastern states are required to be dipped or sprayed even if found to be screwworm free. These special requirements have been initiated in order to prevent the spread of screwworms into the Southeast, an area which has been free of the parasite for over 15 years. Previously, cattle shipped

into interstate commerce

channels from counties not designated as areas of recurring screwworm infestations were not required to be inspected and treated for the parasite before shipment. Many of these cattle had wounds or disease conditions which could harbor screwworms. When moved without restriction, these cattle could be the means by which screwworms were spread to uninfested states.

Texas has been placed under stricter federal regulations as the result of an increase in the number of laboratory confirmed screwworm cases in the state in recent months. These cases threaten to facilitate the spread of this parasite of all warmblooded animals.

So far this year, over one-half of the 254 counties in Texas have reported screwworm cases, and even a

greater number of cases are expected during the traditionally heaviest months, August through November. The already serious number of screwworm cases reported this year has been due to heavy rainfall in the state, producing ideal environmental conditions for the

increase of screwworms Owners of livestock should constantly check their animals for screwworms and submit specimen worms in prepaid, self-addressed mailing kits available from my office.

The USDA's Screwworm Program. Eradication operated by APHI, designed to eradicate the wild screwworm fly population by releasing millions of sexually sterile flies each week to mate with the fertile wild flies. Matings between fertile and sterile flies produce eggs that do not hatch, thus breaking the screwworm lifecycle, but unless samples are submitted, no flies will be dropped on the area.




