The follow-up meeting is designed to keep the general public up-to-date on the status of the various economic development committee's goals, the progress they have made, and any obstacles they have encountered.

As part of the Long-Range Extension Program for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), three additional critical issues affecting the residents of Motley County will be addressed during the meeting. Participants will have the opportunity to share their knowledge and provide input related to state-wide goals identified by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Long-Range Extension Program is conducted every five years to allow TAEX to meet with citizen groups from every county in Texas to identify the most

compelling needs of Texas citizens and their communities. The citizen groups will share ideas on the needs of our economy, our youth, our families, and our environmental surroundings.

Matador City Council Decides To Keep And Repair Old Trash Truck

The City Council of Matador met Thursday, April 14, to decide on the purchase of a trash truck. They have been looking for the last month to replace one that has been inoperable. Glenn Martin Contractor of Spur has been contracting his trash to the City of Matador landfill as well as picking up the trash in Matador.

Madonna of Southwest Equipment of Justin, Texas brought a 1991 trash truck for the Council to look at and try out. This truck was priced at \$42,500. The Council had several options they discussed at length.

At present the trash pick up and covering is costing the city approximately \$2000 per month.

The Council elected to repair their original truck at a much cheaper cost to the city.

Other equipment the City is in need of is to replace the dozer they used to cover the trash in the landfill. They have been hiring this done for several weeks.

Councilman Travis Jameson thinks

he has found a good used one that will be available next week. Council elected to let Jameson buy the dozer.

Other items on the agenda and one not on the agenda were as follows:

* Commissioner Franklin Jameson wanted to ask if he could get some of the clay material from the landfill. They need to use it for some culvert work.

Council asked if they could use the County loader in return. Jameson stated he was willing to help them in anyway possible. They all agreed, so no motion was made.

* Rodney Williams and Michael Clawson informed the City of the present key rate, which is for insurance rating. Mandates state that the pumper fire trucks have to be under 20 years of age for the City to have a low key rate, the Matador truck will be 20 years old in 1995.

Clawson and Williams stated they have several options. They can completely refurbish and upgrade the truck, or start a fund to replace the outdated truck. They

are already looking for grants or funding to help with this in 1995.

* Mayor Gary Lancaster presented the budget to be discussed and approved. The Council went over the expenses set up for temporary help and salaries. Because of the pending trash truck expenses and an unknown future at this time they want to add \$4000 for mowing and \$2000 for repairs. Motion passed.

* New appointments to the Water District Board were made. Mark Wason was chosen to replace Billy Wason; Larry Hoyle and Gerald Pipkin were reelected. Other Board members are Kenny Barton and Billy Donaldson.

* Mayor Gary Lancaster was appointed to the Appraisal District to replace Travis Jameson, who has been on for 4 years.

* The City elected to join other taxing entities to collect and clear up delinquent taxes and lots.

* The City is going to accept a lot from Melvin Clements if it is a clean lot.

* The City elected to leave the original city ordinance in tact for transient peddlers.

Meeting adjourned.

* The school is going with other entities to collect delinquent taxes and clear tax roll.

* SPSBA meeting is May 5.

* Board compared school tax rates with report from John Sharp, State Comptroller.

Motley County Appraisal Low

The following information is from a chart in the County Progress publication March 1994. It was sent to the Motley County Judge Laverna Price. The three smallest Market Valuebased counties in the state are:

1. Foard County, \$100 million
2. Motley County, \$103 million
3. Dickens County, \$118 million

Motley County is the second lowest county out of 254 counties in Texas. The total appraisal value of all properties of Motley County is the \$103 million, this being because of the low evaluation of property and the lack of industry and the depletion of the once prolific oil field east of Roaring Springs.

This total is all the taxing entities together and for Motley County is the major funding for the County and School District.

Home Economically Speaking

BEHIND EVERY WORKING PARENT IS AN UNDERPAID CHILD CARE WORKER

The Worthy Wage Campaign is a multi-year effort to secure a living wage and decent working conditions for early childhood teachers and care providers. The ultimate goal is to secure the level of resources necessary to attract a skilled and stable child care work force.

The campaign is based on the behalf that those who work with young children should not be expected to bear the entire cost of providing quality child care. Working in coalitions with parents and business and government leaders, providers can develop strategies for achieving the full cost of quality care.

A 1988 Child Care Staffing Study noted that the average salary for early childhood teachers was \$5.35 per hour. The turnover rate in child care centers was 41 percent. The study further showed that in centers with the highest turnover rate, child outcomes consistently demonstrated a lack of effective teaching - deficient language development, apathy and poor social skills.

Other research has shown that although child care providers are unusually high in their commitment to their jobs, compensation levels indirectly influence effective teaching by hampering recruitment of individuals who are, or could become, highly educated and trained.

Here are some things you can do to help raise wages of child care providers:

- Find out what benefits and salary your child care provider is paid. If you find it is too low, pressure the child care center to do what needs to be done to ensure a higher wage and decent working conditions.
- Give your family day home provider paid holidays, vacations and sick days.
- Give your child care provider a bonus.
- Write your state and federal legislators, along with local policy makers. Ask them to support legislation that puts more funding into child care issues, especially wages.
- Support improved licensing standards for Texas child care programs.
- Urge your community child care

program and employer to recognize the Worthy Wage Campaign.

FACTS ABOUT CHILD CARE WORKERS

— Child care workers often feel they are not respected by parents.
— A national pay equity study showed child care professionals as being the second most undervalued profession in the United States.

— The most important predictor of the quality of care children receive, among the adult work environment variables, is staff wages, according to the National Child Care Staffing Study.

HOW TO SHOW CHILD CARE PROVIDERS THAT YOU CARE

Show your child care provider that their work - caring for your child - is important to you by:

- Writing a note or card letting them know what their work means to you.
- Doing something to make their day easier such as volunteering at the center so the provider can take a break, taking the provider out to dinner or baby-sitting for the provider's children.
- Giving a gift certificate from a bookstore, toy store or restaurant.
- Sending flowers.
- Remembering the providers birthday.
- Telling the provider everytime you see him or her do something you like.
- Asking their opinion about your child.
- Taking your child to see a previous child care worker.

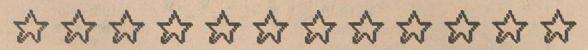

Most cases of depression can be treated without being hospitalized. Many insurance policies cover, at least part of the cost.

You can get help locally, for depression, by calling your local Mental Health Center in Plainview (Central Plains Center for MHMR and Substance Abuse). Also, there is a 24 hour crisis line you can call. It is 296-5555. There will be a qualified person to help you.

Some things you can do for yourself include: seeing a doctor for a check-up; talking things over with someone; avoid excess stress; get some exercise, etc.
