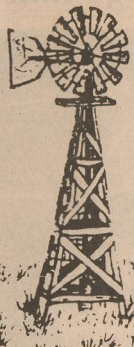

Matadors Kick-Off 1993 Football Season With Midnight Madness

The Matadors went a little mad very early Wednesday morning, 12:01 a.m. to be exact, when they began their two-a-day football workouts.

"The kids are really excited about the season; everyone's really excited," said Matley County head coach Perry Graves. "We just thought it would be a good way to kick off a Matador Madness season."

Graves said he never has tried this approach to a season before and he is not aware of any other area team beginning with a midnight practice session.

"Midnight Madness" practices may be new to high school football, but they are not new to sports.

Graves said he is copying the idea from Indiana University basketball coach Bobby Knight, who begins basketball season in a similar fashion. The University of Kentucky also has been known to

begin basketball practice at midnight of the earliest possible date.

In addition to the excitement surrounding the late-night workout, Graves is genuinely excited about the 1993 edition of the Matadors. With 32 players out for football and his entire backfield returning, Graves is looking for marked im-

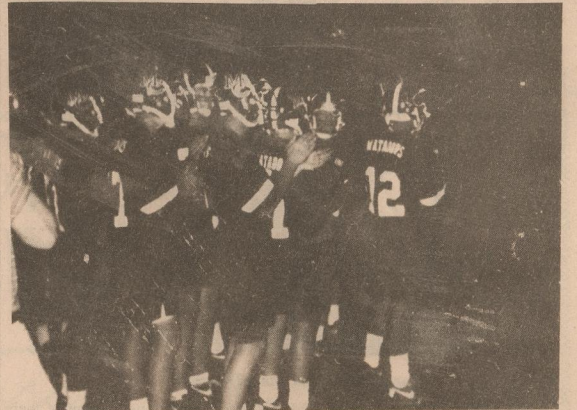
provement from last season's 3-7 squad. The team met again at 6 p.m. Wednesday night.

"We've been debating (the midnight practice) all summer," said Graves. "The kids got wind of it and got excited about it. I asked the superintendent, George Blanch, and he got excited about it, so we

did it."

The stands were full of loyal Matador fans and the late night hours did not effect the spirit of the group.

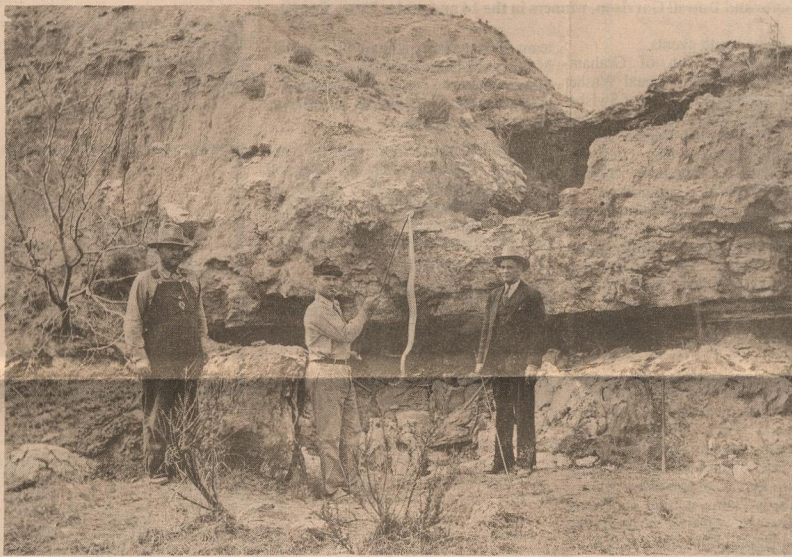

Got A Snake By The Tail?

A Museum Report

Writer J. Frank Dobie once said that "a man even halfway decent would always shut any gate he opened and kill any rattlesnake he had a chance at."

As the temperature has soared in the upper nineties toward 100 degrees, so have the encounters with diamond back rattlesnakes. Often a barking dog or a worrying cat will sound the alert that the unwelcome stranger is about, even in the confines of "town."

Although it's not uncommon to find a snake in the yard and sometimes even on the porch, one Matador matron recently found one in her laundry room, that's in the house, folks. The story goes she bravely held the snake down with a broom until help could arrive. How does one dial 911 while holding a snake at bay?

Lately rumors have run rampant about sightings of the smaller, but mostly silent, prairie rattler. From two to four feet in length, this pit viper is light brown with blotchy markings on its back, and just as deadly.

Thinking about rattlesnakes brings to mind the names of two men: Bill Slover and Bob Robertson. Slover has probably bagged more snakes than any one single man in the county. For three years in the fifties he was named winner of the World Championship Rattlesnake Roundup in Okeene, Oklahoma. Some of the early hunts netted as many as seventy snakes denned together.

But Robertson has the distinction of being the man who brought them to Matador. There the promoter filled a pit at Bob's Oil Well with the writhing rattlesnakes, a sure-fire tourist attraction. In the archives of the Matley County Museum are photos of Robertson and Gus Bird hunting snakes for the burgeoning collection which a few locals believe might have escaped.

Recent acquisitions for the museum include a prized medicine cabinet originally from the Traweck Hospital donated by Billie Clifton; a very interesting panel of World War II gear from Ronnie Bailey of Eastland; a mysterious rusty six-shooter found buried in the yard by Bill Palmeyer when he lived in Matador; a nicely restored doll, a child's blackboard, and play coke chest from Geraldine Key; sad irons from Dick and Hazel Dirickson; a kitchen cupboard from Leo and Joyce Archer; a 100 year old bonnet from Viola,

Knight Keith; a military uniform from Naomi Tilson; a toy lawn mower from Keith Patton; a steel pen nib box and framed historical prints from James Stanley; eye glasses from Jesse Hunter.

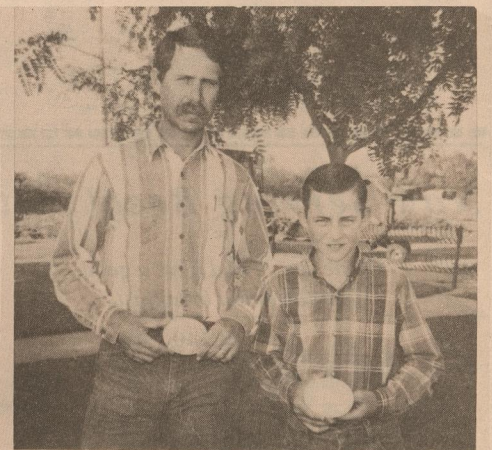

"This is not true", he added, "With the help of a careful, supervised program it is possible to regain your health."

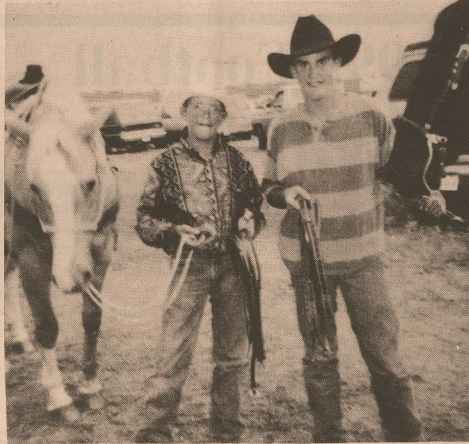
According to Stafford, the program which the Wellness Center offers is at a nominal cost.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR WASTE DISCHARGE PERMIT RENEWAL

QUAIL PIPE CORPORATION, P.O. Box 298, Roaring Springs, Texas 79256 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 02971 which authorizes the discharge of treated wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 6,000 gallons per day. The applicant operates a polyethylene pipe manufacturing facility. The plant site is on the west side of State Highway 70 in the City of Roaring Springs, Motley County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into Shinnery Draw; thence to Dutchman Creek; and thence to the South Fork of the Pease River, Segment no. 0227 of the Red River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge. The unclassified receiving waters for both Shinnery Draw and Dutchman Creek have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 0227 are high quality aquatic habitat and contact recreation. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. No significant degradation of high quality receiving waters is anticipated. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.


The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will enforce existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; (2) the statement "...request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.

This notice concerns 1993 property tax rates for the City of Roaring Springs. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. 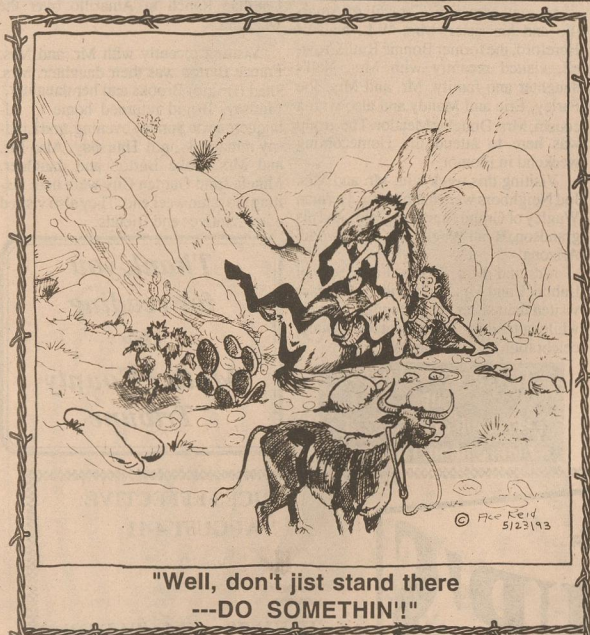

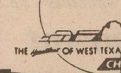
