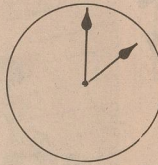

When a cloud of dust comes down a rural road in Whiteflat, you wave. Waving is an important part of country etiquette. The farther you are from town, the more important the wave. However, waving styles vary with each individual. One, a person keeps both hands on steering wheel and extends an index finger so that it's pointing at the driver of the oncoming car. It is accompanied by a stern facial expression, you might believe it is the "Uncle Sam Wants You" wave and you should report to the nearest recruiting station.

Second, the driver keeps both hands on steering wheel and raises the index and middle fingers of the left hand. This appears to be a modified "V" for a peace sign or could be considered the "Cub Scout" wave.

In warm weather, a person may poke an arm out of his pickup window to wave. We wouldn't advise this in our winter weather or you won't have enough fingers left to do the "Uncle Sam".

There are days when driving over the rural roads to agricultural locations, the residents are thinking of all the farming and ranching work ahead of them. This is when they are inclined to nod their heads. The first is a single down/up nod. This is

used when there is plenty of time to acknowledge a recipient. When it's almost too late, there is a quick raising of the head, which you can make more effectively by raising your eyebrows simultaneously.

Most commuters prefer the "Wiper" wave. It is achieved by moving your entire hand in a broad gesture reminiscent of the sweep of a windshield wiper. The "Cheerleader" wave is used by women drivers. This is a random and uninhibited fluttering of the entire hand.

When driving on the highway or rural roads in this area, it is advisable that the thumb remains firmly on the wheel at all times. When meeting pickups with stock trailers, tractors with plows and every type of truck, nothing less than a firm grip could send you toward an oncoming vehicle.

As for me, when I think I recognize a car or pickup, I wave before identifying the occupant. I've waved at a man so many times who didn't make a habit of waving that he's begun waving back.

If you see a car hurtle past without a wave, call the sheriff. Anyone in the Whiteflat location that won't wave is up to "no good"!

PCA To Hold 60th Annual Stockholders Meeting

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association's 60th Annual Stockholders Meeting will be held Thursday evening, April 7, in Childress and Friday evening, April 8, in Stamford. At both sessions registration and the meal will begin at 6:00 p.m. and be followed by a brief business session. The City Auditorium will be the site of the Childress session with the Stamford meeting held in the High School Cafeteria.

Drawings will be held from members' registration cards until a total of \$900 is awarded in each session. The harmony and hilarity of Donna Fowler and Cindy Nix as "Just Friends" will be the featured entertainment.

One director representing the Spur area will be elected during the short business session. Nominees are Lance D. Morris of Crosbyton and Darrell Thoma-son of Dry Lake near Spur.

Rolling Plains PCA is one of 18 member-owned Production Credit Associations in the Tenth District of the Farm Credit System which includes 14 PCAs in Texas, three PCAs in New Mexico and one PCA in Louisiana. Collectively PCAs have approximately 12,500 loans outstanding to the region's agricultural producers. At 1993 year end the Tenth District had some \$830 million in loan volume. Rolling Plains PCA is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System providing over \$50 billion in loans in America's farmers, ranchers and ag-related business.

During the 1993 Rolling Plains Production Credit Association loaned more

than \$102 million to approximately 730 member-borrowers in Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Dickens, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Motley, Runnels, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor Counties. The Association had a net profit after

taxes of some \$946,000 and made a profit for the 59th time in the 60 fiscal years since it was chartered.

The Association has been rated as a Tier I PCA for six consecutive years. This rating is based on safety, soundness and financial strength.

Home Economically Speaking

RESOLUTIONS FOR FINANCIALLY RESPONSIBLE CONSUMERS

Plan to keep more of your money in your pockets in 1994. Here are a few resolutions to get you started.

— Shop for the best interest rate for credit cards. The credit card market is very competitive now. You can pay less interest on your credit card balance if you shop around. Your own financial institution may offer lower rates but may not be publicizing that fact. Ask your credit union or alumni association if it offers a credit card. Look not only for lower interest rates, but also check for low or no annual fees.

— Move unpaid balances to a less costly card. When you get a new lower interest rate, move any balance you have to the lowest rate card. Most issuers allow the transfer to be made at no charge. Hundreds of dollars could be saved next year on large balances. When the transfer is made, cancel the old card and destroy it. About two weeks after canceling the old card, call to be sure the account was closed.

— Avoid fees for late payment and exceeding the account limit. Creditors may allow you to exceed your limit and gladly charge an extra fee for the privilege. The card holder is responsible for making payments on time and knowing the account balance at all times.

— Pay more than the minimum payment. Search your budget and find as much money as possible to pay on credit card balances. The interest saved will be much higher than interest earned on pass-book savings accounts. Some credit cards are offering lower minimum payments. Don't fall for it. Paying a few dollars less means paying more interest.

Families who worked in 1993, earned less than 23,050 and had a child living with them at least half the year may be eligible for an Earned Income Tax Credit. It is a federal benefit for both married and

single parents who worked either full or part time during part or all of the year. Two steps are required to apply for an EIC for up to \$2,364. File a federal income tax return (Form 1040A or 1040). Fill out "Schedule EIC" and attach it to your tax return.

Eligible families will either owe less in taxes or the government will mail them a check! You can get the EIC even if you don't owe income tax.

The basic EIC for families with one child is a maximum of \$1,434 in 1993. Families with more than one child may receive a basic EIC up to \$1,511. The amount of the credit varies according to a family's income level.

Most eligible families earning between \$5,500 and \$15,500 will qualify for at least \$1,000. Families with a child born in 1993 can receive an extra benefit of up to \$388. Families who pay at least part of the health insurance policy premiums that include coverage for a child may receive an extra credit of up to \$465.

Some families eligible for the EIC also receive benefits through other government programs, such as AFDC, food stamps, SSI, Medicaid or public or subsidized housing. Only in rare cases will the EIC lower benefits in these other programs.

For free information and help in filing the EIC forms, call 1-800-829-1040. Tax forms are available from the IRS or at the post office. If you don't qualify for EIC but know someone who does, encourage them to apply. Well over 14 million families now qualify, but many do not apply.

The April meeting will be held at the Center April 4, with lunch out for hamburgers. Bring unfinished work for workshop or something new.

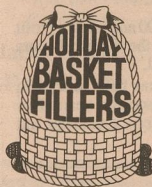

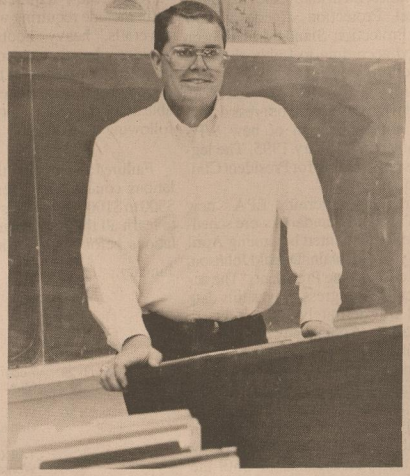

COTTON NEWS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.



The enforcement date set for the Environmental Protection Agency's new Worker Protection Standards has been postponed according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers.

PCG officials learned late last week that a bill was passed by Congress delaying full implementation of new WPS regulations until January 1995. The legislation is now waiting for President Clinton's signature.

"Regulations governing EPA's new Worker Protection Standards were scheduled to be implemented beginning April 21 of this year," explains Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "The action taken by Congress moves this date back and will definitely give producers an opportunity to obtain any training and additional information they need to try and comply with these regulations."

Training materials describing the new regulations have not yet been made available and producers are still very much in the dark about what the rules will actually mean to them, adds Johnson. Until the new enforcement date arrives EPA officials insist that the earliest workers be allowed to return to a treated field is four hours after treatment and then only to perform essential tasks such as attending irrigation equipment.

The new WPS guidelines contain a

variety of new requirements. Some of them include requiring workers to wear coveralls, heavy boots, gloves and goggles when they enter a field that has received treatment and the requirement that decontamination sites be made available at quarter-mile intervals for 30 days following a treatment.

Failure to comply with the new regulations could mean fines ranging from \$500 to \$1000. Producers are encouraged to learn all they can about the new regulations before they go into effect next January.

The Texas Department of Agriculture recently announced that a Train-the-Trainer meeting to educate producers and ag employees has been set for March 30 from 8:30-12:00 noon and 1:00-2:00 p.m. at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview. A \$5 registration fee will be required to cover the cost of training materials. The Train-the-Trainer program is designed to certify and educate agricultural employees who are not currently certified applicators in Texas. This course would allow them to train their employees under the EPA Worker Protection Standard.

Loans and LDP's on corn, grain sorghum, cotton, rice, soybeans, mustard seed, safflower seed, and sunflower seed, are available through May 31.

LDP's are issued to producers who, although eligible to obtain a CCC price

"He is risen" was the greeting early Christians used when meeting. The words are just as apt today when we meet along the way.

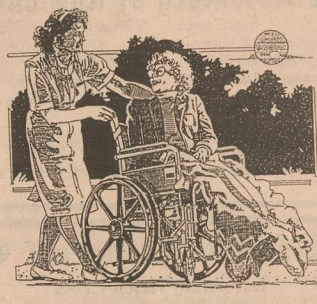

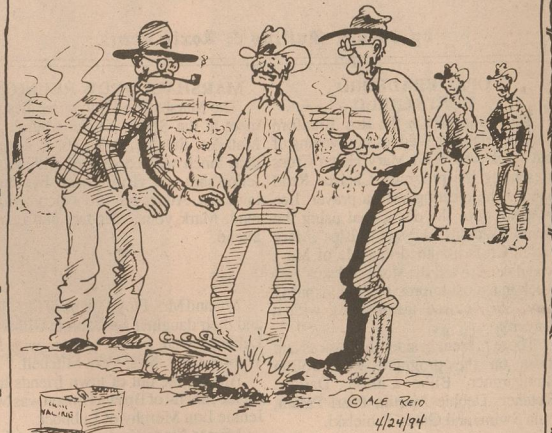
