WITH THE 12th AAF-Staff Sgt. William R. Tilson, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Tilson, Matador, Texas, completed two years of truimphs, but he thinks that the zenith of the outfit's exploits was reached on Palm Sunday of 1943. Operating at Cape Bon, Tunisia, the fighter group knocked 77 German planes out of the sky.

Since being overseas, Sergeant Tilson has seen action in Egypt, Tunisia, Sicily and Southern Italy. His fighter group fought with the British Eighth Army in its smashing drive to oust the Germans and Italians from Africa. Now the fighter group is gaining more fame for successfully using 12th AAF P-47 Thunderbolts for low level bombing and strafing of enemy installations and communi-






