When a cloud of dust comes down a rural road in Whiteflat, you wave. Waving is an important part of country etiquette. The farther you are from town, the more important the wave. However,

waving styles vary with each individual.

One, a person keeps both hands on steering wheel and extends an index finger so that it's pointing at the driver of the oncoming car. It it is accompanied by a stern facial expression, you might believe it is the "Uncle Sam Wants You" ave and you should report to the nearest

Second, the driver keeps both hands on steering wheel and raises the index and middle fingers of the left hand. This appears to be a modified "V" for a peace sign or could be considered the "Cub Scout" wave.

Plan to keep more of your money in your pockets in 1994. Here are a few resolutions to get you started.

— Shop for the best interest rate for credit cards. The credit card market is very competitive now. You can pay less interest on your credit card balance if you shop around. Your own financial institution may offer lower rates but may not be publicizing that fact. Ask your credit union or alumni association if it offers a credit

and Look not only for lower mates, but also check for low or no annual fees.

— Move unpaid balances to a less costly card. When you get a new lower interest rate, move any balance you have to the lowest rate card. Most issuers allow the transfer to be made at no charge. Hundreds of dollars could be saved next year on large balances. When the transfer is made, cancel the old card and destroy it. About two weeks after canceling the old card, call to be sure the account was for late payment and limit. Creditors limit. Creditors limit and limi

— Pay more than the minimum payment. Search your budget and find as much money as possible to pay on credit card balances. The interest saved will be much higher than interest earned on passbook savings accounts. Some credit cards are offering lower minimum payments. are offering lower minimum payments. Don't fall for it. Paying a few dollars less means paying more interest.

Families who worked in 1993, earned less than 23,050 and had a child living with them at least half the year may be eligible for an Earned Income Tax Credit. It is a federal benefit for both married and

EIC for up to \$2,364. File a federal income tax return (Form 1040A or 1040). Fill out "Schedule EIC" and attack it to your tax return.

Eligible families will either owe less in taxes or the government will mail them

a check! You can get the EIC even if you don't owe income tax.

The basic EIC for families with one child is a maximum of \$1,434 in 1993.

For free information and help in filing the EIC forms, call 1-800-829-1040. Tax forms are available from the IRS or at the post office. If you don't qualify for EIC but know someone who does, encourage them to apply. Well over 14 million families now qualify, but many do not apply.

Producers who are interested in obtaining a loan deficiency payment (LDP) on 1993 wheat, oats, rye, barley, canola, flaxseed, rapeseed, or honey, should do so before March 31. Additionally, March 31 is the deadline for filing requests for

price support loans.

Loans and LDP's on corn, grain sorghum, cotton, rice, soybeans, mustard seed, safflower seed, and sunflower seed, are available through May 31.

31 is the deadline for filing requests for Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) LDP's are issued to producers who, although eligible to obtain a CCC price

support loan, agree to forego the loan in return for a payment on the eligible

commodity.

To be eligible for CCC price support loans and LDP's producers farms must have been enrolled and in compliance with the applicable annual acreage reduction programs.

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
