

## STILL EXISTS Building Net Worth - an idea whose time scenars to have passed? Not so, ac-cording to Beverly A. Logsdon, Exten-sion Agent - Home Economics in Motley County

Net worth building is a personal deci-sion. While it is tempting to measure our economic well-being by how much we have to spend, the best measure of the famility's economic well-being is their net worth

worth. Net worth building is also emerging as an option for change in domestic policy that addresses poverty. Michael Sher-raden, associate professor at the George Warren Brown School of Social Work at Washington University in St. Louis, Mo. is encouraging policymakers to consider is encouraging policymakers to consider this approach. Operating form the obser-vation that not many people spend their way out of poverty, he proposes that the way out of poverty is through savings and investment.

inv From a policy perspective, welfare is defined by a family's level of income and their pattern of consumption and be-havoior associated with that income. havoior associated with that income. Sherraden has studied the Singapore domestic policy system that is based on individual savings rather than consump-tion ability. Today, 90 percent of the families in Singapore own their own homes and the percentage is rising. Rather than providing entitlements, this small nation supports tax-exempt employer and employee contributions to savings ac-counts accumulated under a Central Provident Fund. The accumulated capital has stimulated business investment, and families use the funds at their discretion for retirement, life insurance, education, medical care and other social welfare

purposes. Sherraden believes that some entitlement programs could be converted to asset building programs by enacting Individual Development Accounts (IDAs). Similar to Individual Retirement

> Accounts (IRAs), IDAs would be optional, earnings-based, tax-exempt and available to every individual. They could be initiated as early as birth and restricted to designated purposes such as housing, education, self-employment and retire-ment. IDA contributions could be matched

> by employers or other groups, and would be subsidized by the government for those in poverty who choose to participate. Assets would accumulate in these longterm restricted accounts, designed to promote orientation toward the future, long-range planning, savings and invest-ments, individual initiative, individual choice and achievement of life goals.

> Sherraden proposed that a single sys-tem for all types of asset-based welfare programs, patterned after the IRA sys-tem, would be less complex and more manageable for all concerned. Sherraden notes that his theory is not new He refers to the Homestead Act

new. He refers to the Homestead Act, which gave many families 160 acres of land and enabled them to have a stake in the nation and become productive citi-zens. Perhaps one of the most successful domestic policies in the United States history, he notes that asset based welfare provides welfare while it creates more participatory capitalism, leading to greater economic growth.
