

COURTHOUSE THAT BURNED ON IT'S 40th BIRTHDAY, above, was dedicated Sept. 27, 1904. Shortly after daybreak on a rainy morning. September 27, 1944, fire was discovered in the second story and roof of the building. A breakdown in a fire engine pump prevented fire-men from bringing the blaze under control. Fire departments from Paducah and Roaring Springs arrived too late to save the old courthouse. Within a short time only blackened walls remained and in them the corner stone, bearing this inscription: Dedicated Sept. 27, A. D. 1904; J. A. White, Architect: T. T. Bouldin, County Judge: W. A. Walton, county clerk: Commissioner (1) M. L. Patton. (2) W. R. Tilson. (3) J. R. Williams. (4) C. D. Bird. While the walls cooled, the date was Sept. 27, exactly 40 years after the building was dedicated. The structure was made of native materials. The brick was burned on Teepee Creek, the lime was burned on Salt Creek and the sandstone was freighted from Ring Cove Canyon, near Quitaque.


