Most Severe Storm Of Winter Hits Area

NO LET UP is in sight for the bitter cold and wintry blasts affecting two thirds of the nation. The Foothill Country is blanketed in sleet and snow and another cold front has been forecast for tonight. Highway travel in most of the Panhandle is extremely hazardous and drivers have been warned to keep off the roads except in emergency cases.

Approximately 3 1/2 inches of snow fell in Matador and accounted for 17-inch moisture. Sleet accounted for another .08-inch. Bob Stanley's new recording thermometer showed a low of 22 degrees Wednesday morning. Floydada reported a low of 4 degrees.

'Wildcat' Is Tested

Three drillstem tests have developed slight oil shows in Pan American Pet. Corp.'s No. 1-B C. R. Brandon, wildcat, two and one-half miles east of Roaring Springs.

The last of the three tests was between 4,224-225 feet. Test lasted two hours without surfacing gas or fluid. Final recovery was 50 feet of drilling mud and 33 feet of slightly oil-cut mud. Pressures were 20-30 pounds flowing and 145 pounds shut in for 45 minutes. Drilling operations were resumed, with bit cutting below 4,680 feet in lime at last report.

Roaring Springs To Report Weather

Roaring Springs has been chosen as one of the 220 stations being established to provide special recording instruments which will assist in the storm research program of the U. S. Weather Bureau.

The network is now being extended into the Panhandles of Texas and Oklahoma. The equipment will be operated by Joe M. Thacker. It will consist of a sensitive microbarograph, which will record changing barometric pressure, and hygrothermograph, which records changes in temperature and humidity.

WINTER returned to West Texas with renewed vitality during the past week, when a series of cold fronts produced some of the most severe weather of the season.

A snowstorm Thursday night made highway traffic hazardous, although it was not blamed for the fatal accident on State Highway 70, eight miles north of Matador. Most of the snow was gone by Friday noon and warmer weather followed Saturday.

Another cold front struck late Sunday, however, and early Monday the entire area was covered in ice.

Highway Patrolman Bobbie Allen, 28, of Morton, accompanied by his wife and two children, narrowly escaped tragedy when his car went into a spin and turned over near the west city limits on U. S. Highway 70, about 9:30 Monday morning. Although the car was almost demolished, there were no injuries in the accident.

Patrolman Allen, a former resident, was on his way here to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Allen, during a 2-day leave. He was driving his personal automobile.

Snow Follows Sleet

Snow began falling here about 11 a. m. Tuesday and by night had reached a depth of two inches. Floydada reported between five and six inches and a temperature of 21 at nightfall. Light snow continued to fall here throughout Tuesday night.

Small Girl is Victim in Highway Tragedy

Four Injured in Headon Collision

A GRINDING crash eight miles north of Matador Thursday night brought instant death to Carla Colwell, 4, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Colwell of Paducah, on State Highway 70, about 9:30 p. m.

Four others were injured in the accident when a late model Mercury driven by G. W. McCoy, 60, of Coleman, left the pavement and collided headon with a Ford sedan driven by Lonnie Lynn, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lonzo Lynn of Whiteflat. Lynn had stopped at an intersection where the highway makes a left hand curve and was waiting for McCoy to pass.

Besides Carla (his niece) Lynn was accompanied by his small sister, Gail, 5. He had been "baby-sitting" with the children at a neighbor's home, while their mothers attended the annual Mother-Daughter Banquet in Matador.

Accompanying McCoy was G. R. Beatty, a Snyder truck driver, whom he had met only five minutes before when Beatty's truck developed engine trouble and he flagged a ride.

Mos seriously injured is McCoy, a patient in Stanley Hospital. Lynn suffered cuts and bruises as did his sister, Gail. Beatty suffered severe lacerations about the face which required approximately 70 stitches.

The Colwell child was pronounced dead upon arrival at Stanley Hospital in a Eudy-Seale ambulance. The accident occurred just as snow began falling in the area. McCoy said he was blinded by Lynn's lights. All the patients, with the exception of McCoy have been released from the hospital.

Funeral Held Saturday

Funeral services for the small victim were held Saturday at 2 p. m. in Paducah in the Missionary Baptist Church. Rev. Neal Stout, pastor, officiated, and burial was in the Garden of Memories cemetery there.

Besides her parents, she is survived by her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Lonzo Lynn, of Whiteflat and paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Colwell, of Paducah.

As a winner in this bracket, she will be eligible to compete for one of the two top scholarship awards, Mrs. A. L. Fair, her homemaker teacher has been informed.

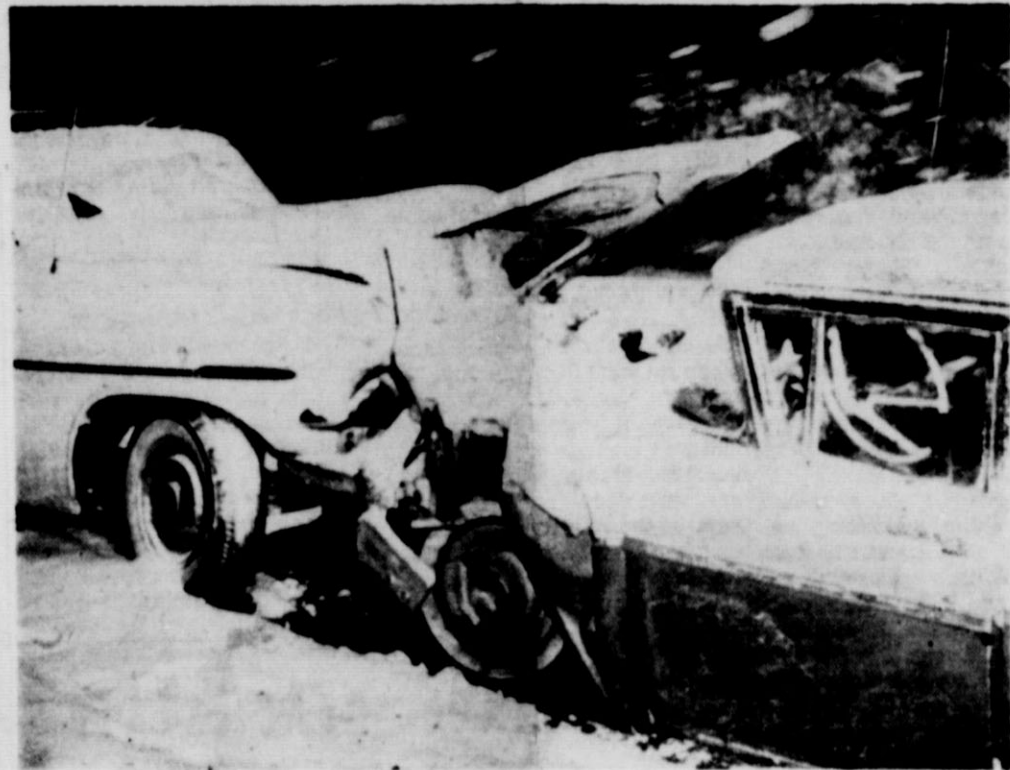

Two members of a South Plains minister's family were killed and four others injured Monday night in a 3-car pileup four miles west of Jacksboro on State Highway 199.

Dead were Mrs. Willie J. Denham Sr., 37, and her son, W. J. Denham Jr., 11, both of Olton. The Rev. Willie Denham Sr., pastor of the Olton Assembly of God Church, suffered cuts and bruises. Also injured were three children, David, 6, Ramona, 4, and Timothy, 5 months.

The Denham family are former Matador residents, and Rev. Denham was pastor of the Assembly of God Church here. They have resided in Olton the past year.

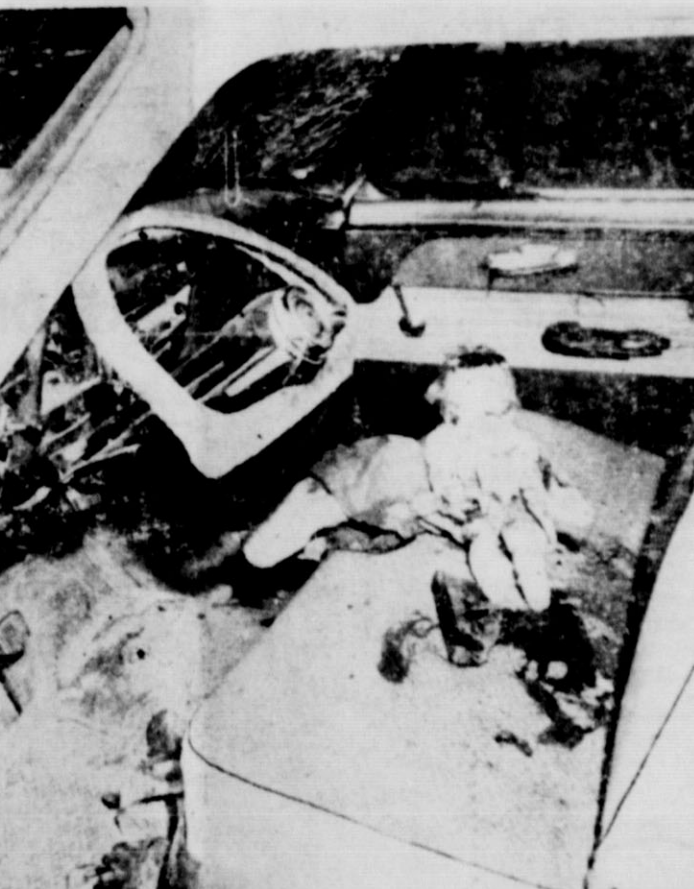
They were returning home after visiting Mrs. Denham's father, who is ill in a Beaumont hospital.

Car Rams Into Truck

Texas Highway Patrolman Mitchell Campbell of the Jacksboro office who investigated the accident said apparently the Denham car "ran under the back of an empty grain truck, careened off to the left, sideswiping an on-coming car and wound up in front of the truck."

Denham reportedly was blinded by lights of an oncoming car when he rammed the truck, which investigating officers said was slowing down to pull off the highway.

The truck and the Denham car, a light late model sedan, were going west. Two men in the truck and six occupants of the oncoming car were not injured. (Continued on back page)

COUNTY HAS 33% CARS INSPECTED

Only 33% of Motley County's motor vehicles have been inspected according to J. R. Whitmire, Motor Vehicle Inspection Patrolman from the Texas Department of Public Safety. The county has four approved inspection stations.

After April 15 motorists are subject to a fine of \$1 to \$200 if apprehended operating a vehicle without a valid safety inspection sticker.

Motley county has 1620 registered motor vehicles and only 580 have the new 1958 safety stickers on the windshield, which is required by the state law.

Captain Alan Johnson, service commander of motor vehicles inspection of Region No. 5 of the State Department of Public Safety, has announced that only 30 per cent of the registered vehicles in this region have been inspected to date.

JOHN BRADSHAW DIES at VERNON

John H. Bradshaw, 72, former Matador resident, died Sunday afternoon in a hospital in Vernon, following a short illness. A retired farmer, he had been living in Vernon since 1949.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 10 a. m. in Henderson Funeral Home Chapel of Vernon. Austin Barner, minister of the Paradise Street Church of Christ, officiated. Burial was in East View Memorial Park.

Mr. Bradshaw was born Sept. 22, 1885, in Hunt County. He married Miss Ola Sutton in Farwell, in 1919. They made their home in Matador for a number of years, during which time he was engaged in the jewelry and watch repair business. They lived in Plainview after leaving Matador, and moved from there to Vernon.

Plaintiff seeking equitable review asks to set aside a settlement made with her husband Clifford Mooers, dated May 1, 1956, and this Court's decree of approval entered the next day in cause No. 1464, styled "Ex Parte: Clifford Mooers and Wife, Dolores Mooers," recorded in the minutes, Vol. 6, p. 636, and asks an accounting and for a declaration fixing the identity of the residuary devisee under a purported will of such husband as admitted to probate December 10, 1956, in which suit it is claimed that plaintiff as the wife of such decedent for 27 years before his death was induced to consent to such property settlement and decree by the fraud of her husband and his agents, consisting of false representations and concealment of material facts as to the nature, extent and value of the community property and plaintiff's true interest therein at such time, and because of further false promises to bequeath and on account of mistake induced by fraud of her said husband and coercion; and it is claimed that a fraud was also practiced by such decedent on this Court, and that the proceedings did not comply with Article 2624a.

It is further claimed in such suit that all or substantially all

property in decedent's name at the time of such settlement and at the time of his death was community property, and that had the wife received those properties awarded to her in such settlement, such were greatly less than her share at such time, and such contract was grossly unjust and disadvantageous to her, but that there was further material fraud and deceit practiced on her as to those properties which it was recited she was to receive under such settlement because of failure of title and of consideration in material part and inability to deliver and failure to deliver personal property of the kind and value which it was represented such wife should receive.

Plaintiff offers to do equity and makes a continuing tender to restore that which she has received and asserts that due to her situation, inexperience, ignorance and deception she could not sooner have discovered such fraud and brought this action.
