THE ISSUE: Compulsion versus Freedom of Choice Here's what we reject:

As Americans, we believe that our aged citizens who need medical care should get it, whether or not they can afford to pay for it.

We favor a program of medical aid for the aged sensibly designed to help those who need help.

Such a program is available now and should be given a fair trial. It is a voluntary program. It consists of voluntary health insurance for those able to purchase it and the Kerr-Mills Law for helping those . who need help in paying for medical care.

Voluntary health insurance policies and Blue Cross and Blue Shield plans now are available to all aged everywhere. More than 9,000,000, or 53%, of the aged already have health insurance. This is three times as many aged as had health insurance 10 years ago

The Kerr-Mills Low, passed by Congress in 1960, enables individual states to guarantee to every aged American who needs help the health care he requires. In addition to the more than 2,500,000 Americans covered by Old Age Assistance, the law is designed to benefit all other older persons who could not meet the cost of a serious or prolonged illness. It helps those who need help.

The Kerr-Mills Law preserves the quality of medical care - maintaining the patient's freedom of choice and the doctor's freedom to treat his patients in an individual way.

It allows each state to provide as wide a variety of health services as it chooses and does not limit the length of time an eligible person may receive them.

It avoids waste of tax dollars by helping only those who need help.

Kerr-Mills Law.

As Americans, we are deeply concerned about the dangers of socialized medicine. And we are not crying "wolf" when we apply that term to the King-Anderson Bill now before Congress.

The bill, if enacted, would provide limited Federal health care benefits for those over 65 eligible for social security. It would require the patient to pay \$10 a day for the first nine days of hospitalization. with a minimum of \$20, and \$20 for each complete diagnostic study

It would be compulsory . . . covering everyone ehgible for social security (regardless of need), and compelling every wage-earner and employer to pay the bill through increased taxes.

It would lower the quality of medical care ... with Government controlling standards of practice and limiting free choice of hospital and physician. Personal health problems would become a matter of Government record.

It would be staggeringly expensive . with a double increase on payroll taxes - more payroll deductions through a greater percentage of tax and a higher base on which to deduct. Passage of the bill, plus social security tax increases already scheduled would mean that by next year a wage-earner making \$5,200 a year would pay 40% more tax than he paid in 1961.

It is inequitable . . . compelling young wage-earners to pay higher payroll taxes to provide medical care for millions of the well-to-do and self-reliant. yet not providing any care for the 2.5 million not covered by social security - the group most in need.

It is unnecessory . . . No one has yet produced evidence that such radical legislation is needed.

It would mean socialized health care . imme diately for all those over 65 eligible for social security and eventually for every man, woman and child in America
