### **April Sales Tax Rebates** Show 14.4% Increase Over Last Year

(AUSTIN) - A total of \$113.3 mil-

(AUSTIN) — A total of \$113.3 million in April sales tax rebates today was delivered by State Comptroller John Sharp to 979 Texas cities and 111 counties, a 14.4 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

"Texas cities received \$101.9 million, an impressive 14 percent increase above last year's \$89.3 million," Sharp said.

"The rebates of \$11.4 million to Texas counties reflect an equally encouraging 18.1 percent increase over the \$9.6 million payments in April 1993."

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in February and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in March.

"Continued construction growth in all major metro areas of Texas has helped push statewide employment to its highest."

The city of Houston received the largest sales tax rebate of \$14.6 million, up 13 percent from the \$12.9 million delivered in April 1993.

### BEHIND EVERY WORKING PARENT IS AN UNDERPAID CHILD CARE WORKER

The Worthy Wage Campaign is a multi-year effort to secure a living wage and decent working conditions for early childhood teachers and care providers. The ultimate goal is to secure the level of

The campaign is based on the behalf that those who work with young children should not be expected to bear the entire cost of providing quality child care. Working in coalitions with parents and husiness and government leaders pro-

Working in coalitions with parents and business and government leaders, providers can develop strategies for achieving the full cost of quality care.

A 1988 Child Care Staffing Study noted that the average salary for early childhood teachers was \$5.35 per hour. The turnover rate in child care centers was 41 percent. The study further showed that in centers with the highest turnover rate, child outcomes consistently demonstrated. rate, child outcomes consistently demonstrated a lack of effective teaching - deficient language development, apathy and poor social skills.

Other research has shown that although child care providers are unusually high in their commitment to their jobs, compensation levels indirectly influence effec-tive teaching by hampering recruitmen-tof individuals who are, or could become,

tof individuals who are, or could become, highly educated and trained.

Here are some things you can do to help raise wages of child care providers:

— Find out what benefits and salary your child care provider is paid. If you find it is too low, pressure the child care center to do what needs to be done to ensure a higher wage and decent working conditions.






