GENERAL RAINS BRIGHTEN OUTLOOK

Rain was falling again at 2 a. m. this morning and in most instances it will continue to be welcomed, although Motley County is "soaked to the gills." Rainfall last week end was general over the county with the precipitation amounting to 1.74 inches as measured by Bob Stanley's rain gauge. This, plus the current measurement of .25 at 8 o'clock this morning, brings the total for the year to 5.98, which is .05 above the total for 1956.

It is interesting to note that the total rainfall for the entire year of 1956 was only 5.93 inches and the total amount that fell the first four months of the year was only .58-inch. Last year we had received a total of 2.48 inches this date.

Old timers say the outlook has never been brighter in the county at this time of the year. Even in the "good years" of the past, sandstorms were blowing at this time of the year and little moisture had fallen.

Many believe this may be the greatest "crop growing" year in the county's entire history.

PRIZES ESTIMATED AT ABOUT \$240

PREPARATIONS are going forward for the annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show which will be held Saturday in the Matador high school agricultural building.

The stock show is a joint project of 4-H club boys and girls, directed by County Agent Bill Palmeyer, and F. F. A. classes, supervised by Vo-Ag teacher Bill Moss.

Approximately 15 calves, 40 hogs and 5 lambs are being groomed for the show by their youthful owners. Classes of animals to be shown are steers, fat lambs, barrows (light and heavy), gilts and sows.

While the number of exhibits will be less than in former years quality of the animals is declared to be in the top brackets. T. L. Leach, teacher trainer in the Ag. Education Department at Texas Tech, Lubbock, will serve as judge for the show.

All animals must be in place by 11 a. m. and judging will start promptly at 1:00 p. m. it was announced. All steers must be weighed before bringing them to the show barn, and the same rule applies also to barrows. County Agent Palmeyer declared.

If the exhibitor plans to sell a gilt or sow, these must also be weighed. Arrangements have been made to sell the hogs locally, but the steers will be trucked to Fort Worth for sale on the market, Monday, April 21.

Prizes Donated

Prize money, in the neighborhood of \$240, has been donated by businessmen and private citizens of the county, with the Lions Clubs of Matador and Roaring Springs assuming the responsibility for the collection.

Aluminum show sticks will be given as showmanship prizes, courtesy of the local PCA, and ribbons will be furnished by the Farmers Union. Part of the trucking expenses will be paid by the Farm Bureau, with sellers sharing the remainder of the trucking cost.

North Youth Makes Nice Try

Escape Artist" Is Caught By Officers

10 HOURS OF FREEDOM, a 15-year-old Fort Worth termed by the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram "Roger the Roger Throneberry, was a prisoner in the Motley jail. It was his second time here in less than six months.

County officers aided by Game Warden Weldon and Briscoe County Sheriff Johnny Lanham and Deputy Bedwell converged on a lone farm house 20 miles here about 12:30 Sunday morning and nabbed Throneberry. He was back in the hands of the law less than 10 hours.

Throneberry was taken to Gatesville where the step father must face charges pending there for aiding in the Saturday escape.

"They tried hard to escape from jail here Sunday," Sheriff Wilson said, "but finally gave up. They made a key out of an old dust pan and tried to use it so long that it was bright and shiny."

Denies He Aided Sheriff Wilson said Paul Throneberry denied he aided his stepson in the latter's flight from the state reformatory.

"He told me the boy must have escaped on his own and hitchhiked here Saturday night," the Sheriff said.

Authorities think differently. They said Roger was released into his stepfather's custody when Paul Throneberry went to Gatesville to visit the boy Saturday.

Roger wasn't supposed to leave the ground, but he did, and school officials filed their charges against the stepfather in the belief that he drove Roger (Continued on back page)

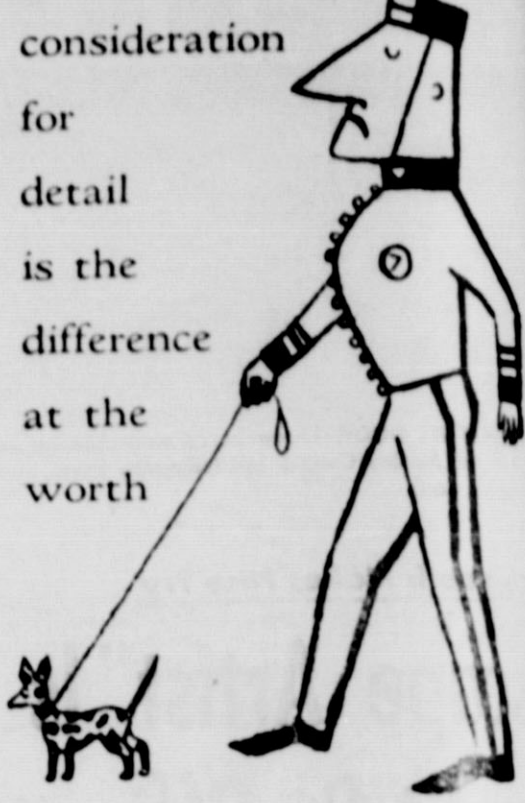

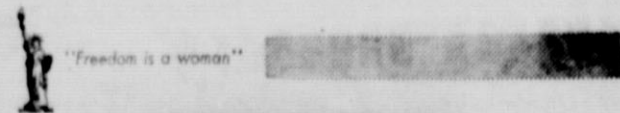

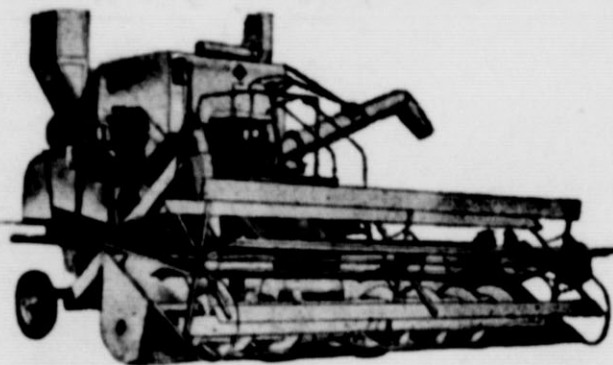

away in a Cadillac. Wilson is still perturbed about the boy's escape here in November after wriggling under a jail door.

"He said he lost some hide on the side of his head and ear," Sheriff Wilson said, "and almost became wedged under the iron door."

Sheriff Wilson heard about the escape over the two-way radio at his office Saturday and received a tip that the boy might be headed for an uncle's farm north of Matador.

"We pulled a fast one on him," the Sheriff said. "We sneaked up real quiet, went into the bedroom where he was sleeping and turned flashlights on him."

Roger wasn't too pleased about it all.

"He blamed it all on the two-way radios," the Sheriff said. "He told me if he had known I was after him he would have kept on running."

Things ended about as they had on Roger's four other escapes. His home is 611 Grainger, Ft. Worth. He was sent to Gatesville from Ft. Worth for burglary theft and a sex party with 14-year-old girl. Beginning last

fall he managed escapes from Gatesville reformatory, Matador, Tulsa and Cheyenne. He also disappeared off a plane at Amarillo while being flown from Cheyenne back to Texas.


