



> The by-product is acidulated soapstock (acid oil), which is an excellent source of fat in milk replacer formulas for calves and has a unique anti-diarrheic quality Research dates back to 1956 when Dr. R. E. Leighton of the A&M Animals Science Department discovered an anti-scour substance in a methylated product made from cottonseed oil soapstock. Later attempts to isolate the factor revealed that it was in the non-distillable, hexaneinsoluble, saponifiable fraction of the product.

Because this finding indicated similar results might be obtained from a less sophisticated soap-stock product. Leighton and coworkers explored the use of a number of cottonseed oil by-products




